STOCKS

WALL STREET

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market closed higher today as a late buying wave boosted prices to their best of the session.

Volume for the day was estimated at 3,000,000 shares compared with 3,920,000 Friday.

Gains and losses of key stocks were from fractions to around a point.

Steels, motors and aircrafts were the best performers but their gains were limited.

Improvement was gradual. Losers were scattered throughout major groupings.

General Dynamics was ahead a point or so. Martin Co., United Aircraft and Republic Aviation added fractions.

American Motors recouped about a point of the 2 1/2 loss taken Friday. Fractional gains were scored by General Motors, Ford, Checker Motors and Studebaker-Packard.

Small gains were posted for a number of leading steels including Bethlehem, Republic and Jones & Laughlin.

Allied Chemical was a one-point gainer in an otherwise spotty chemical group.

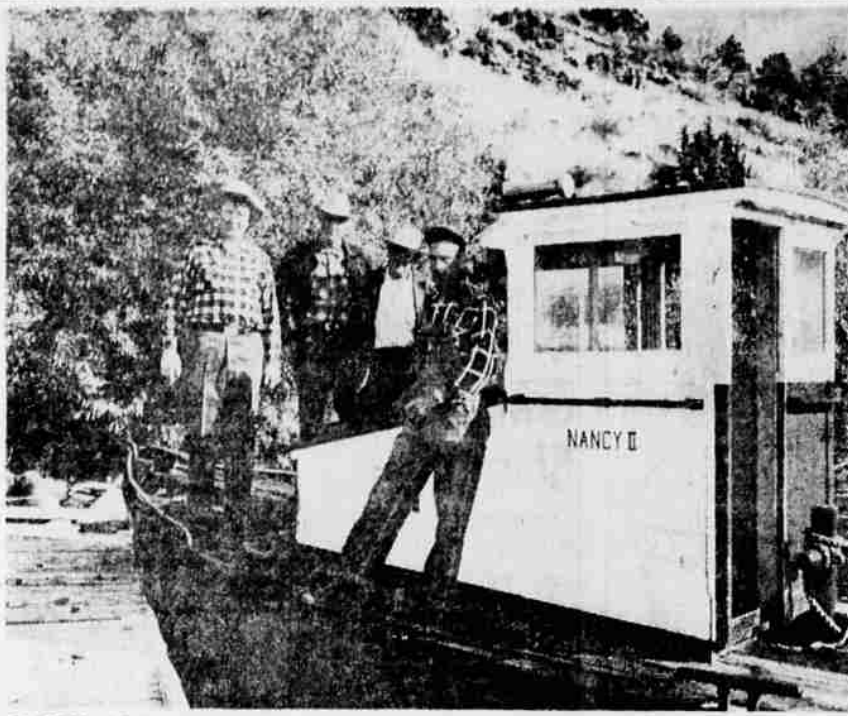

SEARCH OPERATIONS which have been conducted on Upper Klamath Lake since the swamping of Jim Cline's boat on October 14 came to an inevitable conclusion yesterday with the finding of the body of the third and last victim of the tragedy, Hal Furman Jr. Shown aboard the Klamath Lumber and Box Company's "Nancy II," from which the young man's body was sighted during the course of a daily search, are some of those who were most active in the operation. Man Gives Up To KF Police

A lonely man stopped a city patrol car on a downtown street just after 3 o'clock Monday morning.

"I've got to talk to you, sir," he told Officer Floyd Pierce. "I've been thinking about it, and I've got to turn myself in."

Pierce looked upon the worn but still young face stricken with contrition and asked, "What have you done that was so bad?"

The man wanted to go to the station to make his confession. Pierce drove him down. There Charles Jackson, a 31-year-old transient, revealed his crime. He and two other fellows, he said, had stolen some gasoline and some workcoats from a Southern Pacific workhouse five years ago.

It did not seem like so terrible a crime. But police jailed Jackson, more or less at his own insistence, and proceeded to check his record.

It was more serious than a petty theft of five years ago. From Portland came word that Jackson had been arrested four times between 1950 and 1952 for soliciting for prostitution. Los Angeles reported Jackson had been arrested for pushing narcotics in 1948. Eugene said he had been arrested on drunk charges, but that was all.

Finally, from Roseburg, came word that Jackson had escaped from the state mental hospital in Salem on September 5, where he had been committed from Multnomah County.

But all the news collected from Klamath Falls all-points' bulletin reported records, but no warrants. Jackson was sentenced to 15 days in the city jail on a vagrancy charge, while his case is investigated further.

Judge Appends Additional Time

District Judge D. E. Van Vactor added additional woe, 4 1/2 days of them, to the troubles of a Klamath Falls man already serving a 15-day disorderly conduct sentence in city jail.

Both charges grew out of a visit that Hughie V. Griffin, downtown hotel resident, paid to the apartment of the Lola Mae Davis.

The visit occurred on Friday morning of last week, and he was sentenced that day in municipal court. Later Friday a charge of assault and battery was brought against Griffin by Miss Davis in district court. She complained that Griffin had slapped her in the mouth and on the back.

He pleaded guilty to the charge and was given the additional sentence in the county jail.
