Tech To Close Home Slate

Coach Andy Knudsen's Klamath Union High School Pelicans close out their 1958 football season Friday night and the Oregon Tech Owls complete their home schedule Saturday night before local fans at Modoc Field.

The Pelicans, losers in their last six straight outings, hope to get back on the winning way Friday night when they ring down the curtain on their season at Ashland. The Pel-Grizzlies meeting is a Southern Oregon Conference and District 6A-1 contest.

Coach Rex Hunsaker's Oregon Collegiate Conference champion Owls are expected to draw a record-breaking OTC football crowd Saturday night when Tech hosts a potent Moffett Air Base team. This is the second top-flight service team to meet the Owls, and this marks the fourth and final hometown appearance of the OCC champions.

The Owls went right to work Monday, still feeling high after Saturday's 66-7 triumph over Oregon College of Education. But the attention was focused on Moffett Field's highly regarded football powerhouse. The Naval Air Force has won six and lost only one. OTI has notched five wins in six outings.

Moffett, which holds a 40-25 win over Southern Oregon College earlier in the season, lost its lone game to San Quentin's prison team, a club that has no personnel problems. Tech's only loss was handed down by Hamilton Air Force Base's all-American-loaded ball club. Moffett and OTI do not have any common foes on their respective schedules except for Southern Oregon, which bowed to OTI 40-0.

Heading up the Moffett attack this weekend will be a 170-pound

Ashland has won two and lost five for overall season play. Their victories came at the expense of Yreka and Lakeview. Yreka held the Grizzlies to a 6-0 score while Lakeview, an A2 school, lost out by a count of 33-12.

New Coast College Loop May Be Formed

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A basketball association composed of teams from California, UCLA, Stanford, USC and Washington is expected to be formed later this month for the 1959-60 campaign—and thereby hangs the zaniest tale of West Coast sports history.

"There is nothing definite about it," said Coach Pete Newell of California, "but I understand that the athletic directors of the schools want us to get together on such an organization."

The proposal now looks as though we would play three games against each opponent each year—a total of 12 league games."

But Newell pointed out a strange facet of the proposal: "If such a group is formed, we still wouldn't be considered a league under the N.C.A.A. rules and our champion would not get a play-off berth. We would be considered an independent group and would have to play off with some other independent for the right to compete in the play-offs. Under N.C.A.A. rules it takes six teams to make an official conference."

This is the final, sad come-uppance for the once-proud members of the Pacific Coast Conference.

It was only a few years ago that such strong independents as University of San Francisco, Loyola, Santa Clara, St. Mary's etc., were in the same position—that of having to play off to get into the play-offs. Today these teams are part of a seven-team conference, with the champion automatically invited to compete in the big tournament.

"Such is the power of unity," declared Newell, who used to coach at U.S.F. when that school, with championship timber, usually didn't go to the bother if even attempting to qualify to play in the N.C.A.A.

"If we form a five-school loop," said Newell, "we would have to sign a two-year contract because, playing each school three games a year, would mean that California, for instance, would play USC two games there the first year and one at home. The following year it would be just the opposite."

"That's the only way we could balance things out."

Meanwhile, from the far north there was a report that Washington might join a Northwest conference.

And nobody knows for sure, yet, whether Stanford would even consider joining the other four schools in the proposed new loop.

Reliever Tabbed For Honor

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP) — "I'm thrilled and surprised," said the Washington Senators' relief pitcher, Dick Hyde.

He added:

"It will be a good bargaining point when contract signing time comes around."

The 30-year-old right-hander who works in a service station during the off season, had been informed he was voted the American League sophomore of 1958.

He received 46 of 96 votes by members of the Baseball Writers' Assn. of America in The Associated Press poll.

Hyde, who bounced around the minors for nine years before getting a chance with Washington, is the first submarine specialist since Eldon Auker.

He won 10 games for the Senators last season and saved 19 in relief, and compiled a 1.75 earned run average — lowest in the league for pitchers with a minimum of 10 decisions.

"I didn't start that submarine style until 1954, although I had been pitching since 1949," Hyde said. "After getting out of the service, Cal Griffith (president of the Senators) was watching me in spring training in 1954. He saw my sidearm and told me to get down lower. That's how my submarine pitch developed."

This last season, I developed better control mainly through the help of pitching coach Boom Boom Beck," Hyde continued. "It was a combination of this and getting to know the batters better. Also, the fellows always gave me good team support."

"Beck worked with me until I got a coordinated rhythm in my delivery instead of the herky-jerky stuff."

"As for being a starter — well, I get a kick out of doing relief and am satisfied with my job. Everybody likes to do what they can do best — and I think I'm best as a relief pitcher."

LSU, Iowa, Cadets Pace Pigskin Voting

Louisiana State, Iowa and Army held their places on top of the weekly Associated Press football ranking poll today, but after that it was a case of anything — and anyone — goes.

Ohio State and Colorado went clear out of the top 10 after last Saturday's licks. Auburn, barely victorious, went down a notch to make room for astounding Northwestern. Mississippi, after losing for the first time, dropped three places.

LSU, one of two unbeaten and untied major college teams, maintained its slender lead over onetime Iowa in the balloting of 165 sports writers and broadcasters by a margin of 1,443 points to 1,379. The Tigers from Louisiana drew 82 first-place votes and Iowa's Hawkeyes 54.

Army, the leader two weeks ago before it was tied by Pittsburgh, was named first on only seven ballots, but piled up 1,105 points for third place.

Points are counted on the basis of 10 for each first-place vote, 9 for second, etc.

The first three places continued to reflect the results. LSU conquered Mississippi 14-0 in their struggle for the Southeastern Conference lead. Iowa routed Michigan 37-14 and Army ran over helpless Colgate 68-6.

An even sharper reflection of results gave Northwestern fourth place by a bare three points over Auburn. Northwestern's Wildcats, who had dropped out of the top 10 after losing to Iowa, beat Ohio State for the first time in 10 years, 21-0. Auburn just scratched out a 6-5 decision over Florida.

Ohio State, rated fifth a week ago, dropped clear to 16th after its defeat. Mississippi dropped from sixth to ninth after losing to the leaders. Colorado, a 23-7 victim of Oklahoma, fell from ninth in the rankings clear out of sight.

As a result Oklahoma, Wisconsin, Purdue, Mississippi and the unbeaten Air Force Academy team filled the last five places in the top 10.

Weekly Prep Football Poll Led By Jeffs

There's no change at the top of this week's Oregon Associated Press prep football poll, with Jefferson of Portland and Medford one-two again.

Marshall, a familiar name in prep for previous years, has moved up one place into the No. 3 position.

Marshall walloped Roseburg 27-0 last week and running its record this season to six wins, one loss and a tie.

Fourth and fifth place also shuffled. Unbeaten Astoria took over No. 4 alone. North Salem skidded from No. 3 to 5 after suffering a 19-6 defeat by Ft. Vancouver, Wash.

All the 17 sports writers and sportscasters voting in the poll picked Jefferson as the No. 1 team in the state. Jeff is the defending state and Portland City League champion. So far in eight games this season, Jefferson has scored 386 points, better than a point a minute.

Jefferson had 170 points in the voting and Medford chalked up 150. Medford, the top defensive team in the state, remains unbeaten and has scored 182 points this season, while allowing its opponents only one touchdown.

The lower half of the top ten also was rearranged this week. The only one unchanged was Grants Pass, which remained No. 6 after whipping Klamath Falls 32-0 week before last and resting last weekend.

Roosevelt of Portland advanced from No. 9 to No. 7 after beating Franklin 31-12 in a Portland league game.

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Falcons Boosted By Mayo

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP)—Ask any football fan in this sky-high city who put the "air" in Air Force Academy and they'll tell you Rich Mayo.

He's the sophomore sensation whose passing arm has helped mark the Falcons as the Cinderella team of the nation.

But not until last weekend against Oklahoma State did the 5-foot-11, 170-pounder from Eureka, Calif., stamp himself the prince charming of the gritty squad now unbeaten in six games.

Mayo completed 28 of 45 passes against the Oklaks, among them 16 completions in 25 fourth quarter attempts. His 13-yard strike to end Bob Brickey gave the Falcons a 33-29 triumph in the final nine seconds.

Coach Ben Martin said game movies showed that Mayo's receivers dropped five arials that should have been caught. Completions on those attempts would have given him a remarkable 33-of-45 performance for the game.

As it was, he accounted for 214 yards.

"It was by far the greatest experience of collegiate passing I've ever seen," said Martin, in his first year as Falcon coach. He succeeded Buck Shaw, who moved up as coach of the professional Philadelphia Eagles.

In the Stands at Stillwater, Okla., to scout the Falcons was Frank Prentup, assistant coach of the University of Colorado. The Buffaloes meet the Cadets for the cadets for the first time Nov. 29.

Prentup compared the sophomore quarterback with Texas Christian's great passer of the 1930s, Davey O'Brien.

"O'Brien chopped 'em up with those short passes," he said.

For the season, the California youngster has 58 completions in 100 attempts for 608 yards and seven touchdowns. Only once has an opponent intercepted a Mayo pass. That was on his 74th attempt, against Oklahoma State.

Mayo also is the team's leading punter, with a 38-yard average.

'Willy Nilly' Play Drawing Says Marshall

WASHINGTON (AP) — If pro football is willy nilly, George Preston Marshall of the Washington Redskins mused aloud today, then people must like willy nilly football.

Marshall, pro pioneer and owner of the Redskins, was commenting on a remark by Adm. Tom Hamilton, athletic director at Pitt.

Hamilton said during the weekend that the pros "play a wild game, throwing the ball willy nilly all over the place, with little purpose."

Marshall said he wasn't sure what kind of football his Redskins have been playing this season but if it's willy nilly, "then there has been too much nilly and not enough willy."

Washington has lost four of six contests to date.

Then the chief Redskin had a word for Hamilton, a star player and later coach and athletic director at Navy before taking the Pitt job.

"Although the admiral has seen a lot of professional football, I still don't think he is qualified to comment," Marshall said.

"After all, professional football has no taxpayers to support it, with the exception of the citizens who do so voluntarily. Obviously they like the type of game the National Football League plays."

NFL Commissioner Bert Bell spoke the same piece in Philadelphia Monday. Bell was not discussing the wilies and nillies but the season's high of 291,000 or so who paid to see the six pro games Sunday.

Bell said the NFL enjoys such large patronage "because we give the public interesting, wide open, clean football."

Hoots Greet OC Champs

A large turnout of Owl Hoots greeted the Oregon Tech coaching staff and four OTI football players at their weekly dinner meeting at the Chuck Wagon Monday night.

The boosters welcomed head coach Rex Hunsaker and his crew back to town after the Owls claimed the Oregon Collegiate Conference football championship Saturday by drubbing Oregon College 66-7 at Monmouth. The title was the first outright championship for the Mile High Campus. In 1952 the Owls tied with OCE for top honors.

Hunsaker reviewed the game for the Owl Hoots and credited several sources as being responsible for the title victory. "We had lots of help for this game," Hunsaker told the boosters, "and the team effort we got from the boys was great. This ball club," Hunsaker added, "has jelled into one of the finest teams I have ever been associated with. They all work together and for one purpose, to have a team victory."

Assistant coaches George Miller and Ralph Carr also spoke briefly praising the ball club for the effort put forth at Monmouth Saturday and the support that the club received from students and other fans who traveled to Monmouth for the game, and those who greeted the team in Sunday afternoon's welcome home rally.

Hunsaker introduced four ball players to the group for their "unusual" work in making the Owls a winning team. The four were quarterback Roy Johnson, halfback Otis Foster, and freshman tackles Lyle Fowler and Virgil Winters. Until Saturday, when Foster scored five touchdowns and three extra points to lead the OTI onslaught, he had been detailed to mostly defensive play, like Johnson, Winters and Fowler.

Johnson, speaking on behalf of the club, especially for those players from out of state, told the boosters, "we would have to go a long way in finding a better group of people than those in Klamath Falls or a better ball club than is now at OTI."

Indians Slate 35 Night Games

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Cleveland Indians today announced they will play a 35-game home night schedule in 1959, the most in the club's history.

The world champion New York Yankees will be opponents seven times under the lights. Baltimore is scheduled for six night games, Chicago, Boston, Kansas City and Washington five, and Detroit only two contests.

The first night game will be April 17 against Kansas City, and the final archlight affair against the same Athletics, Sept. 25.
