YREKA — Judge Kenneth T. Stone of Weed was elected as the new chapter chairman of the Siskiyou County Chapter of the American Red Cross at a meeting held at the Mount Shasta Piedmont Hotel Tuesday evening, October 28, with 35 persons in attendance.

Special guest speakers for the annual dinner meeting were William Budd, field representative of the Pacific area office of the American Red Cross; and Rex Riley, sector coordinator, Sector 3-B, California disaster office at Redding.

In his brief talk before the group Martin Webb Jr., Yreka, retiring chairman, thanked those present for their wholehearted support during his two years in office.

Charles O'Donnell, executive secretary of Yreka, reported on chapter activities during the year, and stated that a full report will be mailed to all key persons in Siskiyou County.

Mrs. Irene Todorovic, Dorris, received special recognition for having traveled the farthest to attend the meeting. Commented Martin Webb, "It was people like that that made Red Cross a success."

Foster Home Need Cited

YREKA — Jess Brewer, Siskiyou County probation officer, announced Friday that there is a desperate need for foster homes for homeless dependent children in the Yreka area, stating that there are at present five children without homes, and "a general continuing need for homes for these children."

Brewer said, "We are especially interested in finding persons who will take in teen-age children, both boys and girls, or perhaps some ranch owner, who could provide work for teen-agers."

Brewer also said, "Someone with a large home who would be willing to use it as a receiving home for dependent children arriving at various times of the night or day is needed."

He further added that anyone offering their home would be paid on a retainer basis, plus a fee for each child.

Brewer asked that anyone interested in aiding with the foster home problem should contact him either at his office on the second floor of the Siskiyou County Courthouse, or the county welfare office located in the courthouse basement at Yreka.

Members Of School Board Meet With Chamber Group

YREKA — Elementary school board members from Little Shasta, Willow Creek, Gazelle, Delphi, Hilt and Fall Creek met with the education committee of the Yreka Chamber of Commerce October 29 to discuss the secession of Yreka and its high school attendance area from the Siskiyou County Union High School District.

Sam Friedman, chairman of the chamber committee, said that first a petition calling for an election must be circulated to voters within the Yreka Elementary School District with at least 10 per cent of voters' signatures obtained.

He then stated that an election would be held throughout the elementary school districts of the complete proposed withdrawal area and the measure must pass by a simple majority before the withdrawal can be authorized.

Friedman also stated that the meeting was held specifically to discuss the establishment of a Yreka Union High School District, and had nothing to do with unification or any other school problems.

He added that the new district would assume its proportionate share of obligations arising from bond issues and from state aid money, set by proportionate assessed valuation, with it when it withdrew, effective up to the date of withdrawal. He said that the

new district would not be responsible for any bonds not sold, nor authorized state aid money not spent by that time.

When asked what would be gained financially by the withdrawal and the costs of operation of a new school district, Friedman stated in part that money would be spent for the sole benefit of the student attending the district's own school, and that the proposed area already has one half the assessed valuation of the present Siskiyou district.

He also said that taxes could not be more and that, once the withdrawal occurred, the general tax would automatically revert back to 75 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. "Of course, this committee doesn't guarantee that to the new board. Our guess is that it will cost about a dollar to operate, which is still 25 cents cheaper than we are now paying," he added.

Robert Reynolds, Yreka superintendent of schools, expressed the viewpoint that, with the present assessed valuation and method of operation, he could see no reason why the new district would not have enough money for operations.

Another speaker mentioned that, if the Siskiyou district could oper-

ate seven schools on 45 million dollars of assessed valuation, the new district should be able to operate one school on 22 million dollars.

Mrs. June Severns of the Willow Creek School District; Ed Hart of the Little Shasta District; and Reynolds were appointed by Chairman Friedman as a committee to investigate current operational costs of Yreka High School.

Savings Bond Figures Told

YREKA — Northern California residents created further savings for their future security by investing \$7,616,887 in U.S. Savings Bonds during the month of September, it was announced last week by J. P. Correia, county chairman.

Siskiyou County sales for the month of September amounted to \$46,594, as compared with \$34,876, for September a year ago.

Total E and H sales in Northern California for the first nine months of the year are \$78,775,249, as compared with \$70,975,119 for the first nine months of 1957, an increase of 11 per cent.

Correia said of this sales record, "These savings are the very heart of our system from which we derive so many material blessings. A healthy economy needs real capital which is created through both corporate and individual savings."
