Nation's Top Democrats Overjoyed By Victories

WASHINGTON (UPI) — To Democrats today should have been, and for the record were, delicious with joy.

Their party had won control of House and Senate by whopping majorities.

Solon's Mate Planning Suit

OKLEE, Minn. (AP) — The husband of Rep. Coya Knutson (D-Minn.) said early today he will sue Mrs. Knutson's executive secretary for alienation of affections and for slander.

Andy Knutson, hotelkeeper in this tiny northwestern Minnesota town, last summer made a widely publicized and futile plea for his congresswoman wife to give up politics and come home.

In it, he charged that Mrs. Knutson's youthful secretary, William Kjeldahl, 29, exercised "dictatorial powers" over her.

"Kjeldahl wrecked my home," Knutson said today in a statement he released to the press. "He interfered with my marital rights. He dominated my wife."

Knutson said suit would be filed today or Thursday in U.S. District Court in Washington for alienation of affections and for slander, asking \$100,000 of Kjeldahl on each count.

Knutson made his statement as his wife maintained an inconclusive lead over Odin Langen, Republican, for reelection from Minnesota's 9th Congressional District.

His statement said, however, he was speaking out "now that the election is over, and my wife, Coya Knutson, the beneficiary of my long silence, has tested the test of public opinion."

Rep. Knutson said she would not comment on her husband's statement.

MONTAGUE — The soil conservation engineers of the Shasta Valley Soil Conservation District have assisted Dwight Hammond of Weed with the design and construction of a combination drainage and irrigation pump. This ditch involved the moving of 7,200 cubic yards of earth. The ditch will lower the water table and permit roots to go deeper and permit planting of improved grasses and legume. The water from the drainage can then be used for irrigation.

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NY Governor Skyrocketed Into Top Candidate Slot

NEW YORK (AP) — Republican Nelson A. Rockefeller's election as governor by more than half a million votes skyrocketed

him today as a possibility for the 1960 GOP presidential nomination.

The multimillionaire's overwhelming triumph over wealthy Democratic Gov. Averell Harriman stood out particularly because of its contrast with Republican defeats in other states.

It also appeared to knock out whatever chance Harriman may have had for the Democratic presidential nomination two years hence. Harriman had sought the nod in 1952 and 1956.

The campaign spearheaded by Rockefeller also led to election of Democratic Rep. Kenneth B. Keating of Rochester as U.S. senator. Keating, regarded as an underdog throughout the campaign, de-

Demo Predicts Statehood

SEATTLE (AP) — Sen. Warren Magnuson (D-Wash.) Wednesday predicted that the Democratic congressional victories will expedite statehood for Hawaii.

"The complexion of the next congress is such that early committee action and early floor action can be expected in both the house and senate for Hawaiian statehood—long overdue," Magnuson said.

He noted that the Democratic controlled 85th Congress had approved statehood for Alaska, and said that Hawaiian statehood should come early in the 85th Congress.

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OHIO

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — A Democratic riotous engulfed U.S. Sen. John W. Bricker and other Republican office holders in Ohio's election.

The tide sunk GOP Gov. C. William O'Neill and the right-to-work issue on which he and Bricker campaigned for re-election.

Former Congressman Stephen M. Young, Cleveland Democrat, beat Bricker. Stunned Republicans had expected the veteran Ohio senator to win a third six-year term handily.

O'Neill conceded shortly after midnight to Democrat Michael V. DiSalle, former federal price administrator who lost to O'Neill two years ago. DiSalle will be Ohio's first governor to serve a four-year term. The present term is two years.

DiSalle and Young opposed the right-to-work proposal.

Mounting Democratic pluralities broke the Republican monopoly on other elective statehouse offices besides governor.

Incomplete returns showed that Democrats should cut the 17-6 Republican margin in Ohio's congressional delegation at least to 14-9.

Virginia — Sen. Harry F. Byrd (D) won reelection over the Independent campaign of Dr. Louise Wessel.

Washington — Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D) won reelection over Republican William B. Bantz.

West Virginia — Rep. Robert C. Byrd (D) unseated Sen. W. Chapman Revercome (R) for a full six-year term, and former Rep. Jennings Randolph (D) unseated Sen. John D. Hobbitt Jr. (R) for a two-year unexpired term.

Wisconsin — Sen. William Proxmire (D) reelected over Republican Roland J. Steinle, a former state Supreme Court justice.

Wyoming — Incumbent Sen. Frank A. Barrett (R) held a slender lead over Gale McGee (D).

IOWA

DES MOINES (AP) — Democrat Gov. Herschel Loveless, who campaigned on a "hold the line on taxes" platform, won reelection in traditionally Republican Iowa Tuesday.

With Loveless holding a steady lead of from 55 to 58 per cent of the vote, his Republican opponent, Iowa State College Prof. William G. Murray, conceded.

The unofficial returns indicate a strong Democratic tide in Iowa, which has been known for years as one of the Republican party's strongest bastions.

U. S. Rep. Merwin Coad, Iowa's only Democrat in Congress, was an easy winner over Republican Robert Waggoner.

Democrat Neal Smith defeated Rep. Paul Cunningham and two of Iowa's other five incumbent Republican congressmen were trailing their Democratic opponents. They were Representatives Falle and Jensen.

Not since the early 1930s has there been such a swing to the Democratic ranks by Iowa voters.

Loveless, who upset former Gov. Hoegh by a 29,000-vote margin two years ago, is only the third Democrat elected chief executive in Iowa since the turn of the century, and the second to win reelection.

During the pre-election campaigning, Gov. Loveless stressed his opposition to any increase in the state sales tax, and urged more government efficiency to effect economies.

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
