The program for the day was "Winter Care of Roses," presented by Mrs. Ferrell. Although roses are quite hardy, they do need some special care to help them live through the winter in this locality. During the autumn the bush should be thoroughly overhauled by cutting off any long shoots as these may be broken off by winter wind and the weight of snow. If the bush is left tall just the waving in the wind will loosen the soil around the roots and damage the plant. The soil around the base of the plant should be firm and no hollow left for water to collect and freeze. A block of ice around its foot cannot possibly be good for a rose. A mulch to the depth of six to eight inches around the rose will help protect it from constant freeze and thaws. It was pointed out that just a few precautions now will result in beautiful blooms next summer.

EVERGREEN GARDEN CLUB

The October meeting of the Evergreen Garden Club was held at the home of Mrs. Robert (Ruby) Luscombe, 3434 Laverne Avenue.

Fourteen members answered roll call by describing the beautiful autumn leaves seen this fall in the Klamath country. The descriptions of the beautiful red, gold and brown colors gave realization that autumn is truly here and that no other place is more beautiful than our own part of America.

Dried arrangements and winter bouquets were discussed. A number of members brought many different kinds of materials for winter arrangements including dock seed heads, teasel seed pods, grass, tulip and iris seed pods, autumn leaves, sage branches, Chi-

nese lantern pods, laurel leaves and straw flowers.

Hallie Miller spoke and demonstrated the use of various materials in making attractive arrangements. Materials may be cured for storing with sand, borax, boric acid or glycerin solution. Containers can be touched up with different colors of shoe polish to make them blend with arrangements.

One arrangement made combined dock, pine drops, brown laurel leaves and straw flowers in shades of red and gold, another combined gray green branches of sage with orange Chinese lantern seed pods in a gray container.

Simple attractive bases for arrangements may be carved by hand from slabs of wood or boards to make an arrangement more outstanding and attractive. Dried arrangements last longer, thus have an advantage over fresh flowers; they are more permanent, they can be made ahead of time for various uses and lines and colors can be changed with little effort. Attractive holiday arrangements may be made with the addition of fruits or nuts.

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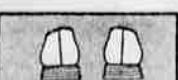
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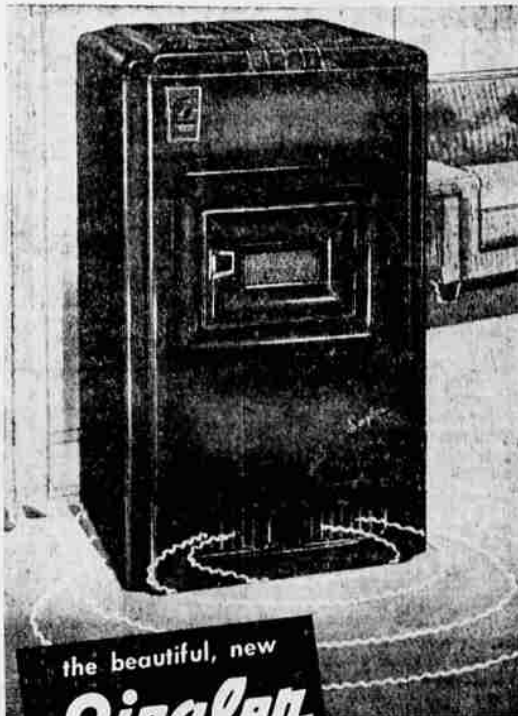
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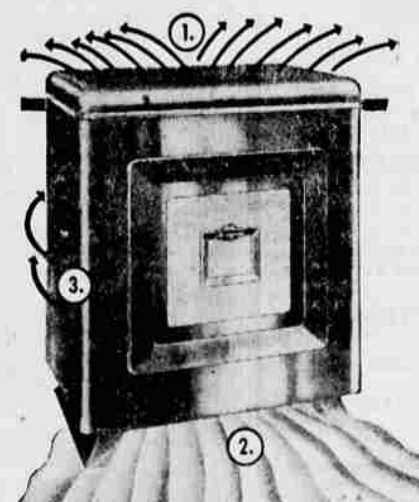
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
