Elk, Bird Hunters Luck To Be Spotty

Elk, upland bird and waterfowl hunters will have spotty success this weekend, depending on local conditions.

Here is a report of conditions for the major hunting areas in the state provided Wednesday by the Oregon Game Commission.

Northwest
Elk — Hunting is considered good in Clatsop County but individual hunters are not having good luck. Most of the animals have taken to dense thickets and touch hunting is in prospect for the rest of the season.

Waterfowl — Hunting is slow, more rains are needed. Gunning has slacked off in the Sauvie Island area.

Upland birds — Shooting is slow. A good dog is needed.

Southwest
Elk — Prospects should be fair to good in Douglas County for the rest of the season. Fair to good is the forecast in Coos and Curry counties. Best hunting will be in heavy cover and timber areas.

Waterfowl — Conditions are fair to good. Continued rain will improve the situation. Hunting is fair in Coquille Valley and Coos Bay areas, but poor in Jackson and Josephine counties until migrants arrive.

Upland birds — Pheasant cocks have come out of the brush and are seen regularly in the lower areas. There is an ample supply of valley quail.

Central
Waterfowl — Gunning is fair to good in the Klamath area. About 25 million ducks and 100,000 geese are in the lower Klamath.

Upland birds — Populations are abundant in the Columbia area and down through Central Oregon.

Southeast
Waterfowl — There are 100,000 geese and 20,000 ducks in the Warner Valley area. There are fair numbers in the Malheur shooting grounds.

Upland birds — Pheasant hunting in Malheur County remains very good. Chukars are wild and hard to get. Quail are found in all areas.

Tigers Hold Defense Lead

Florida's Gators gave Auburn's defense its toughest afternoon in two years last Saturday but the stalwart Tigers still have the best record among major college football teams in holding back the opposition.

The surprisingly strong Gators roamed for 249 yards (166 on the ground, 83 in the air) against the celebrated Auburn defense that had yielded an average of just 108.6 yards in 5 previous contests.

When the figuring was completed by the NCAA Service Bureau today, however, Auburn still was the leader in total defense average per game (132 yards) and rushing defense (63.7) and second in points yielded per game (27 in 6 for a 4.5 average).

Louisiana State's all-time winners, the No. 1 team in the nation, have given up but 4.1 points per game (29 in 7) in compiling their 7-0 record. Auburn's unbeaten, one-sided team, incidentally, nosed out Florida 6-5 despite the Gators' big yardage totals.

Iowa State, with a mediocre 3-4 record, became the new passing defense leader. The Cyclones have given up just 43.4 aerial yards a game. In addition, their alert pass defenders have intercepted almost half as many passes as have been completed against them (14 stolen, 31 completed, of 81 thrown).

Army's Cadets, the most passed against team in the country (25 times per game), have intercepted the most passes, 19.

Other leaders include: Punting—Alabama, 42.1 yards per kick; return of kickoffs—Virginia Military, 28.9 per kickoff; return of punts—Princeton, 20.8 yards per punt.

Johnny Busso Scores Win Over Brown

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Lightweight champion Joe Busso still holds his title but sixth-ranked Johnny Brown of New York put a blot on Brown's record with a scorching 10-round decision Wednesday night.

Busso, 125 underdog at fight time, won the non-title affair by a comfortable margin with a fine mixture of left jabs and hooks coupled with right crosses that kept Brown backing away.

Busso, who had been promised a chance at the title if he won this fight, was definitely in line for it. Brown has successfully defended his championship against Ralph Dupas and Kenny Lane and no other lightweight in sight could have put up a better fight than Busso.

Busso's trainer Chick Ferrera said the strategy was to keep Brown moving back.

"But the fight was won mostly on his (Busso's) terrific shape," the trainer added. "It would be the same story for 15 rounds—he would be in shape for it."

Low Cicca, Brown's manager, said a title fight with Busso wasn't in his plans "but I suppose now we will have to add him to the list."

The champion said his weight, a surprising 140½ to Busso's 139½, wasn't a factor in his defeat.

Brown opened a deep gash high on Busso's cheekbone in the fourth round and worked on that briefly but Busso came storming back to carry the attack to the champion. Brown stunned Busso in the eighth with a solid right to the jaw but the underdog fought back gamely and took the next round.

In the 10th Brown rallied to get the edge but Busso was well ahead in the opinion of Referee Cy Gottfried and both judges.

Russell Eases Celt Concern

One of the most sensational performances of Bill Russell's career today eased the Boston Celtics' concern over the possibility that playmaker Bob Cousy may be sidelined for two or three games.

Russell, 6-foot, 10-inch ex-San Francisco ace, connected for 28 points and grabbed 27 rebounds Wednesday night as the Celtics nipped the Syracuse Nationals, 117-115. The Nationals rallied in the final minute to tie the score but the Celtics won on Sam Jones' 17-foot jump shot with one second remaining.

Cousy suffered torn ligaments in his right leg just before half-time, did not return to action and said after the game that it was "50-50 whether I'll be able to play next Saturday or Sunday."

The New York Knickerbockers, meanwhile, remained in first place in the Eastern Division of the National Basketball Association when they beat the Cincinnati Royals, 108-97, for their third win in four games.

Boosters Laud Pelican Coach

A hearty vote of confidence was issued KU football coach Andy Knudsen by a large group of Klamath sports fans attending the regular weekly meeting of the Pelican Booster club in the Willard Hotel Wednesday night.

Knudsen, who added comments to the showing of the Pelican-Crater Comet game played on Modoc last week, noted "I have very little to say about last week's game. We had good blocking and tackling practices before the game—but during the game—nothing. We are breaking a rule this week in bringing up the freshmen, but we may be forced to use them."

The Pelicans meet Ashland Friday night in the last game of the season.

Also addressing the group, which was presided over by Estlin Kiger in the absence of club president Harry Malfore, was OTI athletic director Rex Hunsaker and KU basketball coach Dean White. White spoke briefly on the first few days of practice in his sport while Hunsaker predicted an OTI win over Moffett Naval Air Base, Saturday.

Leagues Consider Proposals

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — "The entire realignment plan depends upon the Texas League and the American Assn."

Baseball Coordinator Bill DeWitt volunteered this opinion today as the two circuits met jointly in an effort to arrive at some agreement which would advance either one or three double A Texas League clubs to the triple A American Assn.

The two leagues agreed Wednesday night to consider two proposals offered by DeWitt. If accepted, they could result in revamping the structure of anywhere from five to seven minor leagues.

Under DeWitt's first proposition, the Texas League would give up Houston, its largest city, to the American Assn. for a specified sum. In return, the Texas League would acquire the Amarillo, Tex., franchise from the class A Western League, which is considering dissolving.

Proposition No. 2 would switch Texas cities Dallas and Ft. Worth, along with Houston, to the AA in return for Albuquerque, N.M., and Amarillo along with another Western League franchise as yet not identified.

The reason for the two propositions is this: The American Assn., which has virtually decided to drop debt-ridden Louisville, has offered its Charleston, W.Va., club to the International League. The latter circuit, under DeWitt's reluctant program, would then incorporate Jacksonville of the South Atlantic League and expand to 10 teams. The Sally League is willing to let Jacksonville go.

The trouble with this scheme is that the International League does not want Charleston. It would agree to enlarge provided it could obtain Atlanta. The Southern Assn. is opposed to letting go its largest city. Sounds complicated!

All is not hopeless, however. Should Charleston remain in the American Assn., that circuit may consider expanding to 10 teams by adding Dallas and Fort Worth along with Houston, and dropping Louisville. It is understood then that the St. Louis Cardinals, which operate Houston as well as Omaha, Neb., of the AA, would sell the Houston franchise to the highest bidder.

What would the Texas League get out of it? Besides the three new cities, they would be guaranteed eight working agreements with major league clubs. Currently, only three of its clubs have such working agreements. According to a reliable source, the Texas League has been offered \$25,000 for each of the three clubs but is holding out for \$40,000 per club.

Winter Olympics Site Set

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Only a snow and wind storm of blizzard proportions can put the 1960 Winter Olympics at Squaw Valley out of business, Willy Schaeffler, director of ski events for the games, said today.

"Everything is moving along smoothly," said Schaeffler after a tour of inspection of the Squaw Valley facilities with F.I.S. technical delegate Heini Klopfer of Oberstdorf, Germany.

"We can see no reason for any complaints from any country," said Klopfer. "Most of the facilities that I've inspected here are just as good as, or better than, anything I've seen in previous Olympics."

Asked if there were any worries, Schaeffler said:

"The only thing we fear is the possibility of a blizzard. Such a tragedy might cause us to postpone the games for two or three days while we rebuilt the tail-end of the down-hill run. Other than that, everything is proceeding on schedule."

Klopfer, internationally famous ski-jump builder and architect for 140 jumps, said that his specifications had been followed to the letter for the jumps at Squaw Valley.

"This is a fine location," said Klopfer. "When I laid out the plans two and one-half years ago, I didn't expect such perfect cooperation. And I wasn't sure that there was enough time to complete the proper layout. But they missed my exact dimensions by only a inch and one-half."

"Only in America could they have completed this work so fast," Schaeffler pointed out that the three ski jumps all will come to the same landing slope — the only place in the world with such a perfect finish.

"Spectators will be able to see five of six finishes in the Alpine events," he pointed out.

Klopfer, after an unofficial inspection of the cross-country run, could see no reason for complaints from the Scandinavian countries there, either.

"The fact that they may have to get up at 5 a.m. to eat and get to the course may have something to do with the complaints," he said. "They certainly can't complain because the course is 12 miles from the Olympic Village. It is often farther in other Olympic Games."

The cross-country event has become so specialized that the coaches and other aides usually get out and test the snow, take the temperature, etc. They would have to get up around 3 a.m. That may be another reason for the complaint.

"But they can't beef about the altitude — because the games at St. Moritz and at Cortina were held at the same height. And the Russians broke seven world records at St. Moritz."

CONFERENCE RECORDS— Oregon Tech's Otis Foster will be seeing plenty of action Saturday night at Modoc Field when the Owls host Moffett Air Base in the final OTI home football game of the season. Foster set three conference records last Saturday by leading the Owls to a win over Oregon College. Foster, a 160-pound halfback, comes to OTI from Oceanside, California.

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Owls Host Moffett Fliers In Last Home Appearance

Oregon Tech's 1958 home football season comes to a close Saturday night at Modoc Field when coach Rex Hunsaker's Oregon Collegiate Conference champions host Moffett Naval Air Base.

The Owls, undefeated against college competition this fall, will be taking a 5-1 record up against what has been classified the best service team on the Pacific Coast. A short time ago, a San Francisco newspaper called Moffett's football team the "best service ball club on the coast."

Moffett has rolled to victories in six of seven games so far this year. Oregon Tech goes into the

two professional football contracts offered by the Green Bay Packers and Vancouver (B.C.) Lions. Besides these two offers, six other NFL teams have indicated an interest in Campbell's services.

Campbell isn't the only standout Moffett will have on the field against the Owls. At quarterback will be Dick Olivas, a short but sensational passer who was all-12th Naval District last fall. Olivas played a year of college football at Pasadena JC before entering the service. Paul Daugherty, a 6-6, 280-pound tackle, is expected to add to Moffett's line play. Daugherty is the fastest lineman on the squad.

Moffett may be going into the game without the services of its outstanding fullback, Dick Snyder, a 215-pound veteran who played three years at the U.S. Naval Academy and was two-year all-Navy selection. Snyder's jet plane caught fire a short while back and when he ejected himself from the crippled craft, he injured his right leg going through the canopy. Snyder suffered a badly cut knee and several pulled leg muscles. He has not donned a football uniform since the accident and is still a question mark for Saturday's game here.

Hunsaker's Owls will be seeking to roll up victory number five without a loss since bowing to Hamilton in the second game of the season. Tech has won in straight games against Portland State, Eastern Oregon, Southern Oregon and Oregon College. By winning against Moffett and Whittier College next Saturday at Whittier, the Owls would finish their best football season on record.

Bear Coach Fascinated By Galimore

CHICAGO (AP) — One of the most feared, game-breaking runners in the National Football League is the Chicago Bears' Willie Galimore.

At times he is so spectacular that even Papa Bear George Halas—who has seen them come and go for more than 35 years—is fascinated by the leggy, 190-pound halfback from Florida A&M.

Galimore's technique has been studied by Halas—and undoubtedly by other NFL coaches—on slow-motion films.

"He runs with a long-legged, flat-footed, reaching stride which gives him firm purchase with each step and enables him to twist and turn between strides to make him double elusive to potential tackles," Halas says.

"Of course he is very fast — he was a 9.6 track man in the 100-yard dash in college — but he always has speed in reserve. He uses this in sudden bursts to break away from defensive men who think they have him gauged for a tackle shot or trapped near the sidelines."

As a rookie last year, Galimore scored 42 points. With this season only at the halfway point, he has streaked to 10 touchdowns for 60 points. Seven of them have come on runs from scrimmage and three on pass catches.

Used only as a spot player, he has gained 358 yards in 56 carries for a 6.4 average and has added 148 more on 6 pass receptions.

Says the 23-year-old Galimore of his style: "When I see daylight, I turn on the gas. And the blocking and hole-opening of my teammates makes that daylight possible."

The Owl injury list seems to be lessening. Halfback Charlie "Go Go" Wilson should be back for limited action if not full duty by game time Saturday. An ankle injury and saw only brief first quarter play last weekend at Monmouth. End Dick Mahr and tackle Virgil Winters were hobbling earlier this week, but both should be ready for this weekend's home season finale.

Price Blocks Control Plan

CHICAGO (UPI) — Two million dollars appeared today the major obstacle in Charles Comiskey Jr.'s plans to buy out his sister, Dorothy, and thus gain full control of the Chicago White Sox.

Negotiations between the two already are under way, it was learned Wednesday.

Price seemed the chief stumbling block.

It was believed that Dorothy, Mrs. John D. Rigney, would want up to three million dollars for her half share. The figure was based on alleged offers of six million dollars for other major league franchises, some financially inferior to the White Sox.

Charles, it was understood, currently was offering Dorothy one million dollars.

Thus, two million dollars seemed the big difference between the pair.

It was not believed that Charles could meet Dorothy's price without first finding either wealthy backers or a mortgage source.

Negotiations for the sale have been going on sporadically for the past six months and, while a sale could be concluded, it was thought unlikely that it would occur within the next two months.

Ernie Broglio, Cardinals' iron man who went the distance for the team, fanned nine.
