

Employers Will Do Battle To Find Good Secretary

Anywhere in the world, a good secretary is hard to find. But when a girl qualifies as a top Girl Friday, the world is her oyster. Employers fight for her services. Big business underwrites prizes and trips for her. She is wine, dined, interviewed and admired.

Living proof that it pays to be a good secretary are six decorative and efficient young ladies from six different countries, each of whom was named "Miss International Secretary" in her own country and won a week's trip to New York. They are:

Miss Zulema Sullivan of Argentina; Emilia Branco de Faro, of Brazil; Marisa Salerno of Venezuela; Patricia Todd of England; Jacqueline Wolf of France; and Liesbeth Haegel of Germany.

During their week's round of theaters, night clubs and official appearances here, two of the girls

Emilia, 22, and Liesbeth, 29, paused long enough to discuss their work. Emilia earns \$79 a month in Rio de Janeiro, about the average secretarial pay. Liesbeth makes between \$80 and \$90 a month in Stuttgart, also average. Both girls live at home.

Liesbeth works from 7 a. m. to 4:45 p. m. with half an hour for lunch and a 15-minute coffee break in the morning. Emilia works from 8:15 to 5:30 and has an hour and a quarter for lunch. Emilia's boss is a Russian—an executive of an American firm in Rio. She also has worked for an American and a Brazilian in the same firm, says she:

"The American put his feet on the desk, but he is jolly, and efficient. The Russian is very considerate, polite and also efficient. The Brazilian is nice, but all confused."

Both girls say the most important quality in a boss is politeness and consideration. They agree that the first qualification of a good secretary is willingness and enthusiasm in her work.

Span Building Will Begin

OLYMPIA (AP) — Construction on a \$3,300,000 toll bridge across the Columbia River at Biggs Rapids near Maryhill is expected to start next year. W. A. Bugge, state highways director, disclosed Wednesday.

Plans call for completing the Interstate span by the summer of 1961. Bugge said Chicago financial consultant Paul Speer reported the project would be financially feasible. He said this report was made at a closed meeting Monday in Vancouver of Washington and Oregon highway officials and representatives of the Washington Toll Bridge Authority.

Bugge said the officials gave the go ahead for designing the bridge after receiving the report. He said this would take about six months. The feasibility study was based on a \$1 passenger car and driver toll and truck tolls of up to \$3.50. Issuance of bonds to finance the project was approved by the 1957 Legislature.

The agreement calls for construction and toll collection to be handled by Washington, Sherman County, Ore., will build the southern approach roads and Klickitat County, Wash., will take care of approach roads in the Washington side.

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—John Busch of Hollister, Calif., successfully defended his world cow milking title Wednesday during the Grand National Livestock Exposition at the Cow Palace.

Busch, using the "thumb-knuckles" method, squirreled seven pounds, six ounces of milk in two minutes. The "four fingers" method of his opponent, Greer H. Keur, Richmond, Vancouver Island, B.C., netted an even six pounds.

Each man milked two Ayrshire cows one minute each. Judges said the contest came as a surprise to both cows—who were used to machine milking.

Major U.S. Airline Firms Sign Mutual Aid Contract

WASHINGTON (AP) — Major U. S. airlines have signed a pact to share the financial burden of a strike affecting any of them.

One of the lines, Capital, has been hit by a 19-day strike of mechanics. Another, Eastern, faces a threat by its mechanics to strike at midnight.

Other lines signing the pact were American, Trans World, United and Pan American. They invited additional airlines to join.

The agreement calls for giving a strike-affected airline the extra net passenger and freight revenue realized by those carriers still operating. It will be filed today with the Civil Aeronautics Board. Airline officials said board approval was not required.

Eastern is locked in a contract dispute with the International Assn. of Machinists. The issues are the same as those in the strike at Capital.

Four other airlines—National Northeast, Northwest and TWA—have similar disputes but they face no immediate strike threats.

The Capital strike seemed on the way to settlement. The machinists union agreed to put the company's latest offer to a vote of the strikers. The work stoppage will continue pending the outcome of the vote Thursday or Friday.

Capital's offer calls for a 20-cent hourly pay boost now and an 8-cent increase next Oct. 1. Capital's top-rated mechanics now average \$2.54 an hour.

Half of the 30-cent raise would be retroactive. Capital's proposal also includes improved seniority, sick leave and holiday pay benefits, and new severance pay allowances.

The announced purpose of the mutual aid pact is "to counteract the effects of excessive labor demands which result in shutting down a vital segment of the nation's transportation system."
