First Of Kingsley Houses Goes To Sergeant, Family

An Air Force technical sergeant stepped up to a two-star general before a crowd of 150 persons Tuesday noon and accepted the keys to a new home.

With that simple ceremony, accompanied by very little oratory, the first of 200 family housing units was assigned to an Air Force family at Kingsley Field.

T.Sgt. Virgil Mast, a veteran of more than 17 years' service, accepted the keys to a low, ranch-style duplex at 830 A Street in the housing unit.

Beside him was his wife June, who placed her hand with his on the key board extended by Maj. Gen. Hugh A. Parker, Western Air Defense commander.

More than accepting the key for himself and his family of three daughters, T.Sgt. Mast represented the opening of a vast housing project to cost, at its completion, approximately \$4,785,000. It will accommodate 290 families of enlisted and commissioned personnel.

Col. Jack Williams, base com-

mander, said the opening of new housing units will bring about complete integration of the base's major purpose, operation of the 409th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron. Lack of housing, he said, delayed complete integration of the Air Force unit designed to have dramatic effectiveness in defense of the West Coast.

Colonel Williams introduced the speakers, General Parker and Klamath Falls Mayor Lawrence Slater, in the 10-minute ceremony conducted from a platform erected on a truck-trailer parked across the street in front of the new house.

A chill breeze ruffled bunting and brought upturned coat collars on the small crowd gathered in a semicircle before the stand. There was very little ceremony and the program was brief.

Each of the new homes will have automatic washers, garbage disposals and electric heating, Colonel Williams said, and most of them, including Sergeant Mast's, which was open for inspection, will have open fireplaces.

Sergeant Mast will not be the first airman to move into a new home, but his house was that chosen for the ceremony. Williams said the first homes would be occupied Thursday and Friday as the initial 56-home increment went into service.

The schedule for future home openings:

Second increment, 76 homes for enlisted personnel, December 15 to 20; third, 22 homes for officers, first of next year; fourth, 66 homes for officers, January; fifth, 70 homes for enlisted men, February or March. The schedule, Colonel Williams said, was tentative.

Major General Parker said he had been here in February and frankly was skeptical that construction contracts could be met. "Gresham (the contractor) and his people are to be congratulated on doing a very fine job," he said.

Mayor Slater, speaking for himself and a good many other city civic leaders in the small audience, said he was glad to be present to see "another segment of Kingsley Field put together."

Ten minutes after the program began, the crowd was invited to inspect Sgt. Mast's new home. One of the most enthusiastic investigators was General Parker, who carefully opened kitchen drawers and peered into the refrigerator and oven.
