Annual Breakfast Kicks Off Fund Drive For Boy Scouts

The annual Tulalake-Newell Boy Scout fund drive was kicked off Tuesday morning at a breakfast at the Sportsman's Hotel in Tulalake, attended by 30 persons. Objective of the drive is to enable the two communities to share in the support of the scouts' Modoc Area Council; comparable support from Klamath County is provided out of the United Fund drive held here. There is no goal set for the drive, which last year, under the chairmanship of Don Thomas, raised \$1,165. Chairman of the campaign this year is Clayton Rudesill, who has announced that he hopes one week will suffice to reach all prospective donors, who number over 300.
