Linemen Drawing Attention

NEW YORK (AP) — College linemen are finally receiving their due recognition in 1958.

A callover of All-America recommendations from the 12 Associated Press regional boards today showed many top teams credit linemen for their fine showing. Here are some candidates:

OKLAHOMA — Bob Harrison, center, rated by coach Bud Wilkinson as the most versatile man Oklahoma ever had at the position.

AIR FORCE ACADEMY — Brock Strom, tackle, the inspirational leader of this undefeated cinderella team.

PITT — John Guzik, a guard who is big and does everything he is supposed to do.

AUBURN — Zeke Smith, guard, and Jackie Burkett, center, key men in the No. 5 team's sturdy defense.

MONTANA — Stan Renning, a 205-pound guard who stands out despite his team's sorry record.

LSU — Max Fugler, center on the No. 1 team.

SOUTHERN METHODIST — Tom Koenig, guard, and a great all-around lineman.

OREGON STATE — Ted Bates, a tackle, who has been outstanding.

ARMY — Bob Novogratz, a tackle, who did much to stop Pitt.

VIRGINIA TECH — Carroll Dale, an end, who has been tops in the Southern Conference for three years.

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA — Martin McKeever, an end who has been great even in his team's losses.

MICHIGAN STATE — Sam Williams, another powerful end on a losing team.

The Associated Press All-America will be announced Dec. 4 and is based on the recommendations of the regional boards taking into account all of the regular season games through the Army-Navy game of Nov. 29.

Lions Hold Browns Jinx

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Detroit Lions have always been a thorn in the side of the Cleveland Browns.

Going into Sunday's game at Municipal Stadium the Browns have never won a regular season contest from the Lions. In four championship games the Browns were victorious only once, in 1954.

Who can forget that 54-14 pasting the Lions handed the Browns in last year's National Football League championship game?

On the wall of the Cleveland dressing room at the league park practice field is a clipping describing the Lions' runaway championship victory. Specially marked is a paragraph quoting Joe Schmidt, Lions linebacker and captain, which says:

"Cleveland isn't a hard team any more. They're not as tough as they used to be when they had (Otto) Graham and some of those guys."

A big, black pencil mark underlines Schmidt's concluding sentence:

"They don't hit as hard."

Everything considered, no coach can predict just how good or bad his team may be until he sees them in competition a few times.

As White says, "We'll play every game."

And, I might add, I haven't canceled my reservations in Eugene this coming March.

Coach Andy Knudsen's decision to bring freshmen up to the Pelican varsity grid roster was a distasteful one so far as Andy is concerned . . . but a necessary one. In face of the more than numerous injuries that have beset the Pels all during the season, he had little choice. Regardless of prior wins or losses the KU mentors owe it to themselves and their team to field the best possible squad for every game that they play . . . and that is exactly what Knudsen is trying to do.

Past experiences of Knudsen and other coaches show that many times a freshman brought along too quickly is damaged . . . not physically, but things happen to his attitude, occasionally. If this can be avoided both player and coach are better off.

Yet, we feel sure that no one wants the Pelicans to put less than their best foot forward any time.

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Willamette Eyes Crown

The Willamette Bearcats, the No. 3 small college team in the nation, are heavy favorites to win the Northwest Conference football title Saturday.

The Bearcats, ranked No. 2 nationally by the NAIA, will play their last conference game of the season Saturday against Lewis and Clark in Portland.

Lewis and Clark has a fine passer in young Royce McDaniel, a sophomore from Sweet Home. But Willamette has a big, fast line and a superb backfield topped by Stan Solomon, ranked by many as the equal of any Pacific Coast Conference performer.

The only other conference team with even a chance to the Willamette is defending champion Linfield, which Saturday will play winless Pacific at McMinnville.

The other conference game will match College of Idaho and Whitman at Walla Walla.

Beavers To Test WSC '11

Oregon State's front running Beavers battle to counter the air attack of Washington State Saturday as the west's Rose Bowl race reaches the stretch.

The battle at Pullman tops the state while California's Bears, in second place, host the brother Bruins of UCLA and Southern California meets the Huskies of Washington at Los Angeles.

In the Pacific Coast Conference, Oregon State posts 4-1 including a victory over California, the Bears have 3-1, Washington State 4-2 and Southern California 3-2.

Oregon's Webbeets, not eligible for the Bowl because they played there last Jan. 1, entertain Stanford's Indians with Idaho again meeting a non-conference foe in Montana at Missoula. California's two major independents, San Jose and College of the Pacific, tangle at Stockton Saturday night in the COP homecoming.

Washington State banks its hopes for staying in the Rose Bowl race on the passing of reserve quarterback Dave Wilson. The regular thrower, Bobby Newman, has been out of action with a knee injury.

Oregon State, boasting a crew of fleet backs and a powerful fullback in Nub Beamer, hold the best statistical edge on the ground and the defenses last week stopped California's Joe Kapp as the Beavers' won 14-8.

UCLA gets its promising sophomore tailback Bill Kilmer back for service against California at Berkeley but even with him the Bruins rate as the underdogs. Kilmer was UCLA's leading ground gainer until suffering a cracked wrist against OSC on Oct. 4.

Southern California's Trojans slammed Stanford 29-6 last week but they could be surprised by a Washington team that won a 6-0 victory over favored Oregon. Stanford Coach Jack Currier rated the Trojans the best team the Indians faced this season with the exception of Rice.

San Jose State, the nation's No. 1 passing club statistically speaking, goes against COP after three straight victories. The Tigers of COP, with halfback Dick Bass still the nation's leading rusher, have dropped their last three.

\$105,000 FOR HORSE HARRISBURG, Pa. (UPI)—A six-owner syndicate headed by Stanley Dancer paid a record \$105,000 Thursday for Dancer Hanover, a yearling colt. The syndicate outbid the nearest competitor by \$4,000.

But there is one league game on the schedule Saturday—Eastern Oregon against Southern Oregon at Ashland.

EOC is winless in the conference this season, and probably will stay that way Saturday as SOC's Red Raiders are favored to win their homecoming game.

The conference's other three teams all will see action — but against non-league opposition.

Oregon Tech will stay at home in Klamath Falls to meet Moffett Air Force Base, Portland State will play Whitworth at Spokane and Oregon College of Education will play the University of British Columbia in Vancouver.

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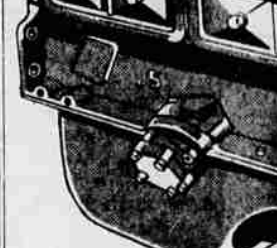
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College Gridders Seeking Bowl Bids In Weekend Play

The weekend's football activity begins tonight on a paradoxical note. If Saturday's activity follows the trend, it will end the same way.

Syracuse, an Eastern independent not picked to do much before the season, meets Boston University in another step up the ladder to a bowl bid. The Orange is ranked 12th in the Associated Press poll on the basis of its 5-1 record, and last week's 16-13 victory over Pitt.

Boston (3-3) has been up and down all year and faces the nation's seventh-ranked team in rushing defense and top-scoring outfit with 28.7 points per game.

Down South, Miami University, ranked 15th before the season, has won only once in five starts and has scored a meager 31 points. The Hurricane play a tough Florida State team (6-2).

Alabama, winner of its last two and 3-3 for the season, plays Tulane at New Orleans in a Southeastern Conference game to wind up the major activity tonight.

Saturday the fireworks begin in the Big Ten, while the rest of the conferences are comparatively quiet. There are a number of inter-sectional games.

The top game in the Big Ten pits fourth-ranked Northwestern against Wisconsin (No. 7). Dick Thornton and Ron Burton, who led the Wildcats to their 21-0 victory over Ohio State last week, will face a Wisconsin defense that has

allowed only 6.7 points a game in running up a 4-1-1 record. Northwestern is 5-1.

Iowa conceivably can take all the Big Ten marbles and a spot in the Rose Bowl if it defeats winless Minnesota, if Ohio State loses to Purdue and Wisconsin beats Northwestern.

Iowa, second-ranked, has a 4-0 conference record. The Gophers haven't won in nine games.

Top-ranked Army travels to the Southwest for the first time, to meet Rice (No. 13) in the top inter-sectional game. Halfback Pete Dawkins and fullback Harry Walters are both ready for offensive duties after injuries, bolstering the cadets' top-ranked offense.

The nation's top defensive team, Auburn (No. 5), has an SEC game with Mississippi State, which has lost two in a row but ranks 10th in total defense. Oklahoma (No. 6) has a Big Eight Conference date with Iowa State.

Ninth-ranked, Mississippi plays non-SEC member Houston, but the game is counted in the SEC standing since Ole Miss could not schedule the required minimum of five conference games.

The Air Force Academy (No. 10), with only a tie against five victories, plays Denver (2-5). Texas Christian (No. 11), winner of its last four, plays Marquette in an inter-sectional tilt, while Notre

Dame (No. 14) has an inter-sectional date with Pitt (4-2-1) in Pittsburgh. This game will be regionally televised in the East.

Jim Tatum goes after his 100th victory as a head coach when North Carolina (No. 15) plays Virginia in the day's only ACC game.

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
