

# Money Measure Okayers In Distinct Minority

Voters in a few Oregon taking districts okayed money measures on Tuesday's ballot. They were in a distinct minority, however, in the overall total of districts with such measures on the ballot.

The fate of those on the state ballot was the same as those on most local ballots.

Biggest one defeated was Portland's 10-year capital improvement levy which would have cost some \$3½ million dollars. Included in that package was \$3 million dollars for sewage disposal to

meet a state Sanitary Authority order to stop polluting the Willamette and Columbia rivers.

Ontario voters in contrast had a straight question of sewage disposal bonds of \$300,000 and they approved. They had a state-imposed deadline of 1959 to act. Portland voters may need to have a special election to comply with the Sanitary Authority's order.

Salem voters had a yes and no at the same time. They approved city bonds for an armory-auditorium but county bonds to pay a share on the same building lost.

The people of Turner approved a police department budget calling for expenditure of \$3,600.

And in a rural fire protection district near Orient, east of Portland, voters approved an increase in the tax base.

Most of the Oregon voters confronted with a question dealing with money said no, even on such matters as the self-liquidating veterans' loan bonds as well as on increased pay to legislators and on allowing taxes on increased values in urban renewal projects to pay for the projects.

And for the most part they did it with the same emphasis. Multnomah County voters gave to the question of a 7 million dollar bridge bond issue: nearly 4½ to 1 against.

Portland voters were only 2 to 1 against a money-making proposal of installing hydro-power facilities at the Bull Run water-works and selling the power. It would have taken \$5 million in bonds.

Other proposals rejected around the state: Lakeview—\$15,000 annual county levy for airport maintenance and operation.

Prineville—\$560,000 junior high bonds and levy to operate new county library.

La Grande—\$50,000 annual four-year county road program.

Hillsboro—\$300,000 annual levy for five years for county roads, \$14,500 annual levy for two years for county participation in Oregon Centennial; increased Hillsboro city tax base.

Springfield—3½ million in bonds to buy Pacific Power & Light Co. facilities and improve the municipal system.
