School District Trustees Slate Public Discussion

YREKA — A public discussion on another senior elementary school bond election will be conducted at the next regular meeting of the Yreka Elementary School District trustees, scheduled for November 18.

The trustees, in spite of having the school bond issue defeated at an election held earlier in the year, expressed the opinion that, with several public meetings and discussions on the subject, perhaps another election would be successful.

Dr. O. K. Kendal and John Turner, two members of the board of trustees, agreed that holding as many meetings as possible to gain public support, would be a step in the right direction.

District Superintendent Robert Reynolds stated that even if work were started immediately on the bond proposal, he did not think an election could be held before mid-January, since it was necessary

to give a 60-day advance notice to the county clerk.

The plans for the public meeting were discussed at the meeting of the board on Tuesday evening, November 4, at which time a delegation of 15 Mono residents, representing the Mono Community Club, appeared before the board, headed by their spokesman, Mrs. Beulah Ashbrook, who requested the trustees to consider allowing the club to use the Mono schoolhouse.

Mrs. Ashbrook stated that the club would furnish the labor to move the building to another site, agreed to by the forest service. According to an explanation by Reynolds, the present site on which the school is located is owned by another party, the land to revert to the original owners unless the school is moved within six months. He also said the district could not legally give the property away, but had to follow legal procedure.

Reynolds made the suggestion that the district retain title to the building in case there might be a need to open the school again, meanwhile it could be used as a community hall.

Upon a suggestion by Reynolds, the group agreed to appoint a three-man committee to represent the community club for any further discussions with the county superintendent of schools and the district attorney "to iron out legal details."

Other action taken by the board at Tuesday's meeting was an agreement by the board to contribute \$160 to pay a Chico State College instructor for a four-month course in curriculum construction for local elementary school teachers.

TOKYO (UPI) — Peiping crowed Saturday over the defeat of U.S. Senate minority leader William F. Knowland in the race for the California governorship this week.

Knowland's loss, the Communist New China News Agency said, "signified the American people's strong opposition to the U.S. rulers' hostile policy toward the Chinese people."
