California leads the hectic race to determine Iowa's Rose Bowl opponent but three other clubs still are in the running as Pacific Coast Conference football nears its final wire.

Coach Pete Elliott's Bears, with a big assist from Washington State, took the lead Saturday with a 20-17 victory over UCLA but still have to get by Washington and Stanford.

Washington State's Cougars bounced Oregon State out of the top spot and kept themselves in the race with a 7-0 victory on a fourth quarter touchdown.

Southern California whipped Washington 21-6, Oregon shut out Stanford 12-0 and Idaho went out of the loop again to win from Montana 14-6 in the other weekend games.

California travels to Seattle to meet Washington this Saturday while Oregon State visits Stanford. Washington State plays independent College of the Pacific at Stockton, Calif., and Southern Cal takes an open date.

The other PCC game matches Oregon against UCLA at Los Angeles, a contest with no Rose Bowl bearing. Idaho completes its 1953 schedule, meeting Utah State at Moscow.

UCLA threw continuous scares into California after taking an early 3-0 lead. The Bears finally turned the tide with a 59-yard touchdown drive late in the second quarter, sophomore fullback Walt Arnold scoring from the one and quarterback Joe Kapp throwing a two-point conversion pass to Jack Hart.

Left halfback Grover Garvin contributed runs of 25 and 10 yards to the advance and later paced the final touchdown march in his first game as a starter.

Washington State missed a pair of opportunities but finally cashed in to beat the Oregon State club that only the week before had dined California.

Sophomore halfback Ted Cano circled left end for 11 yards for a first down on the Oregon State 14. After a roughness penalty moved the Cougars to the one, Cano plunged over.

Southern California's running attack, paced by reserve quarterback Tom Maudlin and 154-pound seatback Don Buford, brought the Trojans their third straight victory.

USC marched 74 yards to a touchdown on Washington's opening kickoff with Maudlin gaining 33 on a rollout. The Trojans drove 72 yards to score in the second period and added another in the third before the Huskies tallied.

Oregon staged long marches in the third and fourth quarters, beating Stanford on a rain-soaked field. Quarterback Dave Groz bucked two yards for the first score, capping a 64-yard drive. Stanford then reached the Webfoots' 16 but lost the ball on a fumble, recovered by Oregon's Jim Linden.

The home club promptly moved 84 yards in 16 plays with fullback Marlin Holland scoring from the one.

Idaho capitalized on a first quarter pass interception that set up quarterback Gary Farnsworth's nine-yard touchdown run. He then threw a two-point conversion pass to Wade Patterson as the Vandals beat Montana.

In a meeting between California's two major independents, Dick Bass gained 226 yards while leading College of the Pacific to a 26-13 victory over San Jose State.

Oregon Collegiate Conference football play ended Saturday night.

Oregon Tech, which won the title a week earlier, rolled 53-12 over non-league Moffett Naval Air Station of California. The three touchdowns of Allen Leach and two by Earl Green sparked the victory. The Owls have a 4-0 conference record.

In the only conference game, Southern Oregon came from behind and nipped Eastern Oregon 19-12.

The Red Raiders recovered a fourth quarter Eastern Oregon fumble, then drove 37 yards to score. Eldon Francis plunged over from the two.

Eastern Oregon scored first, then Southern Oregon tied it as Lance Locke went over after the team moved into scoring position on a pass from Francis to Larry Yarnell.

Southern Oregon scored again as Del Brood plunged over from the one, but Eastern tied it on John Hook's 36-yard pass to Ray Aliverti.

Both Oregon College of Education and Portland State stepped outside the conference and got beat. OCE was trampled 47-26 by the University of British Columbia and Portland State was belted 26-6 by Whitworth College.

UBC's fleet halfback, Don Vassos, scored three touchdowns. He sprinted 35 yards around end for the first, caught a 41-yard pass for the second and streaked seven yards for the third.

Portland State jumped into an early lead against Whitworth as Bill Turner plunged four yards off tackle. But Whitworth regained the lead on a 72-yard pass and run play. From then on it was Whitworth's game.

Though league play is finished, the conference's five teams all will play non-counting games next Saturday.

Albert Says LA Best Club

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The Los Angeles Rams, in sole possession of third place in the Western Conference of the NFL, refused today to look beyond their next game although San Francisco coach Frankie Albert said he didn't know who could beat them.

Albert's statement came after the Rams defeated the Forty-Niners, 56-7, in the worst beating ever suffered by the San Francisco club from its California rival.

"They're the best club we've played all year and they've got a chance to win it all," Albert said. "I told Sid Gillman we'd try to beat Baltimore to help the Rams along."

ONE AT A TIME

Gillman, happier than he has been in a long time, refused to look beyond next Sunday's Green Bay game and warned his players if they started dreaming of possible championship aspirations they would get "clobbered."

A crowd of 95,082 in Memorial Coliseum saw the Rams score on their second offensive play and then easily draw out to a 5-0 halftime lead.

Gillman paid tribute to his defensive unit for what he termed "a great performance."

"While our defense has been real good all year, our boys outplayed their best previous effort this time," Gillman said. "San Francisco had what I considered the best five-man and combination in pro football."

Although he lavished praise on all his players, Gillman had added words for defense back Willie Sherman and offensive end Dale Shofner. He revealed Sherman was so crippled with a leg injury that it appeared doubtful if he would play at all.

Two intercepted passes, however, intercepted two passes and ran one of them back 70 yards for a touchdown. Shofner pulled in passes good for 64 and 72-yard scoring plays, punctuated the Forty-Niners into the hole repeatedly and outplayed the San Francisco ends all afternoon.

Bill Sade, having one of his best days at quarterback threw four touchdowns passes and ran for another score himself on a 17-yard keep play.

For the Forty-Niners Joe "The Jet" Perry was the only back able to mount a running threat against the Rams and he scored their only touchdown on a screen pass good for 6 yards.

The Forty-Niners opened with John Brodie at quarterback but he had such poor success in the first quarter when the Rams ran up three touchdowns that Y. A. Tittle replaced him and played most of the game. Aside from engineering the one scoring drive of 9 yards, Tittle also had the Ram defenders breathing down his neck all day.

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24 Schools Still Perfect

NEW YORK (UPI) — The college football season heads into its final weeks with only 24 teams, major and minor, still boasting unbeaten and untied records.

Louisiana State and Rutgers top the list as the only major perfect record teams in the land. LSU whipped Duke, 50-18, Saturday while Rutgers downed Lafayette, 18-0. Each has two games remaining on its schedule.

Four colleges have already completed their seasons unblemished — Kearney (Neb.), Wheaton (Ill.), Chadron (Neb.) Teachers and Miles (Ala.).

The perfect record teams: Nine victories — Kearney (Neb.), St. Benedict's (Kan.), Northeastern (Okla.), Arizona (Flagstaff) State. Eight victories — Wheaton (Ill.), Willamette (Ore.), Gustavus Adolphus (Minn.), Louisiana State, Coe (Iowa).

Seven victories — Rose Poly (Ind.), Sewanee (Tenn.), Rutgers (N. J.), Chadron (Neb.) Teachers, Rochester (N. Y.), California (Pa.) Teachers, Mississippi Southern.

Six victories — Missouri Valley College.

Five victories — Florida A&M, Miles (Ala.).

Blame it on the New York Giants. They're solely responsible for the scrambled title races in the National Football League.

Baltimore and Cleveland were streaking uncontested toward division crowns until the Giants changed the championship picture.

They said it couldn't be done. But Sunday the Giants notched their second consecutive victory over a previously undefeated team. This time Baltimore's high-flying Colts felt the sting, as on a 58-yard march culminated

by a 25-yard touchdown toss to Kyle Rote to tie it. Frank Gifford's 13-yard end sweep put the Giants ahead 21-14. But George Shaw, replacement for the injured Johnny Unitas completed his second and again knotted the score. Then Summerall put the finishing touches on the upset.

New York's twin victories earned them a tie for first place in the Eastern Conference with Cleveland. The Browns were thumped 30-10 by Detroit. The leaders have 5-2 records.

The Colts' loss brought new hope in the Western Conference race to the second-place Chicago Bears, 24-10 conquerors of Green Bay. Baltimore, now 6-1, holds a one game lead over the runner-up Bears, 5-2.

In other games before a probable record turnout of 342,734 fans, Los Angeles took undisputed possession of third place in the western sector with a 56-7 drubbing of San Francisco; Eddie LeBaron passed for five touchdowns as Washington outscored Chicago's Cardinals 45-31, and Bobby Layne pitched four TDs as Pittsburgh defeated Philadelphia 31-24.

The largest crowd to watch a professional football game in New York — 71,163 — cheered as the Giants won it on Pat Summerall's 28-yard field goal with only 2 minutes 20 seconds remaining.

Top 10 Horses Ready For DC International

LAUREL, Md. (AP) — The hard training completed, ten horses are set to fight it out Tuesday in what many believe will be the greatest international race in thoroughbred history.

Ballymoss, Europe's horse of the year, remained the 8 to 5 favorite in the invitational \$100,000 Washington D.C. International.

However, the Irish-bred 4-year-old, owned by John McShain, Philadelphia builder, must overcome a big jinx. No favorite has gotten to the winner's circle in six previous runnings of the mile and one half grass course classic.

Many turf observers rate Ballymoss the finest horse ever to come to the United States to race. It will be his last, since he goes to the stud in England under a \$700,000 syndication.

From Australia to challenge Ballymoss is that country's handi-cap star, Sailor's Guide. He is the best horse to come from down under since Phar Lap a quarter century ago. He is owned by A.C. Dobb and his son, Keith of Melbourne.

The two top 3-year-olds in Russia, Garmir and Zaryad, are the first to run in this country. They were 1-2 in the Moscow Derby.

Mrs. Adele L. Rand's Clem, who whipped Round Table in three straight \$100,000 races, and Mrs. Herbert Herff's Tudor Era represent the United States. Tudor Era, an English-bred, won the Laurel Turf Cup Nov. 1.

Orsini II is perhaps the best German colt sent here by Baron Henry Thyssen. He had Niederlander in 1952, Ataturk in 1955, and Nisos last year.

Alfredo Lechin's Escribano represents Venezuela. Dr. Erwin Wasserman's Revouque is here from Argentina, and another Irish colt, Tharp, is owned by Carlton H. Palmer of New York.

All of the horses were on the track for final brief canters, or short speed "blow outs" this morning.

Eight of the owners are here to see the race. The Russian colts are state owned, and Yevgeni Nikolaevich Dolmatov, former Russian cavalry officer, is listed as their proprietor. If a Russian wins, the director of racing at Moscow's Hippodrome will be in the winner's circle to collect \$70,000 in capitalistic currency.

'Evey' Warns Iowa Gridders
IOWA CITY, Iowa (UPI)—Iowa coach Forest Evashevski attempted to hold down Hawkeye Rose Bowl elation today, warning that Iowa still has some "tough ones" ahead.

Evashevski said Iowa's coming game with Ohio State would be anything but easy. He praised Ohio State's backs, especially Bob White.

"White sometimes runs like he hasn't got enough sense to stop in a play where it looks like he'll surely be halted," Evashevski said. "He just keeps on going — and often gets through."

Meanwhile, despite Evashevski's sombering tones, the town rolled out the celebration carpet for the victorious Hawkeyes.

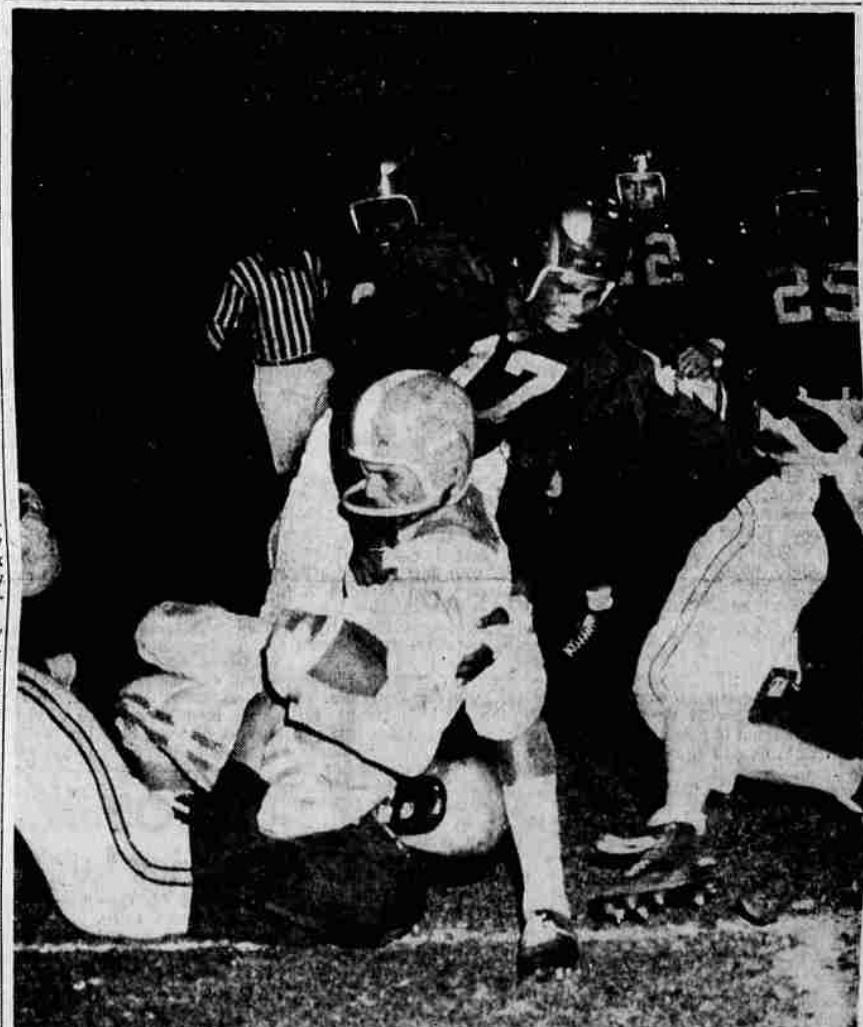
