Solly Credits Japanese Ball

TOKYO (UPI)—Manager Solly Hemus of the St. Louis Cardinals thinks that Japanese professional ball teams are good enough to play in American "Triple A" leagues.

Hemus' estimate was made during a lull in the Redbirds' exhibitions with the Japanese All Stars. The major leaguers have posted nine wins and two losses thus far.

Walt Alston, manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers, who won 14 games and lost four in 1956 on a Japanese tour, was a bit more enthusiastic about Japanese ball players.

Alston said he rated the all-Japan teams the Dodgers played "a little better than American triple 'A' teams."

But Hemus has gone a bit farther than Alston by stating that in \$5000 bonus player Shigeo Nagashima of the Yomiuri Giants, Japan has a player right now who is capable of making the majors.

Japanese baseball commentators have said that the Cardinals have beaten the All-Stars repeatedly because of "better legs" and constant heads up baseball. Where the Cardinal players run out flies and grounders at top speed the Japanese players are apt to jog down to first on grounders and flies that appear to be easy outs.

Willamette Grabs Title In NW Loop

Willamette added an eighth straight victory to its unbeaten string Saturday night and the Bearcats thus were assured of the Northwest Conference football title.

The Bearcats, featuring a split-T attack engineered by quarterback Keith Driver, thumped Lewis and Clark 27-0.

Driver plunged one yard for one touchdown, then pitched out to Ken Sarver who sprinted 32 yards for another. Fullback Larry Miller lunged across twice from one yard out after the Bearcats drove more than 70 yards.

The unbeaten record of the Bearcats, who ranked No. 3 among the nation's small colleges last week, includes five conference games.

Elsewhere in the conference Saturday night Pacific tied Linfield 7-7 and Whitman defeated College of Idaho 26-7.

Pacific's Jack McConnell intercepted a Linfield pass and raced 21 yards to score. Bob Dixon kicked the extra point.

Then Linfield fullback Sel Spray capped a 75-yard scoring drive when he plunged across from one yard out. Gene Manley booted the tying conversion.

At another point Jack Hehring of the Pacific Badgers broke loose for 66 yards. He finally was halted on the Linfield 12. The threat evaporated four plays later when Linfield knocked down a Pacific pass in the end zone.

Archers Honor Campbell

MONTAGUE — Word has just been received here that Dean Campbell was acclaimed the "Archer of the Month" at a meeting of the Cascade Bowhunters, held at Red Bluff in October.

The Cascade Bowhunters, which consists of representatives from seven Western states, announced that the choice of Campbell for the honor was attributed to his achievement in promoting an interest in the field of archery, and being responsible for the successful establishment of the Siskiyou Bowmen of Yreka, a fast growing club, which has a large family membership, with husbands, wives and children, all sharing in the exciting sport of archery.

Campbell, a native of Klamath Falls, came to Montague with his family 10 years ago and found only two other archers, who, at that time, devoted their interest to occasionally hunting predators and small game. It was but a few months until the Siskiyou Bowmen was an established organization, with Campbell at the helm, and through his tireless efforts a program of tournament, practice and hunting was set up.

He holds high score for the Northern California Field Championship, as well as having been awarded the National Field Archery Small Game Award. He also has a record of eight legal bucks taken with the bow in the past eight years.

Dean, his wife, Katy, and two sons, 11 and 8, are all actively interested in archery, and Dennis, the 11-year-old, is working toward earning his small game award. He received his first medal in archery when he was 8, at a Klamath Falls tournament.

Cadets' Offense Said Tops

HOUSTON (AP) — The man who coached Texas A&M to the national championship in 1956 says Army's 1958 offense is the best he's seen in modern day football.

"That lonely end, the slot man, the unbalanced line each way, and men in motion — what else do you expect to see?" said Homer Norton. The former Aggie coach now in the motel business.

Norton penned his views on Army's last-minute 14-7 victory over Rice Saturday in a column published in several Texas newspapers.

"That offense my good friend Earl Blaik threw at Rice was by far the best I've seen in modern day football," Norton proclaimed.

Norton says he thinks he's found the secret for the lonesome end and he thinks it's a misnomer.

"He (Bilik Carpenter) should be called the busiest end in college football. He's a great pass receiver, he's a great decoy."

Carpenter hauled in six passes for 71 yards, including a scoring 8-yarder.

Rice Coach Jess Neely said: "We didn't cover Carpenter very well when they took the ball down the field for that first touchdown."

Neely said, "Except for that, I thought we defended him all right." The Owls had either a deep halfback or a fullback-tackle guarding the wingman at all times.

Rice bottled up the swift Army's halfback combination of Pete Dawkins and Bob Anderson, holding them to a combined rushing net of less than 20 yards.

However, the Cadets connected on 12 out of 22 passing attempts for 201 yards and both touchdowns, including Dawkins' sensational 64-yard catch-and-gallop of quarterback Joe Caldwell's pass with less than a minute to go.

Asked about all the publicity on the lonesome angle, Carpenter said, "It's getting a little old. Sometimes I just get a little tired of all the talk. But I think it has about worn itself out."

Fans Flock To NFL Tilts

Professional football probably had its greatest turnout of fans Sunday with six games reporting a total attendance of 342,734.

The figures exceeded the previous Sunday's 328,431. That day NFL Commissioner Bert Bell reported a paid attendance in excess of 291,000 for a single day high. No figures were available on Sunday's paid attendance.

The largest crowd Sunday was at Los Angeles where 95,082 saw the Rams defeat San Francisco.

Detroit and the Browns played before 75,563 at Cleveland. And a record New York crowd of 71,163 was at Yankee Stadium for the Giants-Colts game.

USC Offers Huskies Luck

SEATTLE (AP) — The Washington Huskies came home with another defeat on their record but they brought with them the wishes for good luck in their last home game Saturday with California.

As USC was clobbering UW 21-6 Saturday, the Los Angeles students got into the act with their colored cards that read:

"Good Luck, Huskies. Beat Those Dirty Bears."

That a Washington victory over Cal would be the upset of the current Pacific Coast Conference season is putting it mildly. The Bears are on top with four won and one lost while the Huskies tally reads four lost and one won.

But if they do it, the conference race would be in a state of confusion since it could conceivably put Cal, WSC, OSC and USC into a four-way tie for the top spot.

LSU, Iowa In National Grid Title Scrap; Others Eye Bowls

Louisiana State or Iowa for the national championship, and almost a score of teams to pick from for nine remaining bowl berths.

That's the way things look today in major college football after a weekend that saw unbeaten and top-ranked LSU smash Duke, second-ranked Iowa collect the Big Ten title and Rose Bowl trip, Pitt and Georgia Tech return to bowl consideration, and Washington State snafu the Pacific Coast Conference race to the Rose Bowl.

With the Cotton, Sugar, Orange and Gator Bowls still looking for two teams and the Rose Bowl looking for one, no less than 17 clubs are looking pretty.

There are, in addition such possibilities as Oklahoma, Missouri, Texas Christian, Rice, Southern Methodist, Mississippi, Clemson, North Carolina, California, Oregon State, Syracuse, Air Force and Rutgers.

LSU, now 8-0, couldn't help but pick up backers for the national title, decided by the final Associated Press poll, after whipping Duke 50-18. It was the highest total in 21 years for the Tigers, who get back to the business of winning the Southeastern Conference title and a shot at the Sugar Bowl against Mississippi State this week end.

Auburn, still second in the SEC after beating Mississippi State 33-14, is on NCAA probation and can't be considered for a bowl.

Auburn, in the running for a repeat national crown, plays Georgia after padding its once-tied but unbeaten string to 20.

Mississippi, which plastered Houston 56-7, is third in the SEC and plays Tennessee. Old Miss could be a bowl pick without winning the SEC. So could Georgia Tech, now 5-2-1 after dampening Clemson's hopes a big 13-0. Tech plays Alabama next.

Clemson, the Atlantic Coast Conference leader, returns to league play against North Carolina State. North Carolina, second in the ACC and riding a six-game streak after thumping Virginia 42-0, makes its big bid against Notre Dame—a club the Tarheels haven't beaten in eight tries.

Notre Dame also figures in Iowa's plans. The Hawkeyes won the Big Ten by beating Minnesota 28-6, now shoot for the national title against Ohio State and Notre Dame.

The Irish, headed neither for a bowl nor the national title, were handed a third defeat, 29-26 by Pitt. That brought the Panthers, beaten by Michigan State and Syracuse and tied by Army, out

of hiding with a chance to make a bowl with only Nebraska and Penn State left.

Syracuse, a sure bet for a bowl, is 6-1 after whipping Boston University 42-0 and has only Colgate and West Virginia remaining.

Army, third ranked in last week's poll, beat the heat and Rice 14-7. The Cadets now have a breather against Villanova before the Navy game. Navy shrugged off that 40-20 defeat last week by Notre Dame and clobbered Maryland 40-14.

Rice, tied with TCU for the Southwest Conference lead, lost no prestige in that loss to Army. The Cadets won it on a long pass in the final minute of a tough battle. Rice plays Texas A&M this weekend, then plays TCU in what should be the showdown for the Southwest title and Cotton Bowl berth.

TCU meets Texas after beaating Marquette 36-8. SMU elbowed into the title fight by creaming A&M 33-0. The Mustangs play Arkansas next.

Anthony, Ray Clash In 'Featured' Match

NEW YORK (UPI)—A pair of boxing mystery men attempt to floor each other into limbo at Madison Square Garden on Friday night and the press row should be opened only to psychiatrists and whodunit authors.

The principals are Tony Anthony, a young gentleman with all the fistic ability in the universe who for some reason always blows the big ones. His opponent is a man named Sonny Ray.

Cranial investigators could have a field day with Anthony and certainly there never has been a deeper man of mystery in fiction than young Mr. Ray as he steps into a main spot at the Garden.

The 23-year-old Anthony has been a "can't miss" potential champion for several years now. A tall, powerful light heavyweight can outbox a dozen orange packers and hits with the authority of a Colt .45. He has won six contests in a row and en route pulled the curtains on such as Yvon Durelle and Archie McBride.

KAYOED FIVE TIMES
But Tony also has lost five fights—all by knockouts. This would tend to indicate to those with a medical bent that he is at least, allergic to a punch on the jaw. And they come usually in his "must win" fights.

Like the night he went in against Archie Moore for the light heavyweight title, Tony was boxing magnificently and through the first six rounds, even Archie ranked among his admirers.

"You're boxing just like you're gonna be the light heavyweight champion," Archie told him in one clinch in the sixth.

In the seventh, Archie knocked him out.

"He told me I looked like I was going to be the champion," Anthony later said disconsolately.

"But he didn't say when." So Tony had to start to climb all over again, and now is getting well set for another title bid, which brings him, and us, to Ray.

NATIVE OF TENNESSEE
Diligent research has unearthed the fact that Sonny is 22, was born in Tennessee, fights out of Chicago and by hobby is a quail hunter. There was a question whether he might be related to a heavyweight named Elmer (Violent) Ray of a decade ago.

"Heavens, no," was the answer, which caused many a fistic aficionado to draw a deep sigh of relief.

Sonny also is the spoiler who knocked the props out from under a highly-regarded light heavyweight named Jesse Bowdry. Seems that in trying to build Bowdry up for a title shot they found on his early record that he had lost to Sonny. The formula is to have your man "erase" any such defeats. It was a mistake, Sonny knocked him out again.

It recalls a story about Jimmy Webb, a light heavyweight of a few years back, who tuned up for a title fight by trying to "erase" a previous defeat against an unknown named Mose Brown. In the rematch, Brown knocked him out again. Webb still was not convinced, and went in against Brown a third time. Brown flattened him a third time.

That was the end of the Webb-Brown matches. It also was the end of Webb as a title threat. Which shouldn't happen here. But with Anthony — and an unknown like this — you never can tell.
