The conference was called by Gov. Robert Holmes and was attended by Arnold Gralapp, superintendent of city schools; Mrs. Lucile O'Neill, former state board member; Mrs. Walter Brown, Federation of Women's Clubs; Claudia Moore, Parents and Teachers Association; Carol Howe, county superintendent of schools; George Elliott, Henley principal, and Winston Purvine, director of Oregon Tech.

Dr. Rex Putnam, newly reelected as superintendent of public instruction, outlined the purpose of the conference at the opening session at 9 a.m. Thursday, November 6. Highlight of the conference was a Thursday night banquet address by Dr. James B. Conant, president emeritus of Harvard University and former U.S. ambassador to West Germany.

Dr. Conant has just completed a two year study of the American high school and shared a portion of his report with the assembled educators and lay people.

Dr. Conant also addressed the state school board members who were holding a two-day conference at Eugene last week.

Arnold Gralapp, reporting on the conference, stated that he felt the conference would be followed by a further call in organizational work by the State Department.

### Klan Cross Placed In Yard Of Negro Board Member

HOUSTON (AP) — A cross burned Monday night in the front yard of Mrs. Charles White, who was elected the first Negro member of the Houston School Board last week.

Three of her five children noticed the flaming cross about 9 p.m. Her husband, an optometrist, quickly extinguished the blaze. He said the cross was about five feet tall.

Mrs. White said she did not think the cross burning reflected the general feeling of the Houston public.

"I feel that the persons who did this are ashamed of their act as they did not show themselves," she said.

"I am ashamed that there are persons who would desecrate a cross in such a way."

The Houston School Board received a petition to recheck results of the election earlier Monday evening. Mrs. White polled about 38,000 votes, approximately 8,000 more than her nearest opponent, incumbent John Glen.

The request forced the school board to delay formal approval of the election results. School attorneys said the board had no right to refuse the recheck.

George Polk, judge of Precinct 56 and one of the signers of the petition, claimed that many of the voting machines were not operating properly.

"One of the keys—the ones for Mrs. White—would pull down every time the voter would pull the lever to vote the straight Democratic ticket," Polk said.

"Since the election ended, I have had numerous voters from other precincts complain that Mrs. White had gotten votes that way."

Louis Buchner, superintendent of the voting machine department for Harris County, denied that many of the machines were not working properly. He said a defective mechanism on one machine was fixed as soon as it was reported.
