Insurance problems came to the front when A. B. Epperson, 130 North First Street, protested phases of the city's program of having two brokers handle the city's insurance with premiums being divided among insurance men of the city.

Epperson protested he received only \$118 last year while each of the city's insurance brokers received \$385. Mayor Slater pointed out that the brokers had worked for their share since they had handled all the city's insurance problems, but that Epperson had received his share as part of the distribution program.

Epperson said he was speaking of the Carlson Products insurance. Mayor Slater pointed out that while the city rented the Carlson Products building, it was up to Carlson Products to provide their own insurance, and that they had done so at their own expense.

In other council action, the group agreed to pay \$25 per month for the next five months toward the cost of utilities for the police officers' building where officers are conducting junior rifle training courses for youngsters.

The location of such arrests was significant. In 1957, there were 44 such arrests in taverns, but for 1958, there was only one. Also in 1957, there were 41 on-street arrests, while in October of this year it had increased to 103.

A letter from the Chamber of Commerce, Tourists and Convention Committee was read. It was directed to the Park and Recreation Committee and suggested a three-point program for future improvement of facilities.

The three areas were listed as (1) development of additional camping sites, (2) development of the waterfront areas at Moore Park and Veterans Park and (3) building of a connecting road from Front Street to Moore Park.

The letter was dated October 27, prior to the recent voting when Klamath Falls residents turned down a request for \$27,900 additional annually for the Parks and Recreation Department.
