### Hussein's Safe Return Celebrated In Jordan

**AMMAN, Jordan (AP)**—Jordanians celebrated today the safe return of King Hussein from what he charged was a United Arab Republic attempt to kill or capture him on a flight over Syria.

U.S.R. officials in Cairo denied the charges. They said Hussein's plane lacked proper clearance to fly over the Syrian Province of the U.A.R.

President Nasser was reported to be convinced Syrian authorities acted properly but also to be upset by the incident, which worsened U.A.R.-Jordanian relations after a recent improvement.

A national holiday was declared throughout Jordan to celebrate the escape of the 23-year-old king. Crowds surged through the narrow streets of Amman Monday night, firing roman candles and rifles.

Hussein left Amman Airport Monday in a twin-engine transport plane bound for a European vacation. He later reported that two communist-built MIG jet fighters from Syria set upon him near Damascus, capital of the Syrian Province.

The MIGs tried to force his plane down but did not fire at it, the king said. His pilot dropped down near the ground for a wild hedgehopping flight back over rugged country to Amman.

Hussein, himself a flier, was riding as co-pilot. His pilot said the two MIGs were trying to get into position to fire at the Jordanian

plane all the way back. Immediately after his return Hussein accused the Syrian pilots of violating international law by intruding in Jordanian air space.

The charge was made in a broadcast to Jordan's 1,500,000 people, many of whom favor Nasser rather than Hussein. Cairo radio has called in the past for Hussein's assassination.

"They are making enemy attack upon you in my person," Hussein said. He added that his government was taking "necessary steps" to maintain Jordan's prestige and dignity. He did not elaborate.

The broadcast came after a long emergency session with Hussein's cabinet. Parliament was called into session today.

U.S. Charge d'Affaires Thomas K. Wright conferred with Premier Samir Rifai on the incident.

In Cairo, an official spokesman shrugged off the incident, saying "imagination had a big part to play" in the charges.

Saad Afra, U.A.R. director of information, said in a broadcast, "It is quite evident from the Jordan communique that the plane did not transmit to Damascus Airport any details as to its identity or the presence on board of King Hussein."

Syrian Interior Minister Abdel Hamid Seraj arrived in Cairo Monday night, reportedly at Nasser's orders to report on the incident.

### KF Man Elected To Serve On War Advisory Council

knowledge and interest in the Civil War, to be members of the Advisory Council of the National Civil War Centennial Commission, Karl S. Betts, executive director, announced.

Others on the council from Oregon are Mrs. E. B. Aldrich, Pen-

leton; Daryl W. Donaldson, Salem; Mrs. Gertrude G. Jensen, Portland; Paul E. Krueger, Roseburg; Edward Waldrop, Bandon; Marvin T. Warlick, Portland; M. Keith Wilson, Enterprise; Mrs. Alton W. Davis, Portland, and C. J. Shorb, La Grande.

As members of the council, they will be asked from time to time to confer with the National Commission in connection with its efforts to stimulate interest in the forthcoming ceremonies and to bring about a proper coordination of observances.

Selection of Advisory Council members in the various states has been under way since the National Commission was set up some months ago. Maj. Gen. U. S. Grant III, chairman, said he looked upon the appointment of these groups, all members of which will serve without compensation, as one of the most constructive steps taken to bring about a united, nationwide observance.

The commission, made up of 25 members, including President Eisenhower and Vice President Nixon, has established headquarters at 700 Jackson Place, N. W., almost directly in front of the White House. Acting under the belief that

the observances can best be carried out at the grass-roots level, it has encouraged each state to create a Centennial Commission of its own to aid counties and communities in working out their own programs, at the same time maintaining contact with the national agency.

Seventeen states already have established commissions, while others either are in process of setting them up or are waiting until their legislatures meet early next year. Those already in operation are in Colorado, Illinois, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, New Hampshire, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Vermont, Virginia and Wisconsin.

To aid the state commissions in their operations, the national agency recently prepared for general distribution a guide explaining the type of Centennial observance it has in mind and how the local groups should proceed with their plans to participate. All states, whether they had battle action within their borders or base their interest on the troops they fur-

nished for duty elsewhere, are expected to take part. A master chronology, listing 6,500 military and political events that took place during the four years of the war, recently was compiled at headquarters and will be made available to states as rapidly as they set up commissions. In the case of Oregon, for instance, this shows that at least five events possibly worthy of observance took place within its borders. The list is not complete, and others may be uncovered.

"We want the various states to get their individual commissions in operation as rapidly as possible, so we can supply them with the chronology," Betts said. "With this at hand, we should like for them to check our listing for completeness and to notify us of any omissions or errors."
