

Ore Tech Preps For Whittier

Owl '11' Travels For Final

Oregon Tech's 1958 football season closes Saturday night when the Owls invade Whittier for a non-conference meeting with the Poets of Whittier College, one of the Southern California small college powerhouses.

Going into the game, Tech's season record stands at 6-1. A win over Whittier would give the Owls the best win-loss record in the school's football history. Whittier, also winner of six of seven games so far this year, is the defending Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference champion and the Poets are highly favored to win the title again this season, having only Redlands to dispose of a week from Saturday.

Coach Rex Hunsaker's Owls, having only three days practice time this week, turned in a "double" practice period today, Veterans Day, a school holiday. While the OTI students had the day off, Hunsaker and his aids worked their chargers overtime, trying to prepare a defense to stop the multiple offense system used by Whittier.

The Poets run from just about every type of offense known to football. Coach Don Coryell, former athletic director at Fort Ord, has his club running plays from single wing lineups, both balanced and unbalanced; from a spread formation with the quarterback deep, both balanced and unbalanced; from an "I" formation where three of the backs lineup directly behind the center and the fourth stands a few yards back and to one side of the "I" depending upon the play; and from a short punt formation.

Defending this opponent will be a severe test for line coach George Miller who does most of the defensive masterminding for Hunsaker's club. Tuesday's two workouts were spent assembling defenses that may work against each of the different Whittier offensive patterns.

Stopping the Poets is something no team has done this year. Although Sacramento State defeated Whittier earlier in the season 20-18, the Poets outplayed their victors in every department including first downs and net yardage. So far this year, Whittier has rolled up 164 points against 75 for the opposition.

Hunsaker's staff has a problem as they prep for this season-ending clash. For the first time this year, Oregon Tech will be playing under NCAA rules, in place of the NAIA (small college) book. This means the Owls will not be able to use free substitution and two-arm blocking.

Hunsaker announced Tuesday morning that he may have to go without two of his leading gridders this weekend. Hamilton, who re-injured his knee in the Moffett game, and halfback Charlie "Go Go" Wilson, who has missed the last two games because of an ankle injury, are sidelined. Hunsaker said if the two injuries fail to respond the two first-line footballers may be left home.

Oregon Tech Gridders On NW Star List

The guard and end positions have beefed up with strong new candidates in the Little All North-west football picture and four men continue to build their claims for Little All America recognition.

The quartet of stars rapping at the gates for small college All America attention are Williamette's center Bill Long, halfback Corky Bridges of Central Washington, halfback Stan Solomon of Willamette and tackle Larry Maguire of Central.

Several others are receiving consideration because of stellar performance. A newcomer to the list of standouts is Allen Jones, 205-pound senior guard at Oregon Tech.

Marvin Cisneros of Willamette and Ed Melbourne of Western Washington are late additions to the list of strong guards. Oregon Tech's Owls, champions of the Oregon Collegiate Conference, have added Norman Hooper to the group of end candidates and Dave McWhirter is an added starter from Eastern Washington.

The center position, crammed this year with standouts, got new candidates in Phil Sword of Southern Oregon, Allons Alt of Eastern and Western's Jack Sim. All weighs only 175 but holds his own with the heavies. Tom Black of Whitworth has been added to the tackle list by the Northwest's Little All America Board.

There are new backfield names as well. Recent nominations at quarterback are John Jacobson of Pacific Lutheran, Vic Ferguson of Whitworth, Charlie Genter of Oregon Tech and Keith Driver of Willamette—not named in any order of choice.

Danny Schwisow of Central and Rex Schimke of Whitworth are newcomers to the halfback department.

College Poll Led By Tigers

Louisiana State, Iowa and Army still rank 1-2-3 in The Associated Press college football poll this week but two of the three face real tests in their games this Saturday.

The No. 1 Louisiana State Tigers, fresh from a 50-13 romp over Duke, tackle a Mississippi State eleven which could cause considerable trouble, and Iowa faces a frustrated Ohio State team which will try to regain a little of its lost prestige by knocking off the newly crowned Big Ten champions.

Only Army has what might be called a breather. The Cadets, who defeated Rice Saturday by virtue of a long hope pass in the final minutes, take on Villanova, which is not figured to cause too much trouble.

Only one team of the top 10 a week ago failed to be voted into that select group this week by the sportswriters and sportscasters taking part in the poll. Northwestern, losing to Wisconsin, dropped to 13th place. The Wildcats were fourth last week.

Texas Christian, moved up from 11th to ninth on its 36-8 victory over Marquette.

Louisiana State got 95 first place votes in piling up 1,532 points this week. Iowa was a first choice of 52 voters, and its 1,441 points gave it a comfortable margin over Army, which got 999 points without a first-place vote.

USC Coach Sees Win For Coast Bowl Team

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The Pacific Coast Conference, playing its last season of football before dissolving, could win the Rose Bowl game New Year's Day in the opinion of Southern California football coach Don Clark.

Clark refused to go along with the wailing of some Coast football supporters that the Big Ten was too powerful for PCC teams. He told the Southern California football writers Monday that a western team "had a chance."

"I believe the Rose Bowl game is going to be a lot closer than many people think," he said. "And there's a good chance one of our teams will go in there and win."

Clark said he had no mind sticking to his neck even though Southern California still has an outside chance to be the Coast's representative in the New Year's Day game.

"Don't let anyone fool you," Clark said. "The Pacific Coast Conference clubs have played good football."

If the Big Ten has an edge, he said, it was in player depth but the Coast team is in good shape it could make a game of it. Turning to California, currently leading the PCC, he said the Bears could give Iowa a tussle if star quarterback Joe Kapp played his best game.

Clark, however, gave Washington some sort of chance of knocking off California this weekend, a view to which Coach Bill Barnes of UCLA subscribed.

Barnes said his team played well in being edged out by California but had difficulty stopping Kapp completely. The Bruins meet Oregon here Saturday while Southern Cal draws a bye.

Barnes ranked Oregon as being the equal of Southern Cal physically and expected his team would have another rough afternoon.

Coach Sid Gilman of the Rams accepted congratulations on his team's 36-7 victory over the Forty Niners which he termed so completely a team effort that the players themselves couldn't decide on an individual to receive the game ball and voted game balls to three men—Del Shofner, Will Sherman and George Sturgar.

Shofner and tiny Don Buford, one of the stars of USC's win over Washington, were voted the pro and college players of the week.

Hill Speaks To Owl Hoots

A large crowd of Owl Hoots turned out to greet Ralph Hill, former U.S. Olympic star, who was the evening's guest speaker Monday night at the Oregon Tech Boosters weekly dinner meeting at the Chuck Wagon.

Hill, now a farmer in the Henley area, was a standout in the 1932 Olympics. He stressed to the boosters the important part that leadership, desire and conditioning plays in competition.

"Competition," Hill remarked, "is something that we all need. I only wish that there would be more competition installed in our schools today. It would improve our standard of life. But," Hill pointed out, "the financial problem of having some sort of competition for all is too great."

Football coach Rex Hunsaker reviewed his club's 53-12 win over Moffett last Saturday indicating he and his staff were happy with their boys' showing as a final game for the hometown fans. "We all feel," Hunsaker said, "that Moffett has a better club than the final score indicates. They (Moffett) played some good football, but our kids got them on the run and wouldn't quit," Hunsaker added.

The Owls' mentor also informed the booster organization that the Techmen would be facing a very tough assignment this week when playing Whittier there Saturday night. Hunsaker also pointed out the difference in the NAIA rules which Tech has been playing under all season, and the NCAA rules, which will govern this game. Whittier is a member of the NCAA and has out-grown the small college federation (NAIA).

Keck Leads Merrill Into 'B' Prep Playoffs

The Merrill Huskies surged into preparations Monday for the final phases of their third annual quest of a state B football championship while under the direction of coach Al Keck.

The Huskies, who swept through an unbeaten District 5B schedule face Maupin, the champions in District 6B, in a quarterfinal game to be played in Maupin this coming Saturday afternoon at 1:30. At the same time, in the far-northeastern sector of the state, Umatilla and Joseph will battle it out for the District 7 and 8 slot.

The winners of the two contests will clash the following weekend at an undecided site in the semi-final round.

In 1956 the Huskies grabbed off District 5B honors only to be nipped at the quarter post then returned in 1957 to again capture the 5B crown and sweep past Maupin in the semis only to be dropped in the finals by the Stanfield Tigers.

This year the Huskies get a chance at Maupin in the quarter-finals. Merrill downed Maupin 28-6 in their last meeting and according to this season's dope sheet should again handle the situation with relative ease.

Maupin and Moro duelled to a 20-14 Maupin victory last weekend while the Huskies took the week off. Coach Keck, however, made a trip to Maupin to see the contest and then swung over to Joseph to watch them in action.

"I believe we have an excellent chance against Maupin, but we can't be sure, until we play them. We are ready—there are a couple of minor injuries on the squad but I have a hunch they will clear up before game time," said the modest Merrill mentor. "Either Umatilla or Joseph can be real tough and if we get by Maupin we have to meet one of them. Let's just say we'll play every game we get a chance to."

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Jefferson Leads Last Prep Football Voting

The Associated Press high school football poll ends this week with Jefferson of Portland in the No. 1 position—the same ranking it has held all season.

Defending state champion Jefferson, which defeated Cleveland 31-0 in its final game and clinched its second straight Portland League title, was the unanimous choice of the sports reporters and broadcasters who took part in the poll.

Medford, although held to a scoreless tie by Grants Pass, held on to the No. 2 position. Medford shared the District 6-A-1, Southern Oregon Conference, title, but won the playoff berth on the basis of yardage—235 to 85 for Grants Pass.

Marshfield remained the No. 3 team in the state again this week, after beating North Bend 28-13 and taking the District 5 Midwestern League title.

Grants Pass, sixth last week, advanced to the No. 4 position. Astoria, fourth last week, dropped back to fifth place after tying 12-12 with Gresham. Astoria took the District 3, Metro League, championship despite the tie.

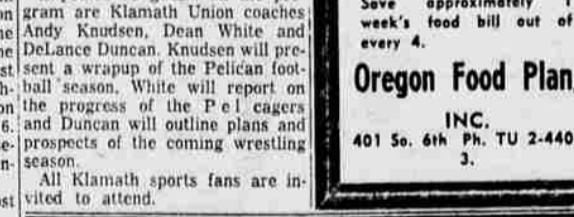
