The two basketball loops are still in the talking stage. One was for the California members of the PCC forming with a few other big independent schools in the state. The other was originated by Portland University, Seattle, Gonzaga and Montana State College. Again let us state that we have our doubts as to whether or not Oregon Tech could beat Willamette.

But such a meeting would not only settle such a question, but think of the financial boost it would mean to the Beacats and Owls. And both schools are probably in the mood for some additions to their athletic coffers.

Two Moffett Naval Air Station footballers still have college eligibility left and as soon as their service hitch is through, they'll make some college coach happy. . . the two are quarterback Dick Olivas (three years) and Calvin Campbell (four years) . . . following the Owls 53-12 win over Moffett, these two boys were greatly impressed by Tech's football program. . . Cousy, Bill Spark Celtics

The Boston Celtics could be called the walking wounded, but they looked mighty healthy to the Minneapolis Lakers Tuesday night. Bob Cousy, nursing a painful foot injury, and Bill Russell, playing with an injured ankle, sparked the Celtics to a 116-113 overtime victory over the Lakers. It was the only game played in the National Basketball Assn.

Cousy, used sparingly in Boston's last two games, collected seven points in the overtime period. He finished with 15 points and had 14 assists.

With the score tied 111-111 in the final minute, Russell tapped in an errant shot by Bill Sharman to put the Celtics ahead for good. Big Bill snared 33 rebounds and wound up with 20 points.

The Cousy-Russell tandem nullified a spectacular performance by Minneapolis rookie Elgin Baylor. The former Seattle All-America clicked for 36 points and game scoring honors.

The victory snapped Boston's losing streak at two and moved the Celtics into third place in the Eastern Division with a 3-3 record. The Lakers, now 4-5, dropped their third straight and fell into a second-place tie in the Western Division with Detroit.

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Merrill Husky '11' Works On Holiday

A school holiday meant little to the Merrill Huskies as the squad appeared for a regular practice session on the Merrill gridiron Tuesday. For coach Al Keck and his District 5B champions only three days remain in which to get into top form for the coming state quarterfinal B football game with the Maupin Reddies at Maupin Saturday afternoon.

Workouts have been primarily restricted to individual and specialty drills aimed at regaining regular season edge. The Huskies have been inactive, competition-wise, since copping the league title in a match with the Chilquin Panthers on October 31. Hard scrimmages and excessive bodily contact have been avoided by the Merrill team in order that they might allow the few minor injuries incurred against the Panthers to heal completely.

The game with Maupin, the first step toward the coveted state crown, finds the Huskies and the Reddies relatively evenly matched. Both squads have figured in playoffs the last two years and both have coaches who are in their third year at the helm of their respective clubs.

In 1957 the Reddies, coached by Tom Thayer, were defeated by Merrill at the quarter-post; Keck and his men were stopped in the semis by the vaunted Stanfield Tigers.

Maupin, with 7 wins and 2 losses for the season, knocked off Stanfield in their first test of the year by a 28-13 count. Since then they have collected victories over Santiam, Echo, John Day, an A2 school, Fossil, Condon and Moro. Their defeats came at the hands of Pilot Rock and Heppner.

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
