

Military Court Sentences Ex-Iraq Leader To Death

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP)—Fadhil Jamali, former Iraqi premier who has an American wife, has been sentenced to death by a military court.

The court also condemned Monday two former Iraqi army leaders, Gen. Rafik Aref, former chief of staff, and his deputy, Maj. Gen. Ghazi Daghistani. Executions are by hanging in Iraq.

The special military court sentenced them on convictions of plotting to invade Syria and illegally force her into federation with Iraq in 1956 and 1957; of asking U.S., British and Baghdad Pact help in the plot; and of generally endangering Iraq's security and world peace.

This was the first verdict by the five-man tribunal since the revolutionary government began trials of the leading politicians under slain King Faisal II. More than 100 persons are under arrest.

Jamali's wife, the former Sara Hayden Powell of Philadelphia, is still an American citizen. The couple has three children. Mrs. Jamali has a sister, Mrs. Lydia Johnson of Prospect Park, Pa., a suburb of Philadelphia.

The Jamalis met in 1929 when both were attending the University of Chicago. At last report she was still in Baghdad.

Jamali also has served as Iraq's foreign minister and U.N. delegate.

Death Snuffs Out Life Of 'Just Country Doctor'

WILCOX, Ariz. (AP)—"Just a country doctor" is how most folks would describe Doc Wilson. But the 2,000 residents of this farming town feel Dr. John C. Wilson was more than that.

He brought healing and love to this one-time frontier settlement.

He died Wednesday after a lengthy illness. He was 79.

Doc Wilson began as a horse-and-buggy doctor in 1903—nine years before Arizona became a state. He brought into the world nearly all local residents under 50.

His small, wiry frame, ruddy face, sparkling eyes and rimless glasses were a familiar sight to many an injured outlaw, railroadman, miner and school kid.

He was elected mayor of Wilcox three times. He organized the town's first American Legion post and Rotary Club, and he headed the committee that built its first airport and first golf course.

He was the town's health officer, school doctor and railroad physician. In recent years he was technical advisor to the television show, "Frontier Doctor."

Born May 12, 1879, in Owenton, Ky., and educated in Indiana, Doc Wilson was headed for California when he stopped in Wilcox on Christmas Day 1903. A railroadman had been hurt. The town had no doctor. Wilson decided he was needed. So he stayed for good.
