

Study Pends On Road Plan

DUNSMUIR—Study of proposed interchanges in Highway 99 in north Dunsmuir to convert the highway into a true limited access highway will be continued for the time being.

The Dunsmuir City Council declined to take action on approval of a map indicating highway changes submitted by the State Division of Highways. Herb Miles, district highway engineer, at last week's council meeting, requested official approval. He said the state would then purchase property on which costly improvements were being contemplated.

Approval was frowned upon by Robert Dewey, chairman of the citizens' United Front Committee, who thought the construction dates were too tentative. Miles had said the changes might not be made for 10 years.

Councilman E. A. Christensen thought there could be many changes of plans, engineers and councils in a 10-year period. Councilman Dave McClintock shared his views.

Miles stated his department was willing to mark time and asserted that property owners of undeveloped areas in the interchange area are capable of making themselves heard if they feel delay of approval by the council will affect them adversely.

In defense of his stand, Robert Dewey said the planning commission, recreation commission and redevelopment committee would be making interim studies for the town's economic growth and should be given time to make recommendations.

No Shift Yet, Official Says

SEATTLE (AP)—Military cargo or passenger facilities will not be shifted from the Pacific Northwest until at least mid-January, the Defense Department told Rep. Thomas M. Pelly (R-Wash.) Thursday.

A department spokesman said no steps will be taken to consolidate west Coast facilities until after a meeting with the Washington State Congressional delegation, tentatively scheduled for Jan. 12.

The Defense Department had earlier set Dec. 15 as the date for a decision on consolidating West Coast passenger and cargo facilities. Indications were the decision might mean the shifting of the present Fort Lewis Personnel Center to San Francisco and the closing of the Army cargo booking section at Seattle.

Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.) had ordered the Senate Appropriations Committee to investigate comparative costs and shipping data of Seattle and San Francisco. Pelly asked the Defense Department to delay action until the study was completed.

Shakespearean Festival Launches Building Drive

ASHLAND—With a goal set at \$275,000, the Oregon Shakespearean Festival launched a month-long building fund campaign. Several hundred volunteer workers from the theater's home area in Oregon's Rogue River Valley heralded the start of the project with an opening dinner at which theater officials and civic leaders saluted the event's widening cultural and economic values.

Each summer, four Shakespearean plays are produced in nightly rotation during a six-week period. The productions are performed in the Elizabethan manner on a stage patterned directly after the Fortune Theater of Shakespeare's era. The proposed new plant—in keeping with this tradition—will provide an even more authentic Elizabethan style stage for the unusual entire Shakespearean canon of event. Last summer the theater completed its production of the by only a few world theaters.

Following the record-setting 1958 season at the unique theater, the condemned stage structure had to be razed. In order to open the 1959 season in time for Oregon's statewide centennial celebration, money for a new theater plant must be secured before Christmas. The funds are being solicited from the festival's international audience members, totaling thousands of patrons and representing every state in the union and 17 foreign nations.

Although the campaign's central effort will be in Oregon, interested persons in several other areas are organizing individual solicitations in the theater's interest. Campaign officials point out that pledges may be made over a three-year period, and that donations to the organization are deductible from federal and state

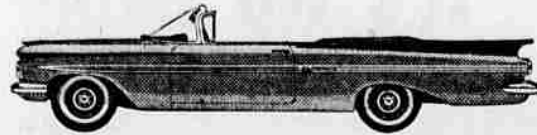
