PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — A slim, blue-eyed New England girl plans to ride muleback into mountainous South Viet Nam and find some tribe that has no written language.

There, a few miles from the Communist North, she'll spend 10 to 15 years making a phonetic translation of the New Testament and helping the natives establish a church.

"We feel that since the Lord seems to be leading us into it, he'll take care of us," says Bernette Jean Donaldson, 26.

She and a still unselected girl companion will be sponsored by Wycliffe Bible Translators, this interdenominational group, with headquarters in nearby Glendale.

Friend Of Family Finds Boys Who Were Missing

Two small boys were missing from their Shasta Way home for three hours Wednesday but eventually were found unharmed.

State police said Robert Carnes, 3, and David Calzavara, 2, disappeared about 1:30 p.m. while playing in the Carnes yard, 5141 Shasta Way. They were brought home about 4:30 by a family friend who saw them playing in a field not far from home, officers said.

In other juvenile matters, city police intercepted two older boys who admitted they had run away from Springfield juvenile authorities.

Officers said they were spotted at Eleventh and Main streets, at 1:20 a.m. When they saw the patrol car, the police report said, they acted like they didn't want to be seen. The boys—at the station—gave their ages as 14 and 15 and admitted they were running away.

At first they said they were from Klamath Falls, but the addresses they gave were fictitious. The youths were taken to juvenile authorities, and are to be returned to Springfield.

She said her mother, Mrs. Faith S. Donaldson, Exeter, N.H., is "very happy about it."

and 800 field workers around the world, has translated the New Testament into nearly 150 tribal languages.

In high school at Exeter, N.H., where she is still a member of the First Baptist church, Jean began thinking about missionary work.

In 1950-51 she was a staff sergeant in photography at Shaw Air Force Base, S.C. She prayed about her decision while earning a B.A. at Westmont College, Santa Barbara, Calif.

Miss Donaldson is studying biblical languages at the non-denominational Fuller Theological Seminary before sailing next Jan. 17. "I felt I'd like to go to a place which had no one to tell them of the Lord," she said. "There are Christian Missionary Alliance workers in Viet Nam but over 21 tribes without the Gospel."

Last summer her sponsors put Jean and 40 others through a three-month training camp in a southern Mexico jungle. They lived in mud-walled buildings with thatched roofs, studied carpentry, repaired radios, swam, canoed, hiked and even butchered a cow.

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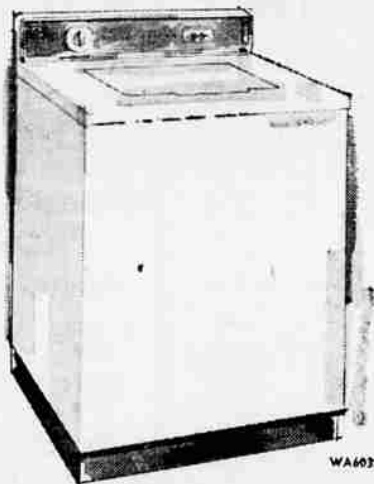
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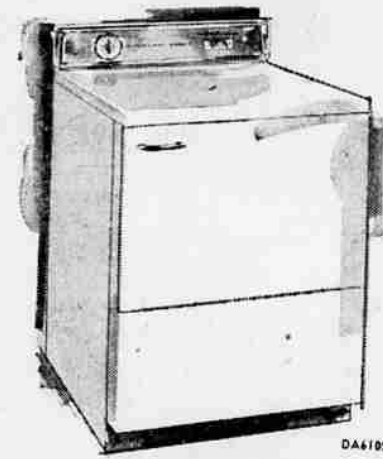
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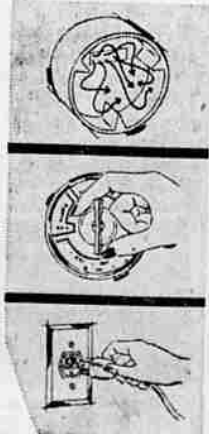
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
