

California Cleric Outlines Recent Meeting In England

DUNSMUIR — The marks of a Christian family as defined at the Lambeth Conference in England this summer were outlined by Bishop Clarence Haden, bishop of the Sacramento Diocese of the Episcopal Church, at the Shasta convocation held here recently.

A Christian family, Bishop Haden said, seeks to live by the teachings and example of Christ, its members join in church worship and family prayer; it shares joys, responsibilities, tasks and recreation; uses ability, time, and good neighbor, hospitable to friend and stranger.

Bishop Haden also told of attending the Lambeth Conference with Episcopal clergymen from all over the world and illustrated his talk with colored slides.

His talk at the concluding banquet of the all-day session at St. Barnabas Church was heard by over 100 ministers and lay members of the Episcopal Church from Marysville to the Oregon border.

The aims of Christian stewardship were told at the luncheon meeting by Ed Allen, Red Bluff attorney and diocesan representative, at a recent provincial synod meeting in Reno, Nevada. "Put aside lesser gods" was Allen's message.

A report on the general convention in Miami was given by three women's auxiliary members. Participating were Mrs. Laurel Blackburn of Santa Rosa, Mrs. Mary Willis Moore of Yuba City and Mrs. Noni Brown of Grass Valley. Father Charles Williams of Woodland was moderator of this panel. Carl Kaski of St. Helena outlined the missionary endeavor of the church.

At the late afternoon business session, Father Richard Warren was elected convocation dean and Zealand Hillsdon-Hutton, secretary-treasurer. Bishop Haden explained the financial position of the diocese in its best state in years. He said construction of the medical center in Sacramento is scheduled to proceed soon.

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Unionist Tells Of Donations

NEW YORK (AP) — Harold J. Gibbons, Teamsters vice president, says his union pumped more than \$500,000 into labor's battle against enactment of "right-to-work" laws in six states.

Gibbons told the Economics Club of City College Thursday that Teamsters locals contributed at least \$400,000 and the international union another \$400,000 to the campaign.

The laws would bar union membership as a condition of employment. Last election day the measures lost in Ohio, California, Colorado, Washington and Idaho and passed in Kansas.

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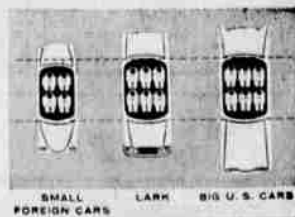
