

Merrill Huskies Beat Maupin, Move Into State Semi-Finals

MAUPIN—Despite below freezing temperatures the Merrill Huskies staged a last three minute comeback from behind 26-20 victory over the Maupin Redskins here Saturday afternoon to take a big step in their quest for the State B football championship.

The win, a "sub par performance" on the part of the Merrill squad, boosts them into the semi-final playoff against Umatilla next weekend at a site yet to be named.

Bruins Take To Air, Defeat Webfoots 7-3

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The underdog Bruins of UCLA swept through the airways in the final minutes and defeated Oregon, 7-3, as the Pacific Coast Conference teams ended their long history of football rivalry.

Facing defeat after Oregon scored in the fourth quarter midway in a field goal, reserve left halfback Kirk Wilson suddenly shifted to the air and the Bruins quickly scored a touchdown.

Fifty five yards away from the Webfoot goal, Wilson completed two spectacular passes to Phil Parslow, the first for 26 yards and the second for 27 to put the ball on the Oregon 8.

Fullback Ray Smith quickly smashed through the middle of the big Oregon line for a touchdown.

It was a disappointed and frustrated Webfoot squad which left the field. They had made a gallant 88-yard drive, all of it on the ground, to set up the field goal. Second string fullback Dave Powell from Eugene, the home of the Webfoots, lugged the ball 10 times for 61 yards in the 19-play series. And with the ball held on the 17, John Clarke booted what looked like the winning 3 points.

Oregon apparently tried for an on-side kick-off. UCLA fell on the ball on its own 45 and the winning series began. It ended with the clock showing three minutes one second left.

For three quarters the sparse crowd of 22,297 had been treated to a game jammed with monkey. Some had drifted out, fully expecting a scoreless tie, when the fireworks broke loose.

Nub Beamer Strikes For Beaver Clincher

STANFORD, Calif. (AP)—Oregon State fullback Nub Beamer, who hadn't thrown a half dozen passes all season, connected with a throw to end Roger Johnson for 53 yards and the winning touchdown Saturday as the Beavers beat Stanford 24-16.

Earlier, Beamer smashed through center and ran 44 yards for the opening touchdown in the Pacific Coast Conference battle that kept the men from Corvallis still in Rose Bowl contention.

Stanford, trailing 16-0, fought back on the brilliant passing of sophomore quarterback Dick Norman to tie the count. Only seven minutes and 35 seconds remained when Beamer struck off his runner's role and threw the game-winning pass. Johnson caught the ball at the 25 and raced to the end zone.

The victory before 22,500 fans on a sunny but chilly, windy afternoon, gave the Beavers a 5-2 PCC record, a step behind California's 5-1.

Beamer smashed over center for the conversion after his first touchdown. Early in the second period the Beavers drove 45 yards in six plays for their second touchdown. Wingback Earnel Durden scored on a 10-yard reverse, and Dainard Paulson ran the conversion around right end.

Norman directed a touchdown drive of 67 yards in the second and another of 69 in the third. The first touchdown came on his 6-yard throw to Chris Burf for the second when sophomore fullback Gil Dowd plunged the final yard. Rick McMillen ran for the first conversion and Skip Face did the same for the second.

Stanford drove again, but Johnson blocked a 20-yard field goal attempt by Face. The Beavers sped back 77 yards in five plays, the finale the winning pass by Beamer.

The Indians, striving for an upset and with a regional television audience watching, fumbled five times in the first quarter and twice lost the ball. When quarterback Bob Nicolet bobbled at the Stanford 38, Bruce Hake recovered for the Beavers. Oregon

The narrow margin marked the Huskies' continuation of an unbeaten string for 1953 action.

Sparked by a sterling performance by halfback John Haskins, who was making his last appearance in the Merrill colors, the Huskies emerged from the short end of a 20-19 score to count the necessary six-pointer on a four yard plunge by fullback Troy Patterson.

A successful conversion kick by Merrill's Bud Maupin and a Red-side fumble saw the whistle blow on one of the toughest matches the Merrill crew has survived.

Haskins, who spent the week recovering from a leg injury incurred against the Jacksonville Redskins, was the standout, both offensively and defensively for the Huskies.

Merrill grabbed an early but short lead in the first quarter as Haskins romped to pay dirt around left end on the first Merrill move from scrimmage. The conversion try failed as the clock registered only four minutes gone. Haskins' run, a 31 yard effort, followed a Maupin fumble.

Maupin moved out from a short time later as big Dave Schreiber blasted through for six points from four yards out. Schreiber scooted into the end zone with the conversion and the Redskins settled down to enjoy a lead that was to last for nearly the full distance.

The action packed second stanza

saw the two teams break even in the scoring department with Haskins and Maupin left end Gene Walters each tallying a TD followed by a touchdown scored by both Maupin quarterback Steve Albright and Husky halfback Bud Maupin. Only one Merrill try-point was good in the interchange, and the Redskins maintained their one point spread.

The clincher came in the last three minutes of the contest as Troy Patterson, a converted Merrill lineman, lugged the pigskin for four yards from his position at fullback to collect another six points. Patterson's counter was followed by a placement by Maupin and Merrill had overcome the first obstacle in its path to the state title.

Haskins, the speedy, deceptive Merrill back, played probably the best game of his career, and contributed a large portion of the Husky tackles. Close on the heels of Haskins in both the scoring department and defensive play was Bud Maupin. Both Huskies earned praise from both winning coach Al Keck and loser, Tom Thayer, for their fine work. Also counting largely in the Merrill defensive scheme of things were linemen David Andrieu and Ray Story, each of whom were standouts in stopping the hard-charging Redside backs.

The highlight of the game came in the second quarter as Haskins hauled in a Maupin kickoff, shook off five determined Maupin tacklers and sped 88 yards for a touchdown.

Not dismayed, the Maupin squad bounced back in the closing stages of the contest and moved to within the Merrill 10 only to fumble at a crucial point and have Merrill take command and run out the clock.

Maupin quarterback Steve Albright took to the airways only twice throughout the game, both tries successful with one going 26 yards for a touchdown to Walters. Albright also scored the third Maupin TD as he bombed his way into the end zone late in the second period.

The Maupin squad was paced defensively by Albright, guard Ken Taylor and tackle Larry Ashley, all of whom were up close on every play.

Though outgained 186 to 194 by Maupin on the ground the Huskies picked up 44 yards through the air to 40 for the Redskins; in two of four attempts Merrill quarterback Denny Salvadori hit his mark.

The powerful Merrill team waited for repairs to be completed on their bus before returning home Saturday night, the transportation suffering the only Merrill injury of the day. The next stop for the Huskies comes at the hands of Umatilla this next weekend, a final ruling from the OSAA to determine the site.

State drew a penalty for holding but three plays later the 195-pound Beamer smashed through center, bounced off a couple of tacklers in the secondary and sped in for the touchdown.

The Beavers dominated the opening minutes of the second quarter. In the touchdown drive Durden contributed 17 yards and Beamer made runs of 5 and 13 before Durden circled left end on the reverse. Paulson cut around right end for the conversion.

Stanford, having tried Sid Garber and Bob Nicolet at quarterback without much success, called on the sophomore Norman. He promptly engineered the 67-yard drive in 15 plays, gaining 30 yards in 7 passes. His touchdown throw and the conversion put the halftime score at 16-0.

The Indians dominated the third quarter as Norman's passing led the way. Four completions gained 49 yards in the advance with the longest throw gaining 19 to Dick Bowers. Dowd scored two plays after his own 12 yard run.

Norman and Irv Nikolai in the final quarter hooked up on a 62-yard pass play to the OSC 10. The Indians could not advance in three plays, and Face tried unsuccessfully for the field goal.

Norman completed 21 of 31 passes for 236 yards. Beamer went 88 yards in 11 tries for a 7.78 yard a carry average.

LOS ANGELES — Picking up the loose ends while with the Owls of Oregon Tech on their final football outing of the season:

It's been a good football season for Tech, winners of the school's first clear-cut Oregon Collegiate Conference grid championship. And the team's showing against "outside" competition has been far above expectation.

Coach Rex Hunsaker's club deserves a lot of credit from local sports fans for a job well done. The season wouldn't have been as successful as it was without a great amount of cooperation on the part of the squad members, coaches, student body and school administration. They all worked together to build a fine season.

Hunsaker will be the first to give lots of "unsung" credit to his line coach George Miller for a tremendous job on lining up Tech defenses which stopped Owl opponents. Miller would take a quick look at scouting reports on the next OTI foe and map out a defense or set of defenses which should work against the type of attack the Owls were to meet.

Such was the case against Southern Oregon, Oregon College and Moffett. The Owls had good scouting reports on these foes and the final scores in the games show what Miller can do in masterminding a suitable defensive alignment.

Local sports fans are going to be watching the University of Oregon basketball picture quite closely this winter. Three Klamath Falls boys will be playing a big part in the U of O basketball program.

On the varsity this year will be sophomore Butch Kimpton, already the No. 3 guard and ranked as a good possibility of moving into the first unit before the year is over. Kimpton, the 6-1, 1957 all-star from KUHS, was one of the leading scorers for the freshman squad last year at Oregon. His speed and shooting touch make him a serious threat to holdover starters Bud Kuykendall and Chuck Rask.

Butch is getting a good start on the basketball season this fall. He is "seeing" the ball better. The ex-Pelican star has done contact lenses and all reports indicate his playing has picked up.

On the U of O frosh squad will be 6-8 Glenn Moore and 6-4 Dave Robinson, both all-stars on last year's state championship team from Klamath Union. Moore is currently working on the first team, while Robby is alternating

with two others for the "fifth" spot on the starting lineup.

Moore, like Kimpton, is wearing contacts this year. He was fitted for a new pair recently and is just beginning to get used to his new "eyes."

Some of you may have been wondering about Donn Taucher, the ex-KU athlete who made a great name for himself at Shasta Junior College two years before transferring to the University of Oregon this past year.

Donn has been held out of competition this fall, to save his year's eligibility. According to a member of the Webfoot coaching staff, Taucher is the best punter on the squad, but due to the limited substitution now in order for NCAA members was unable to put his kicking ability to work.

Taucher still has two years' eligibility remaining and should figure into the Ducks' plans the next two years. Besides future football play, Donn also could work into the Oregon baseball program this coming spring. If you'll remember, he did a bang-up job for the Klamath Kubs this past summer and was the most valuable player of the Northern California League's all-star game.

The other day in the mail came a request to become a member of the voting board for the Heisman Memorial Trophy Award. This is the finest individual award in football.

Every year sports writers and sportsasters from around the nation vote on this award. And nearly every year the choice is a backfield star, which will probably be the case again this year. Even though there have been some deserving linemen, the backs get all the credit as usual.

Looking over the past winners of the valuable trophy, you'll find only two linemen to be honored. In 1936 Yale's Larry Kelley was named and in 1949, Notre Dame's great end tackle Leon Hart was the nominee. Other than these two, it's been a clean sweep for the backs.

This year we'll have to go with another back for our lone vote.

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Owls Knuckle To Whittier In '58 Grid Season Finale

WHITTIER, Calif.—The Whittier College Owls, ranked by grid experts across the nation on a par with Ivy League schools turned back coach Rex Hunsaker's Oregon Tech Owls 27-8 here Saturday night before a crowd of 5,000 chilled fans. The weather created one of the coldest situations in which the Owls have appeared this year.

The loss was the Owl's second in eight games and also marked the closure of the Tech football season for 1958. Whittier has one more contest remaining: that against their perennial rival the Redlands.

Whittier's Saturday night victory was sparked by Gay Campbell, 195 pound halfback who is a sure candidate for any or all Little All-American honors. Campbell completed 13 of 20 aerials for a total of 164 yards. Two were good for touchdowns. He added 11 more yards via the ground for a night's work of 173 overall. Campbell's season passing total now stands at 76 completions for 119 tries, boosting him up among the nation's leading passers.

Campbell's efforts payed off in the second half after the visiting Owls held the Poets to a 3-0 first half. The three Whittier tallies came on a 24 yard field goal by tackle Dave Fenton who kicked from a marked angle to the right. The Owls threatened late in the second stanza when fullback Earl Green carried to the one, only to fumble the ball after being hit hard by Poet Ardie Williams. Williams grabbed the pigskin to end the OTI threat.

The Technicians counted their only six-pointer of the night when Al Everson plunged into pay dirt
