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## Engineers Derailed

ATLANTA (AP)—Alert, resourceful Alabama derailed Georgia Tech's football hopes Saturday, scoring three times in the first quarter on its way to a 17-9 upset victory.

Figured to lose by at least a touchdown, Alabama astonished a sellout Tech homecoming crowd of 44,726 by turning two Tech fumbles and a pass interception into two touchdowns and a field goal in 11 minutes.

Tech reached the Alabama six times in the second quarter and threw three cracks from the one yard line in the third period but each time the aroused Crimson Tide stymied its old Southeastern Conference football rival.

The loss left Tech with five victories, three defeats and a tie.
