

Medford, Jeff Remain Favorites, Drop Class A-1 Title Contenders

High-scoring Jefferson and defensive-minded Medford, ranked No. 1 and No. 2 in the Associated Press high school football poll, on Friday night to remain favorites for the Oregon class A-1 championship.

Jefferson, defending state title and Portland league champion, had little trouble routing WyEast at Odell, 41-6. It was Jefferson's tenth victory of the season and its 21st in succession.

Medford capitalized on an early break for a touchdown and then hung on for a 7-0 victory over Marshfield, ranked No. 3 in the poll.

In the other class A-1 playoff contest West Linn, rated No. 9, scored two touchdowns on long second quarter plays and held off Astoria in the last half to win, 4-0. Astoria was fifth-ranked.

Fullback Raye Renfro, who recently established a Portland league scoring record, led to three touchdowns as he romped into the semi-finals. The demonstrators will meet West Linn next.

Jefferson led at halftime, 24-0. Raye Renfro scored each of the first two times he carried the ball, traveling 35 yards once and 8 yards on his second try. He added another touchdown on a 2-yard plunge.

His brother, Mel, scored another

Geo. Bayer Guards Lead In Havana

HAVANA (AP) — Big George Bayer is not satisfied at being acclaimed the longest hitter of the ball golf ever known. He wants to be a champion.

"Long drives in themselves do not pay off," the towering former University of Washington tackle said Saturday as he prepared to defend his 2-stroke lead in the \$45,000 Havana International tournament.

"The money comes from scores and I want to become the complete golfer."

The score paid off for the 6-foot 5, 240-pound athlete Friday. He fired a 6-under-par 64 which included a double eagle to forge to the front of 43 hand-picked professionals in this Caribbean invitation tournament at the Villa Real Golf Club.

Bayer had a 36-hole score of 139 which gave him two shots over tough Doug Ford of Yonkers, N.Y., 1957 Masters champion, and boyish Tommy Jacobs of Monte Bello, Calif., a newcomer on the tour who were tied at 141.

Redhot favorite Sam Snead was still in a contending position with a 142 where he tied with Billy Maxwell of Dallas and Jay Hebert of Lafayette, La., Louisiana PGA champion Dow Finsterwald of Athens, Ohio, and Bill Casper Jr., of Chula Vista, Calif., who had 725 back to back were next in line with 145.

Bayer had one of the most phenomenal rounds ever shot on a professional tour. It was below the record of 60 held by half a dozen pros but it was not made on one of the easy wide open courses which mark part of the tour.

Villa Real is a rugged 7,000-yard test which is similar in some respects to the seaside course of Scotland. It stretches along Florida Straits with stiff winds constantly blowing in from the seas.

Bayer got his double eagle which technically is one shot better than a hole in one on the 300 yard third hole which was played against a strong wind. He hit a drive of close to 270 yards and then sent a full spoon into the cup 239 yards farther away.

Bayer, who is known as a big hitter but a wild, inconsistent swinger, shot near flawless golf all the way. He had three birdies, no bogeys and not a five on his card.

Vet Coach Drops Reins

Bennie Oosterbaan paced the sidelines in Michigan Stadium for the last time Saturday.

The 32-year-old veteran has coached at a Michigan football game every autumn Saturday since 1926. For 20 years he was an assistant — first under Tad Wieman, then Harry Kipke and Fritz Crisler. The last 11 seasons he was head coach. The surroundings haven't changed.

But Saturday's Indiana-Michigan game was different. It was Oosterbaan's farewell as a participant in the stadium he helped dedicate in 1927 while a Michigan player.

He announced Friday he was stepping down in favor of backfield coach Bump Elliott after next Saturday's final game at Ohio State.

Elliott, a Wolverine halfback when Oosterbaan still was backfield coach in 1947, takes over the reins Jan. 1.

"I have the desire to lead a more normal life," said Oosterbaan after the coach change had been announced.

"My wife has been after me for years to get out. It's been an uneasy life. There is lots of pressure from inside of you. Even when you win there's pressure."

"It builds up and you start thinking of the next game. It's worse when you lose."

Most of Oosterbaan's players were unaware their coach was winding up his career when they assembled for Friday's practice. The team has only two victories and a tie in seven games this season.

City Swimmer Smashes Marks

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Teen-age swim queen Sylvia Ruuska smashed two world records for the 1500 meters and mile Friday night in an AAU-sanctioned meet at Treasure Island.

The young Berkeley, Calif., athlete swam the 1500 in 20:02.4 and the mile in 21:26.4 in the single-event meet.

The old marks were 20:03.1 by Jans Koster and 22:05.5 by L. Dennis, both of Holland. Miss Ruuska swam in a 50-meter pool, a requirement for recognition of her efforts.

At Medford the home team recovered a Marshfield fumble in the first period and drove 36 yards on nine plays for the game's only touchdown.

Marshfield proceeded then to dominate the game. The Pirates launched five threats but could get no closer than the Medford 33-yard line. So their 208 net yards to 92 for Medford availed them nothing.

Medford had defeated Marshfield earlier in the season, 3-0. It was Medford's eighth victory in nine games. The Medford record shows one tie, by Grants Pass. The team has yielded only one touchdown, that in a 21-7 victory over North Salem.

West Linn exploded against Astoria when Terry Keller, the Tuolumne-Yamhill Valley League scoring champion, sped 70 yards for a touchdown. Minutes later Gary Comegys hurled a 40-yard scoring pass to Tom French.

Astoria made a battle of it in the second half. Larry Hill ran the opening kickoff back 80 yards to a touchdown.

Shea Starts 3rd League Ball Barrage

NEW YORK (AP) — William A. Shea, who shocked baseball brass almost breathless with his talk of a third major league, resumed his barrage Saturday by accusing the majors of "not playing square with us."

But Commissioner Ford Frick stayed right in the act.

"I still don't get it," he said. "If these so-called responsible parties who are to launch a third major league are sincere and mean to operate within the scope of organized baseball, why haven't they come to see me?"

Shea, chairman of the Mayor's Committee to bring another major league team to New York, said his group intended to operate within the framework of organized baseball.

"We never intended to mention anything about an outlaw league," said Shea. "We merely said that if organized baseball refused to accept our package plan once we had it worked out, we'd then work outside baseball."

"But that isn't our intention and never was. Anyway, suppose we were forced to operate an independent league. Who is to say we are the outlaws and organized baseball isn't? Since when does it make you an outlaw to go into competitive business?"

In answer to Frick, Shea pointed out that at the moment he has nothing concrete to offer. He thinks if he went to Frick, the commissioner would tell him to complete his spawdwerk, then come back.

"I am in contact with all those parties I am assured stand prepared to operate a major league franchise throughout the country," Shea said. "When we have the package assembled and with bona fide guarantees attached, we'll go to the commissioner and ask him how we go about coming into the baseball picture as a third major league."

Shea declined to name the cities he was doing business with, but there are several, including Houston, Tex., and Minneapolis-St. Paul, along with Toronto, Canada, which are straining at the bit for a major league franchise.

Football Fans Mob Officials

ARCADIA, Calif. (UPI) — A mob of high school football fans chased four referees to the dressing room Friday night and rioted for nearly two hours following a game that was lost by a called-back touchdown.

Arcadia police, assisted by units from the Temple City sheriff's office, Sierra Madre police and Monrovia police, as well as three units of the Arcadia Fire Department, quelled the disturbance.

According to police, the fighting broke out during the final minute of a tense game between Arcadia High School and El Monte High School, when a referee called back an Arcadia touchdown pass.

The fans thought the Arcadia player had caught the ball.

El Monte won 13-6.

About 400 or 500 persons were involved in the riot. Fire officials said they used a few gallons of water from high-pressure booster lines to break up a group of a dozen battlers.

Police said no tear gas was used on the rioters, and that nobody suffered any serious injuries.

"There probably were a few sore heads," said one officer, "but that's about all."

None of the police officials was injured, according to Arcadia police, and none of the four referees was hurt.

NFL League Eyes Proposal

Commissioner Bert Bell said Friday night he has asked NFL club owners to agree to reducing the draft from the present 30. Bell said he has already received three or four affirmative replies.

The NFL clubs will meet here Dec. 1 to make their first four selections in the annual draft. If league owners approve the draft reduction plan, it will go into effect at the annual meeting in January.

If approval is not unanimous, the proposal may be submitted in the form of a motion, in which case it will not be acted upon until the 1960 meeting.

Ott Critical Following Auto Wreck

BAY ST. LOUIS, Miss. (AP) — Mel Ott, 49-year-old Louisiana-born member of Baseball's Hall of Fame, lay critically injured Saturday in a hospital.

Ott was hurt Friday night in a two-car collision. The wreck seriously injured Ott's wife and killed the driver of the other car, Leslie S. Curry Sr., 50, of Bay St. Louis.

The former ace fielder and batter for the New York Giants, who broke into major league baseball when 17 years old and still holds the National League career home run record with 511, was in shock with multiple injuries.

Physicians said Ott had internal injuries, both legs broken and cuts about the head and arms.

Ott and his wife were transferred to a Gulfport hospital Saturday. Physicians there said he remained in shock and the expected outcome of his case was "extremely guarded," meaning there was no way to determine immediately his chances for recovery.

Mrs. Ott had brain concussion, a broken arm and cuts.

Officers were unable to determine how the accident happened. Both Ott and his wife were unable to talk. There were no other known witnesses to the crash.

A coroner's jury returned a verdict of accidental death in Curry's case.

Ott, a resident of Metairie, La., near New Orleans, was born at Gretna, La., also near New Orleans.

He retired from baseball in Jan. 1953, and went into the building construction business in New Orleans. In 1955 he took a job as a baseball announcer. During the baseball season he has worked at one of the play-by-play broadcasters on Detroit Tiger games.

Ott played 22 seasons from 1926 through 1947. Four times he was home run leader in the National League. He played 2,750 games and had a lifetime batting average of .304.

KU Varsity Cage Squad Drills Run On Timetable

"Work. Sacrifice and More Work," is the motto for Klamath Union coach Dean White and his 1958-59 varsity Pelican cage squad as they swing into the third week of preparations for the coming basketball season.

"The boys all understand that January and February games are being won or lost on the practice floor today," commented White, "and they know they have their work cut out for them this season."

In living up to their motto the Pelicans varsity, trimmed to 19 players Monday by White and his assistant Gene Strehlou, is all fired up over a practice timetable that moves them from one drill to the next without a second's loss. The only time that a player sits down is toward the tail end of the strenuous three hour sessions when only 10 of them can be on the court at one time in a full floor game scrimmage.

The approach to a season in which the Pelicans will do without the height available last year required a complete revamping of the training program.

Pel boss White has worked for the past three months on devising an organized training schedule based on the theory that complete detailed fundamental drills repeated day after day are the shortest, most direct route to building accomplished players.

The practice being completely charted beforehand, the Pelicans do not deviate from the plan in any manner, waste no time in moving from one drill to another and know ahead of time the exact minute of the beginning and end of practice.

"When the man knows he will miss a portion of a practice by being even a minute late and realizes that his tardiness may cost him a mistake in a ballgame he has a strong tendency to be on time and to keep up with his teammates," stated White.
