Atlas Firing Called Off

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A powerful Atlas missile sat poised in the open for several hours but the shoot finally was called off early Saturday for the second time in three days. . . The Air Force announced that once again technical troubles delayed the latest effort to fire the nation's intercontinental ballistic missile. The launching plans called for a 3,000 mile shot across the Atlantic. . . It was another long, but profitless night for Convair astronauts crewmen who checked the 100-ton missile through a lengthy preliminary countdown. . . Liquid oxygen, part of the giant rocket's fuel supply, whirled around the launch pad and left a thick coat of frost on the missile's frame. The "lox," as it is called, is stored inside the missile under extremely low temperatures and intense pressure. . . Just before the scrub was called a huge cloud of liquid oxygen popped from the base of the missile. The crewmen apparently were easing the pressure.

Voters Elect Negro Woman

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — The Houston school board Friday formally certified a Negro housewife as a winner in last week's school board elections. . . Mrs. Charles E. White, wife of an optometrist, thus became Houston's first Negro public office holder since reconstruction days. A board canvass showed she polled 35,349 votes, about 8,000 more than her nearest opponent, incumbent Dr. John Glen. . . A few days after Mrs. White's election a cross was burned in her front yard. Police have made no arrests in the case.

Syria Elects Patriarch

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — A new patriarch of Antioch and the Entire East will be installed Sunday by the Eastern Orthodox Church with the title of Theodosios VI. . . He is Archbishop Theodosios Abu Rjeleh, 70, of Tripoli, Lebanon. He was elected Friday by 12 bearded, black-robed Arab archbishops to serve as spiritual leader of the church in the United States and Latin America as well as Syria, Lebanon, Iraq and part of Turkey. . . He succeeds Patriarch Alexander III, who died June 17 at the age of 90, on what is regarded as the oldest throne in Christendom.

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) — Expensive proposition to run for governor? . . . The expense statement filed Friday by Democratic Governor-elect John Burroughs says it costs little more than peanuts. . . Burroughs is a peanut processor from Portales, N.M. He passed out bags of peanuts as advertising during his campaign. . . His total expenses for the campaign: \$836. Of that, the cost of peanuts was \$750.

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Directory Report Given By Civic Group

A progress report on compilation of a services directory, first project of the Community Council of Klamath County that was formed this summer, was heard at the annual meeting of the organization held at the Winema Hotel Thursday evening.

Ross Ragland, project chairman, said that the questionnaire form to be used in the compilation has now been decided upon and will be sent to all local organizations at the beginning of the year. The objective is to compile an information on the health, welfare and recreation services in the county. . . Another possible project for the council was brought up for discussion by Al Condrey, a member of the state judicial administration committee and of its sub-committee on juvenile matters.

Condrey proposed in a letter read at the meeting that the council take the lead in setting up a large, community-wide juvenile investigation committee. Such a body, like some already existing elsewhere in Oregon, would study through a number of sub-committees, the local juvenile problem in its broadest aspects, and not just in relationship to the law. Among other things, attention would also be given to strengthening job training and placement facilities for youth. The aim would be to make concrete recommendations in various fields.

Condrey was present at the meeting and took part in the discussion which led to adoption of a motion made by Rollin Cantrall that Chairman Herman (Bud) Smith appoint a committee of five to study Condrey's proposal and

to report at the council's next monthly meeting. Smith has thus far named Condrey and Wayne Blair to this committee.

It was announced that Lowell F. Turner, associate director of the field service division, United Community Funds and Councils, with headquarters in Portland, would be available as a special speaker early in December. It was hoped that he could address next month's council meeting, tentatively set for December 11.

Smith presided at the annual meeting; the invocation was given by the Rev. Robert L. Greene.

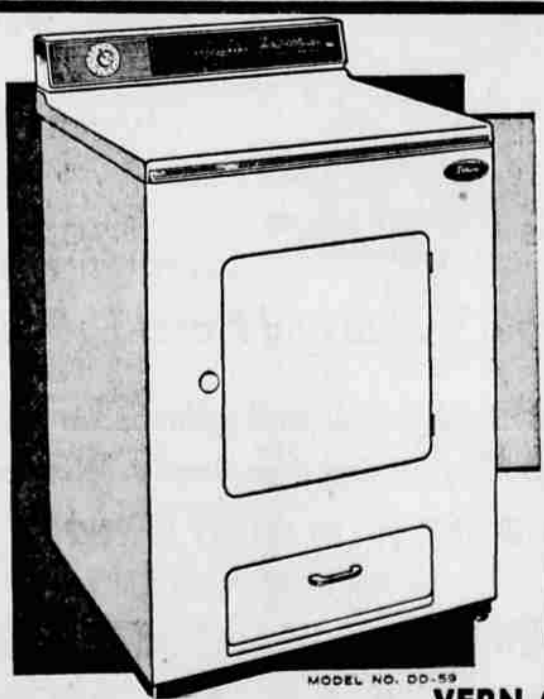
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
