Deer Depredation Hunt In California Lauded As Being Smashing Success; 40 Killed

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — A top official of California's Fish and Game Department says that the state's first deer depredation hunt under a 1957 law was a smashing success.

Harvey Russo, assistant to the chief of game management for the department, made the statement after returning from the hunt area in Monterey County.

The 1957 Legislature adopted a bill introduced by Sen. Stephen P. Teale (D-West Point) which allows the state to set depredation hunts—for either sex—at the request of ranchers troubled by deer.

Jack Wiley, who owns a ranch located about 10 miles south of Soladad, was the first to take advantage of the new law. He asked for the depredation hunt to clean out troublesome deer on his ranch, and the Fish and Game Commission approved the hunt.

The commission agreed to sell 40 permits. They went on the block September 13. More than 200 hunters showed up to take advantage of the hunt.

Outdoor experts had these worries:

1. How would the hunters act? Would they act like perfect gentlemen or would they tramp around, shooting at anything, and injure the farmer's land?

2. How would neighbors to the depredation area take the hunt? The answer came from Russo after he watched the hunt for three days.

"Everything went quite well," he said. "And all hunters got their deer. It would have been almost impossible not to do so." There was one exception to this. One hunter's gun broke and he didn't have time to get it fixed.

The Fish and Game Department gave the event blanket coverage. A number of officials, both on the state and local levels, were there as observers.

They also helped out. Russo said that three teen-age boys had a little difficulty cleaning out their deer and one of the regional Fish and Game Department officials helped the boys out.

"The hunters were very careful," Russo said.

He pointed out that Wiley's ranch included a vegetable growing area that has been suffering under the deer overpopulation. The deer entered the place by going around an eight-foot high "deer proof" fence and along a highway.

"A number of ranchers from the area were standing around during the hunt," said Russo. "They made no comment to me, but they seemed quite interested."

Russo said that several of the hunters went to Wiley's house after they had bagged their game and thanked Wiley and his wife for allowing them to use their property.

"If these people handle themselves properly all the time," said Russo, "it may be a means of overcoming the traditional rancher animosity toward hunters and lead to better relations between the two."

The game management expert pointed out that this type of hunt has several advantages over the type that was legal before the 1957 law.

The old law, still in effect if the rancher wants to use it, allows a

rancher to request the Fish and Game Department to grant him a killing permit. The department makes a study of the depredation problem and awards a permit for a certain number of deer.

"By the time one rancher—who has been up at night chasing deer off his land—kills and cleans a number of deer he's pretty fed up with the whole thing," said Russo. "With the new type of hunt, the work is done by the hunters and the rancher can just sit back and watch."

"Besides, a rancher was required under the old law to dispose of the deer to public institutions—and sometimes this was difficult to do."

The Fish and Game Commission, incidentally, is expected to act soon on another request for this type of depredation hunt—this one from extreme Northern California.

The request comes from a Siskiyou County rancher. "He's got quite a problem up there," said Russo, "and the commission may not be able to wait until its next meeting to act."

Feminine Super Sleuths Take Trail

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sherlock Holmes gets all the help he needs from Watson. But super sleuthing—a la Federal Bureau of Investigation—isn't so elementary.

Behind the men behind the FBI badges are some 5,000 women. College graduates can be assistants to the special agents.

A physical science background is a prerequisite for those who want to do blood analyses, make studies of hair and other shreds of evidence.

In the FBI communications center, switchboards, teletypes, and a radio network are manned by women around the clock.

There are positions, too, for women who know their languages.

An 80-word-a-minute stenographer can earn up to \$6,655 a year. A number had advanced to positions paying \$10,000 a year.

Forty-five-word-a-minute typists, paid up to \$4,885, have an opportunity to advance through an in-service training program.

Clerks start at \$2,960, can work into jobs paying up to \$8,150 a year.
