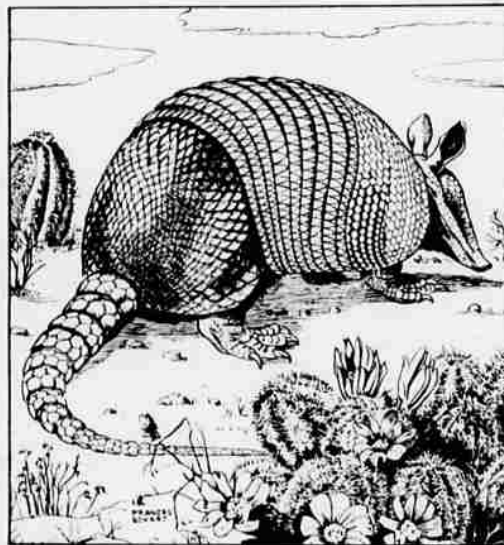
WHAT ANIMAL IS IT?

Ten Little Indians Ida M. Pardue

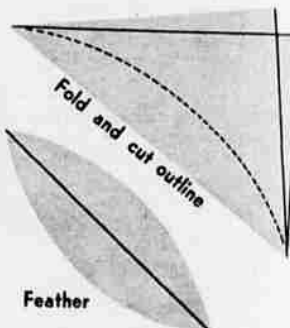
For this game you'll need three Indian-head nickels and some pencils and paper for keeping score. Players take turns shaking the three nickels in a cupped fist onto a

Make five feathers for each player (see diagrams). Use colored paper, or else color the feathers a different color for each player, using crayons or paint—five red, five yellow, five blue, and so on.

The players take turns. They stand over an empty oatmeal carton, cottage cheese carton, or similar container. Holding a feather 12 inches above the carton, they drop it. It isn't as easy as it sounds, and if no one gets a feather in the carton the first time around, try once again.

The player who gets the most feathers in the box wins.
