Freeway Drainage Problem Faces Dunsmuir Road Crew

DUNSMUIR — A porous mountain on one side and a densely populated area on the other side pose special drainage problems for a highway builder.

McCammion - Wunderlich Construction Company of Palo Alto, contractors for the 4 1/2 mile Highway 99 link through Dunsmuir, are trying out new drainage methods in an attempt to lick the alternate layers of oily clay and loose boulders found on the mountain-side west of Dunsmuir.

Two inch pipe, 69,000 feet in length, is being laid in horizontal borings in the embankments along the west side of the right of way. These horizontal "wells" tap the seepage that makes the hillside subject to tremendous slough-offs during rainy weather. The pipes are inserted up to 300 feet into the hillsides and the flow of water from them will be channeled into natural streams and drainage areas, tying in with the town drainage system. John Beale, McCammion - Wunderlich engineer, explained.

Deer Hunter, 64 Shot To Death

CORVALLIS (AP) — Ervin Hosford, 64, of Waldport was wounded fatally Saturday while deer hunting in the rugged backwoods area 35 miles west of here. Policeman Kenneth Moore said two other hunters, LeRoy Seavy, 40, and Chet Thayer, 50, heard Hosford's cries for help shortly after they fired seven shots at a deer. This was the fifth hunter killed by a bullet this season in Oregon.

bed. Beale admitted he had never seen the harmless appearing little creek in flood stage but realized from the boulders and debris along its banks that the huge culvert is none too large. The Little Castle Creek culvert will be topped with about 50 feet of fill taken from the adjoining mountainside. Last year, this site was the home of Mr. and Mrs. Guy DiMarco and housed their chicken ranch.

The largest culvert on the project is one at Little Castle Creek. It was literally swarming with men building and adjusting the forms for this 21 foot concrete curve that extends 224 feet along the creek.

Beale explained the drilling jobs had been subcontracted with Anderson Drilling Company doing the horizontal work and Roger Drilling Company doing the vertical work. Specialized equipment was needed for the vertical wells as the ground to be drilled consists of sandy clay and odd shaped boulders, both resistant to ordinary drilling methods. A miniature clam shell has been designed by the Rogers Drilling Company for this job.

Beale explained the present work schedule provides for completion of this specialized drainage work, day of work canceled by bad weather. Completion could be delayed well into the spring of 1960 by the weather.

The job is costing about a million dollars a mile which Beale said is normal for mountain highway construction. He said while the intensive measures for proper drainage are costly they will pay off in providing a stable base for the four-lane expressway.

Morse accused Neuberger of knifing when the junior senator invited the Hatfields for tea. Neuberger previously said he thought Hatfield and Morse were jockeying for political position, which they should cease in the interests of cooperation.

Civil Service Positions Open

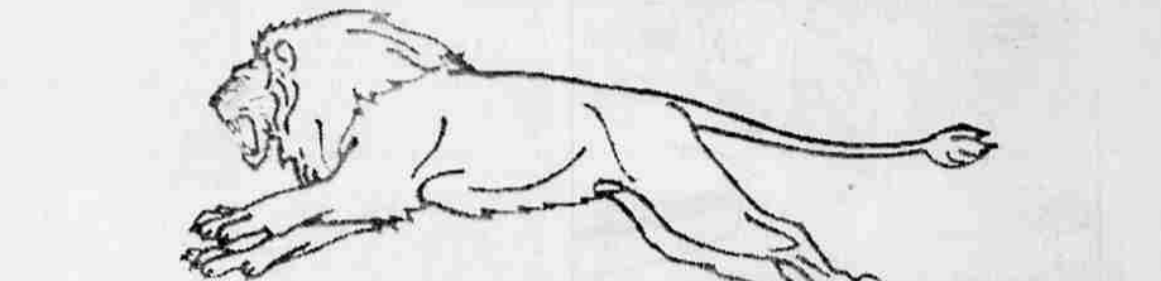
The Central Army Board of U.S. Civil Service Examiners, Seattle, Washington, has announced an examination for positions as unit aide (Army Reserve), \$4,040 to \$4,980 a year, for men. Duties include administrative, advisory, and instructing capacities.
