

NL Leader Against Boosting Big Leagues

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Warren Giles left New York's ambitious plans in his version of the facts of baseball life Monday night.

Forming a third major league, said the National League president, "is easier to accomplish through a press release than actually getting the cities, parks and players."

At the same time, Giles apparently is in opposition to Commissioner Ford Frick's hopes for an expansion of major league baseball.

Baseball, said Giles, must "keep a small structure, rather than enlarging it and diluting it." Speaking before more than 500 persons at a testimonial dinner for General Manager John Quinn of the Braves, Giles added:

"If enlargement means dilution of our product, we are not keeping faith with the people."

Giles said he favored cooperation within baseball on all levels — in player recruiting and if necessary, in the subsidization of the minor leagues to guarantee a

supply of talent for the majors. His views on a third major league were a follow-up to an announcement by the New York Mayor's Baseball Committee last week that it planned to form a third league — either within the present baseball structure or outside it, raiding the majors for players — in an effort to regain two-team status for the city.

Giles originally answered that announcement by saying he did not believe New York could regain a National League franchise by threats.

Frick is on record as being in favor of keeping New York open territory for a franchise in some subsequent expansion program.

On recruiting players, Giles said that meant cooperating with the high schools, colleges and little leagues.

"We must attract more players to the game," he said. "We must hold out to them the great opportunity baseball offers and encourage many to explore their abilities to reach the goal of a major league diamond."

Quinn heard himself described as "a great guy and a real champion" by a host of National and American League club officials.

Fred Haney, Milwaukee manager, said he hoped that when his turn came to leave baseball "I can step out of this game with the same respect and feeling baseball men have for Quinn."

Charlie Grimm, former Milwaukee manager, said that as long as Quinn guides the Braves "Milwaukee will never have to worry about a first division club."

New Faces Charge With Two Brothers

NEWARK, N.J. (UPI) — Cincinnati Redlegs pitcher Don Newcombe and his two burly brothers were to be placed today to charge they assaulted a former patrolman in their tavern last Dec. 22.

The pleading was set for 9:30 a.m. before County Judge James R. Guiliano — barring further legal postponements. Guiliano, exasperated at a one-day delay Monday, ordered the brothers to appear today or show "good" cause why they could not.

"These people are no different than anyone else," he said irately to the Newcombes' attorney.

The Cincinnati Redlegs pitcher was charged with his brother, Norman, of atrociously assaulting former East Orange patrolman Ulysses Ross in their tavern last Dec. 22.

Ross alleged the brothers assaulted him, threatened him with a gun and ejected him bodily from the tavern. A third brother, Harold, faced charges of unlawfully possessing a revolver with intent to use it.

The three heavy-set brothers have denied the charges. Don said Ross, a six-footer, "created a disturbance in the tavern and I put him out, that's all." The brothers were indicted on the assault charges last month by the Essex Grand Jury.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI) — Coach Tommy Prothro will conduct practice sessions behind closed gates this week as his Oregon State Beavers prepare for their annual rival game with Oregon Saturday.

Prothro said two of his men may miss the game. End Don Thiel is nursing a wrenched knee, and fullback Jim Stinette suffered a partial shoulder dislocation in the Stanford game.

Indiana has won three straight Big Ten games and Coach Phil Dickens admitted his team has played over its head.

Virginia has quarterback Reece Whitley — out since Oct. 11 — back for its game with Maryland. Whitley, the heart of Virginia's passing game, was joined by the Cavalier's leading ground gainer, Tom Gravins, who missed last week's South Carolina game.

Maryland brushed up on defense. Illinois lost soph fullback Bill Brown, its leading groundgainer, for Saturday's game with Northwestern. Senior fullback and Capt. Jack Delvaux, out much of the season with a bum leg, will take over the fullback spot.

End Doug Asad and guard Ross Asala were doubtful starters in Northwestern's camp.

Joe Kapp Said Top Grid Star

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — "This guy Joe Kapp," assistant football coach Dutch Fehring of Stanford was saying, "just has to be the finest college football player in the country today."

"He does everything and he does everything well. Right now he is getting a lot of press as a fine split-T quarterback."

"But do you know, if I was a pro coach, I'd draft him as a defensive player. That's how good he is on defense."

Fehring has been scouting Kapp and his University of California teammates as a prelude to the first annual "Big Game" between the two schools at Cal on Saturday. But aside from that he is so taken with the abilities of Kapp that he can talk all day on the subject.

The California signal caller is what the coaches might dream about when it comes to size: He stands 6-2, weighs 205 and is 20 years old—but alas, a senior. He hails from Newhall in Southern California.

"What strikes me about the boy is his ability to do what needs to be done," Fehring went on.

Against Washington last week, with California trailing, 6-7, he led to his right and threw a pass 37 yards through the air that the receiver caught right on the shelf. It was a perfect shot and picked up 47 yards.

"He is the best all-around player I've seen this year. And I've seen a lot of football, including some Big Ten teams, including Ohio State, which just beat Iowa."

The statistics seem to bear out Fehring's contention about Kapp being an "all-around player."

The California team records show this:

Rushing leader: Kapp with 540 yards.

Passing leader: Kapp with 591 yards.

Total offense leader: Kapp with 1131 yards.

Punting: Kapp fourth, with 31.3 average.

Interceptions: Kapp tied for lead with 2.

Punt returns: Kapp third with 8.5 average.

Kick-off returns: Kapp second with 20.8 yard average.

Scoring: Kapp third with 32 points on five touchdowns.

Because he does most of the passing, he was not listed in the receiving department — the only section in which his name failed to show.

But if you can believe Fehring, Joe Kapp probably will throw and then run down the field and catch one of his own passes in the Big Game against Stanford on Saturday.

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Coast's Top Players Mentioned For Honor

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — You hardly can hear their names above the tub-thumping but here are some West Coast players being mentioned for the UPI All-American football team:

Ends: Bill Steiger, Washington State—the stout senior was out all last season with a dislocated neck, came back to be hailed as one big reason why the Cougars have done so well with quarterback Bob Newman laid up. Dick Wallen, UCLA—although restricted to five games, the Bruins senior wingman picked up where he left off last year with fine catches and sharp defensive play.

Chris Burford, Stanford — a battling pass-receiver with a loser, he led the Pacific Coast Conference in receptions going into last Saturday's games and is considered a fine runner.

Tackles: Ted Bates, Oregon State—"never has a bad day," beams Coach Tommy Prothro. The 210-pound stopped Cal's Joe Kapp cold as the Beavers handed the Bears their lone conference defeat, 14-8. Bill Leeka, UCLA—sorely missed after his five games ran out. Dan Ficca, Southern California, tough blocker and last despite his 230 pounds.

Guards: Carlos Gonzales, Cal Poly (San Luis Obispo)—another 230-pounder who is rated a big factor in the Mustangs good season. He is a good blocker, tough on defense and averages about 45 yards per punt. Carl Kammerer, College of Pacific—top-notch line-backer who is hailed as one of the best by Coach Jack Myers.

Ken Kerr, Arizona (Tempe) State—already tapped by the Los Angeles Rams, he weighs 260 pounds and looks like a solid pro. Bob Grottkau, Oregon and Jim Brackins, Oregon State also have numerous campaign managers.

Centers: Ken Antle, Southern California—only weighs 185 but is a solid performer and has way of firing the squad up. Bob Peterson, Oregon—noted for his line defense. Helped hold Oklahoma to one touchdown victory. Merl Hitzel, Washington State—excels as line-backer and on pass defense.

Quarterbacks: Joe Kapp, California—had trouble learning split T last year and has run it like a master this season as the main cog in the Bears' comeback. Stan Jackson, Cal Poly of Pomona—a cool passer who has led the nation's small colleges in total offense. Jim Sochor—San Francisco State—triple threat man of the old school who has propelled "Gators to a fine season." Bob Newman, Washington State—referred to as still great although hurt most of season. Ralph Huntmaster, Arizona—nation's leading passer—John Hangartner, Arizona (Tempe) State—leads border Conference in total offense.

Halfbacks: Dick Bass—COP—
