That's when grudge games take over in the PCC, pitting Washington against Washington State, Oregon vs. Oregon State, and so on. Further south, it's Stanford and California in the Big Game and UCLA vs. Southern California.

Louisiana St. Rates Nod From UPI

NEW YORK (UPI)—Louisiana State, Auburn and Oklahoma are heavy favorites to extend their streaks in Saturday's major college football games.

The oddsmakers made top-ranked LSU a 14-point favorite to defeat Tulane and end the season with a perfect record while third-ranked Auburn was an 18-point choice to run its unbeaten string to 23 games at the expense of Wake Forest.

Oklahoma, ranked fourth nationally, once again was the highest favorite in this week's "line." The Sooners were picked to wallopp Nebraska by at least 32 points and clinch their 12th straight undisputed Big Eight conference championship.

Four games were rated toss-ups, including the key Southwest Conference clash between Rice and eighth-ranked Texas Christian and the Ivy League showdown between Dartmouth and Princeton. The other "pick 'em" games are Kentucky vs. Tennessee and Northwestern vs. Illinois.

Sixth-ranked Iowa, the Big Ten champion, was listed as a six-point choice over Notre Dame in the nationally televised game-of-the-week.

The remaining members of the UPI top 10 were picked to win by at least two touchdowns. Fifth-ranked Purdue was 15 over Indiana, and ninth-ranked Ohio State was 14 over Michigan.

No odds were being quoted on the game between the 10th-ranked Air Force Academy and New Mexico. Second-ranked Army will rest this week for its climactic meeting with Navy Nov. 29.

Spider Webb, Giardello Meet Tonight

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Middleweight contender Joey Giardello aims to enlist public support tonight in his campaign to win a shot at the title.

"If I put up a good fight, maybe the people will help me," says Joey who goes against Spider Webb at the Cow Palace in a 10-rounder televised by ABC at 10 p.m. EST.

Giardello, 28, is ranked No. 3 contender in the 160-pound division by both Ring magazine and the National Boxing Assn.

Webb, 26, a former Olympic boxer from Chicago, holds the No. 4 spot in the NBA ratings and No. 5 in Ring magazine's.

Both are good boxers with a punch. Webb showed his here last January when he knocked out tough Rory Calhoun in the fourth round after being down twice himself.

Webb has fought 33 times with 29 victories and has stopped 13. Giardello has 77 victories, 14 losses, 5 draws and 1 no-decision match.

Joey, who wants to force Sugar Ray Robinson into a title defense, found a ready ally in former heavyweight champ Joe Louis, here for the fight.

"Robinson is getting too hot," says the former Brown Bomber, "either Giardello or Webb could beat him."

Golf Stars To Open Cup Meet

MEXICO CITY (AP)—The glittering fairways and greens of deceptively beautiful Club de Golf Mexico were given a final trim today on the eve of the International Golf and Canada Cup matches.

A record field of 64 stars from 32 countries will tee off Thursday in the first of four 18-hole daily rounds on the tough 7,216-yard par-72 course on the outskirts of the Mexican capital.

The two-man team with the lowest combined score will win the Canada Cup. The individual low scorer will win the International championship.

"Anyone shooting 280 will win," predicted defending champion Torakichi (Pete) Nakamura of Japan, waving a chopstick over a hot Japanese meal delivered to him and teammate Kouchi Ono at the clubhouse.

"I think a 282 will be good enough," said young Gary Player of South Africa.

The man expected to shoot that winning low score, despite his age, is Ben Hogan of the United States. Hogan and Sammy Snead, both 46 and the oldest in the tournament, are also favored to win the team trophy.

Experts rate the U.S. team No. 1, followed by Japan, South Africa, England, Ireland, Australia, Sweden, Wales and Argentina.

Hogan and Nakamura are betting favorites, but they could be upset by Player, Snead, Wales, Dai Rees or Dave Thomas, Peter Allis Jr. of England or Flory van Donck of Belgium.

The world championship of golf opens on a national holiday, Mexico's Constitution Day and a large holiday crowd is expected to provide overflow galleries.

Hogan and Snead are matched against Argentina's strong Fiebel de Luca and Leopoldo Ruiz in the opening contests.

Japan's defending champions tangle with Mexico's host team of Jose Gonzalez and Juan Neri.
