West Virginia Waits For Bowl Bound Club

Reports from Miami say that Syracuse is the likely choice to oppose the Big Eight representative—most likely Oklahoma—in the Orange Bowl New Year's Day.

But at West Virginia, there's a non-poet type named Longfellow who could put the stamp of disapproval on Syracuse's post-season ambitions. He could turn the Mountaineers' so-so season into a successful one if they can defeat the Orange this Saturday.

The 21-year-old with the literary name is Dick Longfellow, senior quarterback and the Southern Conference's new offense leader. He picked up the Mountaineers, after four straight losses following an opening game victory, to three wins and a tie in their last four games.

Longfellow, a mite at 5 foot 9, has gained 1,127 yards in 9 games.

Double Role Colt Secret For Success

BALTIMORE (AP)—One secret to the success of the Baltimore Colts this season is that their offensive linemen are excellent defensive players.

That doesn't mean they go both ways. The Colts have plenty of good defensive specialists as attested to by two shutouts in their last three National Football League games.

But the offensive linemen, particularly between the ends, have to do a lot of defending of their passers.

"Nobody does a better job of protecting the passer than our line," praises Gino Marchetti. He's a defensive all-pro end for the Colts and one of the most feared pass rushers in the league.

"We have the best offensive guards and tackles in the league," adds Marchetti.

Don Joyce, the other end, agrees. "Gino and I have our toughest time of the year in the intrasquad game, trying to beat Jim Parker and George Preas," he says.

Parker's ability to make good as a pro tackle as a rookie last year was the big difference in the Colt offensive line. It permitted Coach Webb Ewbank to move Preas over to right tackle.

Preas is in his fourth pro year. Art Spinney has been at one guard for six seasons and Alex Sandusky is taking care of the other for the fifth year.

Between them is Madison (Buzz) Nutter in his third term as a starting center.

The ends are both veterans, too. Jim Mutscheller for five years and Raymond Berry for four.

The Colt passers have been so protected they went through four of their games without being dumped for a yard loss. In all, John Unitas and George Shaw have lost only 40 yards in the four other games.

By contrast, enemy passers have been thrown for a total loss of 178 yards by Marchetti, Joyce and their defensive mates.

The backfield averages 150.

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Bob White AP'S Pick For Week's Top Back

Bob White, Ohio State's fullback, has been named The Associated Press Back of the Week by the nation's sports writers and sportscasters for his strong performance against Iowa.

The 210-pounder hammered the Iowa defenses for 209 yards on 33 carries while scoring 3 touchdowns in Ohio State's 38-28 victory. He bore the brunt of the attack during the decisive 61-yard touchdown march.

White had to share the glory with Don Clark who carried 15 times for 132 yards although neither matched the yardage total of the losers' Randy Duncan, who made 246 yards net with a passing barrage.

Several other collegians received support in the balloting.

Pete Dawkins, Army's fleet half-back, scored three times in a 26-0 victory over Villanova. He broke open a scoreless game with an 80-yard punt return, raced 46 yards with a Joe Caldwell pass on a great exhibition of faking. Another 48-yard pass play from Caldwell brought the ball to the 5 from where Dawkins took it over.

Charley Milstead, a doubtful starter for Texas A&M against Rice because of a knee injury, played 50 minutes, passed for a touchdown and scored twice, gaining 183 yards. He also kicked 4 extra points in the 28-21 upset over the Owls.

California's Joe Kapp passed and ran for 205 yards against Washington. He was 66 per cent of California's total offense.

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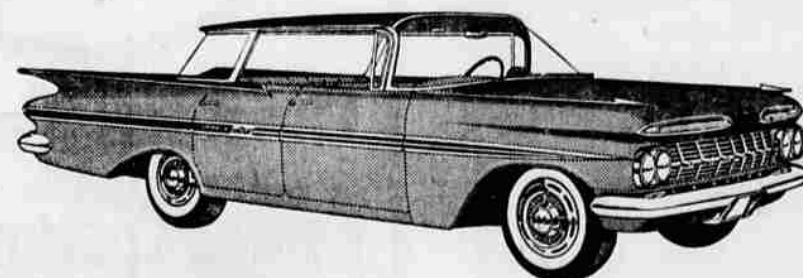
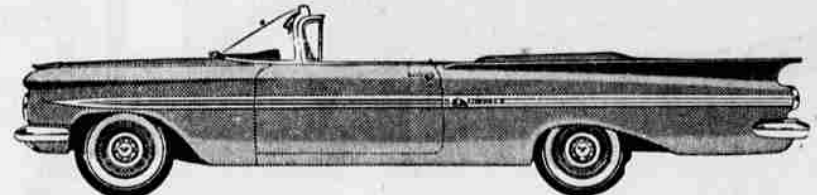
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
