School Slates New Course

McCloud — Dr. Kenneth Young, director of curriculum for Siskiyou County, announced this week that specific planning for construction of a new elementary course of study and curriculum guides, which may develop into a county-wide project was launched at the Yreka Elementary School November 4.

In attendance were about 35 teachers from the Yreka area plus administrators or their representatives from Dorris, Dunsmuir, Mount Shasta, McCloud and Weed. Dr. Victor Houston and Dr. Blaine Bounous from Chico State College submitted proposals in response to requests made by Robert Reynolds, superintendent of the Yreka Elementary School and other administrators that met in Yreka the previous week.

The following steps have been tentatively scheduled: Weed Elementary School, Dr. Bounous will meet at 4:15 p.m. November 18 with elementary administrators and teachers from eastern Siskiyou (Butte Valley and Tulelake) and southern Siskiyou County to determine the amount of interest in starting a project in either or both areas similar to the one being launched in Yreka which is described below, dates to be arranged.

Yreka Elementary School, Dr. Bounous will offer a one unit course, Education E-114A, elementary curriculum and materials, the first meeting began at 6 to 9 p.m. on November 18, Room 19, Jackson Street School. Three additional meetings will be held November 25, December 2 and December 9. Each participating teacher will pay \$2.50 instead of the regular \$8.50 fee, the difference to be borne by the Yreka School District with supplementary aid from the county office. The purpose of this course will be to develop a common background of understanding for selection of curriculum content.

Yreka Elementary School, beginning January 6, Dr. Bounous will offer a two unit course in curriculum construction (title to be determined later). Regular fees of \$17 will be collected. Ten meetings at from two to four week intervals will be completed by May 19. Southern and eastern Siskiyou: Similar arrangements will be made if there is sufficient enrollment to justify holding classes in these areas.

Siskiyou summer sessions, these continuing courses could be offered: Pre-session, June 9 to 12, one hour resident credit, and post-session, July 27, August 7 or August 10 to 21, for two hours of resident credit. Course for fall, 1959: A fall course could be offered to complete work on the course of study or in place of the proposed summer sessions at the wish of the majority who will be involved.

Under the above plan, Siskiyou teachers will have an opportunity to earn at least six hours of credit and at the same time develop good working plans to improve educational programs.

Magazine Views Basin Council

The Community Council of Klamath County is the subject of an article in the November issue of Community, monthly magazine of the United Community Funds and Councils of America, Inc., New York City.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Giuseppe Tempone, questing after the American dream, came to this country 36 years ago and started out as a shoeshine boy. Twenty-five years ago he hooked onto NBC, a broadcasting company of promise, in a loose but lucrative relationship.

Thursday, turning 60, having worked his way through the president's office, he found himself in the office of the chairman of the board — shining the chairman's shoes.

It was a happy occasion. Giuseppe got a gold watch and a certificate from Robert Sarnoff, the chairman, honoring his 25 years of shining service to NBC. He kept repeating, "Oh, this is terrific."

Giuseppe — actually he's "Joe" to everybody around NBC — is a wiry 3-foot-3 grandfather with graying hair and eloquent brown eyes, a man of poise, dignity, engaging charm and (Oh, well) polish. He is not employed by NBC but rambles over 10 skyscraper floors shining daily 70 pairs of shoes, most of them on NBC employees' feet.

The feet have included those of

about everybody of note who has worked in the building, from the great Fred Allen to John D. Rockefeller Jr., a proprietor of the place — the RCA Bldg., part of Rockefeller Center.

How many Rockefeller have been his customers? "Junior—and all the boys," Giuseppe said. He declined to disclose what Junior pays for a shoe shine. Matter of fact, Giuseppe is known as a man of outstanding integrity in the matter of confidences.

He has shined shoes through many executive sessions and, thus, been privy to many confidential utterances — and never breathed a word.

As an example of his friendship with many: "Nelson Rockefeller, the next day after he was elected governor, came in and rushed over and shook my hand. My hands were full of shoe-black, but he didn't care."

In a quarter-century of wandering in and out of studios on business, Giuseppe has been on the air many times for impromptu interviews. He first got an radio in 1937 ("I was interviewed on some kind of mishmash"), broadcast in behalf of war bonds in World War II, and has been on TV.

Nowadays, he is heard frequently chinning with Bill Cullen, master of ceremonies on "Pulse," a highly popular local early-morning radio show of news, weather, records, and wake-up chitchat. Giuseppe's good Italian dialect

actually helps along his conversational mike style.

"Bill Cullen gave me a new botch set for my anniversary," he said. "It's a fine one; musta cost \$30." What kind of set? "Botch set," said Giuseppe. He

was referring to "botchi," the Italian bowling game.

The basic fee for a Giuseppe shine is 15 cents. However, such is the satisfaction of his customers that "I never get less than a quarter, and often more."

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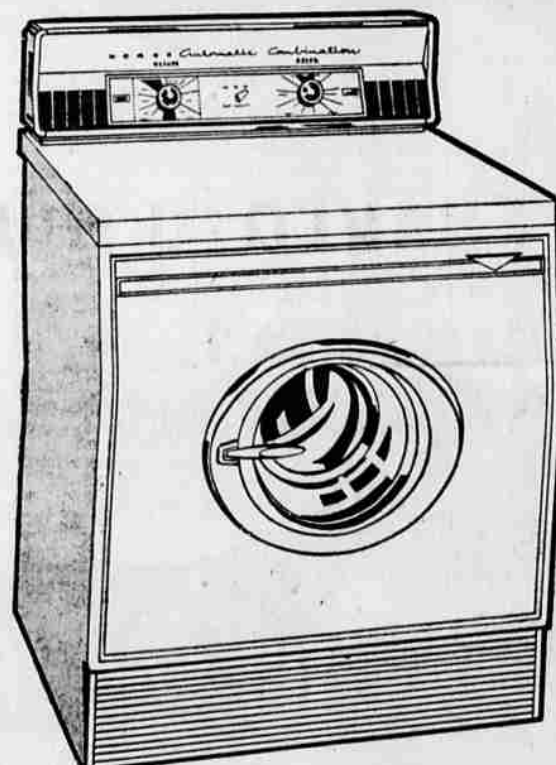
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
