Yank Requests Permission To Search For Snowman

KATHMANDU, Nepal (UPI) — American oil millionaire Tom Slick today asked the Nepalese government for permission to send an expedition into the Himalayan Mountains to search for the abominable snowman.

The four-man team was expected to concentrate its search in the Barun Valley of the Everest and Makalu Ranges, but it may visit the mountain kingdom of Mustang to examine the skin of a strange animal that could be the mysterious, human-like creature oft-times sighted in the mountains.

The expedition will include two Britons, one American and an Indian zoologist. It will remain in the mountains for six months according to the plans Slick submitted to the Nepalese government.
