### Norfolk Council Informed Plea To Governor Denied

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — Local voters advised the City Council in an informational referendum Tuesday that they do not want six closed white schools returned to city control for integrated operation. It was the first time the question had been put to residents in any of the three localities in which schools are closed under Virginia's massive resistance to integration laws. Unofficial returns from the city's 46 precincts gave 12,340 votes against requesting Gov. J. Lindsay Almond Jr. to return the schools to 8,712 votes for making the request. The outcome of the balloting is not binding on the council, although at least five of its seven members had indicated they would act on a majority vote. Three junior high and three senior high schools have been closed since Sept. 29 when the City School Board, complying with a Federal Court desegregation order, enrolled 17 Negroes. State law requires the immediate closing of any public school in which the races are mixed. The law also provides that the governor may, at his discretion, return any closed school to the locality if the local governing body and school board so ask. But if it is returned and opened on an integrated basis, state funds are cut off. A footnote on Tuesday's ballot said that if the schools were returned and opened on an integrated basis, it would be necessary to charge parents of school children "substantial" tuition to make up for the loss of state money. The fact that Norfolk — where some 10,000 children have been denied entrance to public schools for two months — sided with the administration's program will doubtless strengthen the view that there has been no appreciable change in voter sentiment on the controversial issue of racially mixed schools since the Nov. 4 general election.
