Murder Trial Hears Expert

THE DALLES, Ore. (AP)—A pathologist from Boise, Idaho, testified Wednesday at the second degree murder trial of Douglas Jake, 35, that none of the injuries inflicted upon Jake's wife caused her death.

"In my opinion the woman died of pulmonary edema," Dr. Joseph Beeman said, explaining that is a wetness of the lungs, which means she drowned in fluid from her own system.

Jake, a rancher on the Warm Springs Indian Reservation, is being tried in Wasco County Circuit Court. He is charged with beating his wife, Ethel, to death with a wine bottle.

Dr. Beeman's testimony conflicted with that of Dr. Warren C. Hunter, director of pathology at the University of Oregon medical school and the man who performed the autopsy.

Dr. Hunter had said he believed the injuries were sufficient to cause Mrs. Jake's death and said she died either Sept. 5 or 6, while Dr. Beeman said he believed she died Sept. 4.

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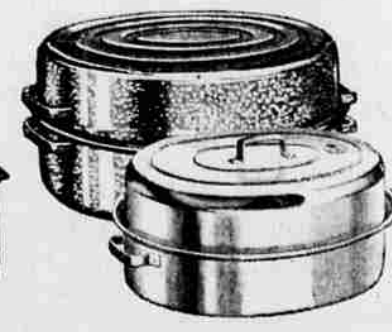
