

# Above-The-Neck-Falsies Latest Thing For Women

NEW YORK (UPI)—The ladies who have already improved their figures by adding a bit here and there are being offered such improvements above the neck.

The newest makeup calls for false eyelashes, false eyebrows, and false hairpieces, says Guy Nicolet, a Frenchman who has made over feminine faces from Cairo to California.

To show what he means about the new look, Nicolet described how he would make up two models for a gathering which his boss, Elizabeth Arden, is staging for her sales representatives Friday night.

"We'll show a last year's girl and a 'last year's girl,'" said Nicolet. "The 'last year's' will be decked out in the sackiest sack we could find, wearing no rouge.

done up in pale makeup, with pointed eyebrows, and lipstick in two shades — a dark outside line and lighter inside.

"This year's will wear an empire gown, lots of eye makeup, a false hairpiece, false lashes, lots of rouge — the Empress Josephine wore lots of rouge, you know. We'll use a pale pink foundation and powder, and shape her eyebrows to a thin, high line like Harlow or Dietrich. Most women don't have much eyebrows anyway and have to fake them."

For added phyness, he will mix "star sprinkle," a harmless gold dust, on her eyeshadow, in her hair and on her lipstick.

Nicolet does not recommend that we women put on all this gaudy for supermarket or office; save it for evening and grand occasions.

Advocating that women wear more makeup for daytime gets pretty discouraging anyway, he indicated. "If I advise too many things, the woman won't do. So I try to tell her how she can draw attention to her good features with skillful application of cosmetics."

Nicolet, whose home base is Paris, travels the world to advise women. He started his career because an uncle was a motion picture producer in France. His uncle signed him on in 1942 as "about the fifth ranking makeup man" on a picture, and since he has done theatrical makeup both in Hollywood and New York.

He joined Mrs. Arden 11 years ago.

"Fashions in clothes determine fashions in makeup," said Nicolet. "I won't know specifically what I'll see the new collections in Paris. But I do think we will see hair styles a lot simpler and smoother, no longer bouffant. Lipstick will be light again, pink with a yellow cast instead of blue."

Nicolet said his work with American women has convinced him we all make one makeup error — "trying to look sun-tanned the year round." "All of you wear your foundation too dark," he said. "Looks terrible with winter clothes and furs."

## Star's Condition Still Critical

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The condition of Tim (Kingfish) Moore still is critical, attendants at General Hospital reported Thursday. The 70-year-old actor was taken to the hospital Oct. 10. He is suffering from advanced tuberculosis.

## Amos, Of Amos 'n' Andy, Appointed Ike Emissary

WASHINGTON (AP)—"Andy," plain this to me: I got this letter from the White House—

"Now, wait a minute, Amos. You been dreaming again. Ain't that right Kingfish?"

"Yeah. Sure sounds that way. Amos, you got as much chance of gettin' a letter from the White House as you is to become Kingfish of the Mystic Knights of the Sea."

Amos was right, though. The White House itself made the announcement Thursday.

Freeman F. Gosden, the original

Amos of Amos 'n' Andy, has just been appointed a special U.S. ambassador.

President Eisenhower named Gosden as one of a 10-man delegation to represent him at the Nov. 28-Dec. 4 inauguration of Don Adolfo Lopez Mateos as President of Mexico.

Gosden, a one-time tobacco salesman from Richmond, Va., has played golf with Eisenhower at Denver. The White House described him as a long time personal friend of the President.

The 59-year-old Gosden — or rather, the Amos he long portrayed — has been a household word to radio and many TV fans almost since the crystal set days.

Amos is a wistful, trusting soul — often the victim of the boastful Andy — originated by Charles J. Correll — and the big dealing Kingfish. They are just a few of the colorful characters who populate the blackface comedy-variety series.

The original Gosden-Correll team, both white, still plays Amos 'n' Andy on radio. A Negro cast fills the parts on a televised series.

## Fish Group Weighs Plan

PORTLAND (AP)—A plan for permanent facilities to haul spawning salmon upstream beyond Snake River hydroelectric plants is under study, Dean Marriage, Oregon Fish Commission water resources analyst, said Thursday.

He said the proposal by the Idaho Power Co. was before the Oregon Fish Commission, the Oregon Game Commission, the Idaho Fish & Game Dept. and the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service.

The plan, if it provides a solution, would nearly complete the overall migrant fish handling at Idaho. Power's Brownless, Osborn and Hells Canyon dams, he said.

"Fish production facilities also would remain to be worked out for offsetting losses of fish due to the inefficiency of fish passage facilities and flooding of spawning grounds by the reservoirs," Marriage said.

## Solon Urges Dam Support

PORTLAND (AP)—In a letter to Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex.), Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore) urged Thursday support for construction funds for Green Peter Dam in Oregon.

Neuberger said work on Green Peter, a Santiam River dam, has been "impeded because of the administration's reluctance to support new federal undertakings on the nation's rivers."

"This backward viewpoint," he said, "can be turned aside by decisive congressional action."

He said the Army Corps of Engineers could use 2 1/2 million dollars in construction funds in the coming fiscal year.

## Search For 3 To Continue

REEDSPORT, Ore. (AP)—A search was to continue Friday for three missing men, whose 50-foot boat was found late Thursday wrecked on the beach at the mouth of the Unquiqua River, near here.

The boat, the dragger C. T. Holland, was found by the Coast Guard just north of the north jetty at the river's mouth.

Coast Guard headquarters at Seattle said the craft was badly battered. Its pilot house and mast had been ripped away.

The missing men are Robert Peterson, 23, and Robert Quallsel, 35, both of Winchester Bay, Ore., and Robert Wheeler, 23, Reedsport.

They left here Monday and were scheduled to return Thursday but fear for the lives was raised when storms buffeted the region.

Four lifejackets were found on the beach and Coast Guard personnel launched a search of the immediate area for any sign of the men.

## Hollywood Celebrities Pay Last Respects To Ty

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Stars, near-stars and just plain fans by the hundreds pay final respects today to Tyrone Power at a military funeral.

Two hundred elite among the mourners—his friends and fellow screen celebrities, invited by his widow — will crowd a chapel in Hollywood Memorial Park Cemetery at noon.

A thousand others on folding chairs on the lawn outside will hear the rites over loudspeakers.

Cmdr. Thomas M. Gibson, USNR, Presbyterian minister, will officiate. Cesar Romero will read the eulogy. The flag-draped mahogany casket will remain closed.

Then a Medal of Honor winner and five other Marine officers, three of them World War II acquaintances of Power's, will carry the casket to a grave near a lake opposite the cemetery's mausoleum.

Power, 44, died in Madrid, Spain last Saturday after a heart attack on a movie set.

## News Editor Wins Position

PORTLAND (AP)—The 37-year-old news editor of the Daily Journal of Commerce—Vernon White — was named Multnomah County GOP chairman Thursday replacing Alan Green.

White, the only candidate, was nominated by Francis I. Smith, the county chairman before Green.

More than 100 of the 200 party members present voted. They also gave a standing ovation to Green and adopted a resolution thanking him. He resigned prior to the Nov. 4 election.

Before the election a statement from Gov.-elect Mark Hatfield was read by an aide, Travis Cross.

"May I put aside all rumors that I seek to indicate from above who the party leaders should be," the statement said, then added that this "is your decision as elected officials."

"Throughout the state there were industrious committees at work in behalf of your candidate for governor—committees cooperating with the central committee, but organized independently," it said.

"In many instances personnel will be available to take their places among the Republican officialdom should you so choose to use their talents in such fashion."

"I hope you see fit to utilize these potentials for effective action."

Corey in Hospital  
SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—Wendell Corey is in a hospital with a gastric disorder.

The 40-year-old actor complained of severe chest and stomach pains while at work on a television film. He was rushed to St. John's Hospital, where his doctor said he will remain for observation.

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
