The next meeting of the club will be held in the grange hall on Sunday, December 21. This will be the club's annual Christmas party when husbands and families of the members are invited.

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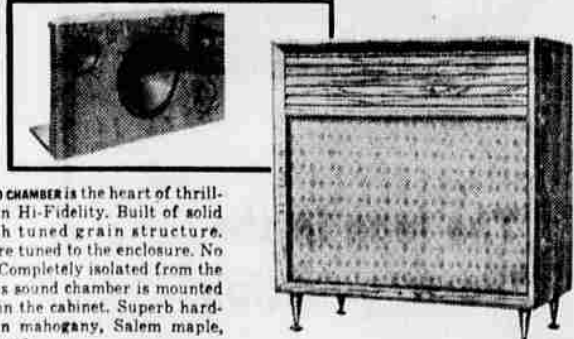
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
