Everything has its ups and downs, and Oregon Tech basketball coach Wally Palmberg is thinking these days that the Owls' dominance of the Oregon Collegiate Conference cage scene may be coming to an end this year.

The Owls, under Palmberg's guidance, have won two straight OCC titles, but the pre-season outlook this year is one of gloom. Palmberg lost all five of his starters last year, and his "sixth" man from the championship team.

"The big task facing the Owl mentor now is to fill the shoes left vacant by all-conference stars Johnny McCutcheon, Jerry Easton and Truman Williams. The loss of John Rhine, Charlie Bogle and Rod Alessio will also be felt at the Mile High Campus this winter.

Iowa Hawkeyes Rock Fighting Irish, 31-21

(IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP))—Iowa's Big Ten football champions, their pride stung by a 38-20 loss to Ohio State, rocked Notre Dame 31-21 Saturday in a blistering football duel.

The Rose Bowl-bound Hawkeyes, finishing their regular season with a 7-1 record, raced into a 15-0 lead early in the second quarter and broke Notre Dame's last quarter challenge with two quick touchdowns.

Iowa thus joined Michigan State and Pittsburgh as the only teams to whip the Irish in three consecutive games.

Intentionally Cops Pimlico Futurity Race

BALTIMORE (AP)—Intentionally, owned by Harry Isaacs of Baltimore, ran off Saturday with the first prize of \$121,416 in the Pimlico Futurity.

The dark brown 2-year-old finished nearly two lengths ahead of Briardale Farm's Rico Tesin. King Richard's Black Hills was third and John E. McAuliffe's McLellan fourth in the line of nine going for a gross purse of \$168,000.

Bringing up the rear in the second highest race this season were Cockfield Stable's Nimmer, Mrs. E. D. Jacobs' That Lucky Day, Pin Oak Farm's Derrick, Cambridge Stable's Pilot and Edward S. Voss' Flying Scud.

Intentionally, winning his fifth race in 11 starts and his second futurity this year, paid \$4,600, \$2,800 and \$2,200. Rico Tesin returned \$3,600 and \$3,200, and Black Hills \$2,600.

Ridden by the nation's leading jockey, Willie Shoemaker, Intentionally ran the mile and a sixteenth in a comparatively slow 1:46.

students enrolled at Oregon Tech. Of this number, 133 are "out of state." Subtract 18 from 133 and you'll find that there are one or two more non-athlete students at OTI. This should wipe out the inference Lightner has cast that OTI's interest lies out of state and not in Oregon.

This to us seems irrelevant to the subject which was at hand—Oregon Tech's ineligible football players. Whether or not they are from out of state has no bearing on the case.

To tell off his yarn, Lightner wrote, "It is believed that at least three of the ineligible players are transfers from California junior colleges." This may be true, but there are 72 California students enrolled at Oregon Tech this fall, which makes the percentage of football players mighty small. Nine of these were football players, that's one-eighth according to our mathematics.

As far as the proposed Williams-OTI meeting for the Northwest's small college football championship in a post-season game, we still think it's fine. Both schools have great ball clubs, their records show it.

We think that if such a game was scheduled today, coach Rex Hunsaker would not have any trouble at all getting his spirit-braked squad back on the field and ready to meet the Bears. Those boys were hit harder by the news of the forfeiture than any Williams line man is capable of. They have withstood it like men, just like they would a meeting with Williams.

It's all over now—but the talking. But we still are inclined to think that it would have been a financial success for both schools—win, lose or draw.

When Oregon Tech broke the news, we wired all of the coaches in the Oregon Collegiate Conference for a statement of some sort as to their thoughts on the situation.

Dr. Bill McArthur of OCE and Archie Dunsmoor of Eastern Oregon were the only ones to reply — and the invitation of a collect wire was made not costing them a red cent. Portland State's Les Leggett and Southern Oregon's Al Atkins turned us down without even a "no comment."

Said McArthur: "Indeed unfortunate that ineligible players were allowed to represent OTI and thereby void what otherwise would have been an outstanding football season for the Owls. I have some difficulty in understanding cause for misinterpretation of the rules concerning transfers."

Said Dunsmoor: "I regret the OTI eligibility troubles. It is noteworthy that it was self-reported."

A statement heard from three different Klamath Falls businessmen interested in any form of athletics—high school or college: "It's too bad for the boys. But I am still very pleased with the type of football I saw this year. OTI had a great ball club, and the boys played the brand of football we all like to see."

The Owls will have the services of Norm Oliva, an ex-Malin High all-state basketball player, who is transferring from Southern Oregon College. Oliva lettered two years as a starter for the Red Raiders and was an all-conference selection as a freshman two years ago. He is now waiting out the 18-week conference transfer rule before he becomes eligible for competition. In work, Oliva has shown the spark that made him an all-conference selection at SOC.

Oregon Tech's basketball season opens on the Owls' home floor December 5-6 when Humboldt State College comes calling. The initial Oregon Collegiate Conference play of the season is scheduled after the first of the new year.

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Orange Receives Bowl Bid

MORGANTOWN, W. Va. (AP)—Syracuse won a place in the Orange Bowl on New Year's Day by edging West Virginia 15-12 Saturday in a bruising football game decided by extra points.

Syracuse's acceptance was announced immediately after the game, which was watched by representatives of the Orange Bowl. The Orangemen will play Oklahoma, the perennial champions of the Big Eight Conference.

It was the pinpoint passing of quarterback Chuck Zimmerman that enabled the Orangemen to finish their 1958 season with an 8-1 record.

Zimmerman, a three-year veteran, capped his career by tossing passes to end Dave Baker for both Syracuse touchdowns. The decisive extra points were scored by fullback Ed Keiffer on an end run and Al Gerhek on a placekick.

Zimmerman passed eight yards to Baker in the end zone for the first touchdown.

The Mountaineers took the next kickoff and stormed 73 yards to score in 10 plays, cutting the margin to 8-6. Quarterback Dick Longfellow sneaked over for the last yard. Fullback Glen Shamblin was stopped short on a run attempt for conversion.

In the second period, Syracuse guard Maury Youmans caught a Longfellow pass on the Mountaineer 23. On the next play, Zimmerman passed to Baker for a touchdown.

Mountaineer halfback Ray Peterson grabbed a Zimmerman pass on the Syracuse 27 to set up their third quarter TD. West Virginia scored in nine running plays, with quarterback Danny Williams carrying the last five.

Colts Picked Over Rams; 49ers Favored

It's the Colts by seven, and Shaw or Unitas pick 'em.

The pregame show Sunday will belong to Baltimore Coach Webb Ewbank when he chooses between the two star quarterbacks. Then it will be up to the Colts, led by either George Shaw or Johnny Unitas, to make good on the seven-point favoritism over the Los Angeles Rams.

The Colts (7-1) are leading the National Football League's Western Conference by two games, and Los Angeles (5-3) is tied for second with the Chicago Bears.

A record Baltimore professional football crowd — 57,557 — will turn out to see if the Colts, who have whipped the Bears twice, can turn back the challenge of the Rams who have won three straight. The teams meet again Dec. 6 in Los Angeles.

Sunday's game is the big one because a Colt victory will put the Rams three games back with three to play.

The Bears are at the Detroit Lions Sunday in the other important Western Conference game, while the Cleveland Browns, Eastern Conference front-runners, are home to Philadelphia. The Bears are three-point underdogs to the much-improved Lions (3-4-1), while the Browns (6-2) are 12-point favorites to whip the Eagles (2-5-1) and at least maintain their

Cannon Leads LSU To 62-0 Grid Triumph

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Halfback Billy Cannon spurred top-ranked Louisiana State into explosive action Saturday and the unbeaten Tigers crushed Tulane 62-0. The rout practically clinched the national championship and sent LSU into the Sugar Bowl.

The 34,000 fans who turned out under brilliant skies set a record attendance for a Deep South football game.

The 205-pound Cannon considered a cinch for All-America honors, cracked a scoreless game with a touchdown late in the second quarter and the Tigers turned the traditional battle into a rout.

Quarterback Warren Rabb and halfback Johnny Robinson gave Cannon a good run for individual honors.

Rabb passed for two touchdowns in the final quarter and Robinson scored four times, once on a 23-yard pass from Rabb in the final minutes. Cannon scored three touchdowns.

The defeat was the worst inflicted in the 63-year-old series, one of the most bitter in the South.

The kicking of LSU's Tommy Davis was a highlight of the first half. His 50-yard boots kept Tulane pinned deep in its own territory until the Tigers broke the ice four minutes before the half ended.

Cannon capped the first touchdown drive, a 75-yard march in 11 plays, by spinning over from the five yard line.

In the second half Rabb fooled the Tulane defense with a tricky reverse and swung eight yards around end for a score.

Robinson scored on a 34-yard pass play from Rabb.

Earl Buchholz Posts Win In Wales Action

SYDNEY (AP)—Young Earl Buchholz of St. Louis gave Australians another exhibition of his devastating power play and posed a threat to continued Australian domination of world tennis Saturday.

Buchholz, only 18, handed a 6-4, 6-6, 6-1 defeat to the experienced Australian Graham Lovett in the third round of the New South Wales Championships here.

Following his defeat of the highly regarded Mal Anderson Friday, Buchholz again amazed Australians with the ease of his conquest. Lovett is no world beater, but he is a dogged trier who has taken many scalps.

On the other side of the picture, second-line Australians beat Ham Richardson of Arlington, Va., and Nicola Pietrangeli of Italy, two of the top visiting players here for Davis Cup matches in the next few weeks.

Top-seeded Ashley Cooper, the Wimbledon champion, dominated his match with another American, Barry MacKay of Dayton, Ohio, for an easy 6-3, 11-9, 6-4 triumph. It was their first clash in Australia this season, and Barry, although he tried hard, never seemed to have a chance.

Bob Mark, 20, was the conqueror of Richardson. He chalked up a 2-6, 6-4, 5-7, 7-5, 7-5 result after a two and a half hour battle. Richardson said later that considering he has been in Australia only a week he is not terribly unhappy about his form.

Another 20-year-old Australian, Rod Laver, toppled Pietrangeli 10-2, 3-6, 6-3, 6-8, 6-4.

At this stage, neither Mark nor Laver has any chance of playing Davis Cup singles for Australia.

Buchholz was not considered good enough to be seeded in the eighth of 16 overseas stars in the tourney. He is the first overseas player into the quarter-final. Unlike the three others so far in the quarter-finals—Cooper, Laver and Mark—Buchholz has not lost a set in his three matches.

WSC Regent Blasts U of W

SPOKANE (AP)—A member of the Washington State College Board of Regents said Friday night that perhaps WSC should consider knocking Washington off its football schedule.

William Goodwin of Tacoma told a WSC football rally that he was deeply disappointed when Washington announced its withdrawal from the Pacific Coast Conference to join up with Southern California, UCLA and California.

"The University of Washington let us down, they really let us down," he said as Cougar alumni applauded. "Maybe we shouldn't schedule them any more if they're going to treat us as patsies."

"We're not patsies and we're not going to be patsies, for them or anyone else."

Goodwin walked to the microphone with his overcoat on, having just arrived from a joint dinner meeting of WSC and Washington regents. He said he expressed similar sentiments there.

Hack Named Denver Manager

DENVER (AP)—Stan Hack, former Chicago Cubs manager and a Cub infielder for 16 seasons, was named manager of the Denver Bears of the American Association Saturday.

Hack, who will be 49 on Dec. 6, was a coach for the St. Louis Cardinals the last two seasons. He succeeds Andy Cohen as skipper of the Denver club at a time when the Bears have ended their four-year affiliation with the New York Yankees. So far they have not tied up with any other major league team for the 1959 season.

240 YARDS FOR ANDY

WEST POINT, N.Y. (AP)—Cadet Bob Anderson of Cocos, Florida, who set a U.S. Military Academy yardage record last year, is off and running in his junior year as an Army halfback. He gained 123 yards on 18 attempts for a 6.9 average against Virginia. It ran his yards gained on the ground to 335 for the first four games and gave him a 5.3 average for 63 carries. Counting three passes received, three punt returns and one kick-off return, Andy covered 240 yards as Army beat Virginia, 35-6, for its fourth straight.

ST. LOUIS (UPI)—Sluggish Stan Musial hinted he was feeling a bit older Friday as he celebrated his 38th birthday. Musial was pleased that Solly Henus, new St. Louis Cardinal manager, was planning to use him in only about two-thirds of the Red Birds' 154-game schedule.

Sooners Soar

NORMAN, Okla. (AP)—The superior manpower of the Oklahoma Sooners paid off with a 40-7 multiple — honored victory over the Nebraska Cornhuskers Saturday.

The triumph awarded the Sooners their 11th straight Big Eight Conference football championship under Coach Bud Wilkinson and fifth trip to the Orange Bowl in Miami where they meet Syracuse.

Oklahoma also has gone through 71 Big Eight games without a defeat.

Sooners zipped into a 21-0 lead the first three times it got the ball. But Nebraska settled into a stout defense and held the Sooners scoreless in the second quarter.

Auburn Victor

AUBURN, Ala. (AP)—Tommy Loring, out of action for three weeks with a torn shoulder, ran through the Wake Forest line like water through a sieve Saturday and Auburn hammered its way to a 21-7 victory.

The 165-pound senior climaxed his performance with a 33-yard scoring run that put the Tigers a safe distance in front in the fourth period.

It was Auburn's 23rd consecutive game without defeat.

The spectacular passing of Richard Wood, a junior quarterback, accounted for 70 yards on four aerials on one touchdown drive.

Austin Gallops

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J. (AP)—Rutgers' Bill Austin, playing only part time and with a cast on one arm, scored five touchdowns, two on runs of 52 and 65 yards, to lead the Bowl-hopeful Scarlet to a 61-0 massacre of Columbia Saturday.

Hoosiers Hold

LAFAYETTE, Ind. (AP)—Indiana's Hoosiers climaxed their first respectable football season in

11 years Saturday by fighting Purdue's Boilermakers, ranked No. 8 nationally, to a 15-15 tie.

Tom McDonald, Indiana's second-string tailback, threw two touchdowns passes and a conversion pass in a brilliant relief role for Ted Smith.

Smith was hurt on the first play from scrimmage and didn't get back into the game until late in the fourth quarter.

Harvard Rolls

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—Harvard took its cue from pint-sized quarterback Charlie Ravel and a punishing defense for a 20-0 revenge victory over Yale Saturday as 40,200 watched.

Ravenel, the 159-pound sophomore, scored the first touchdown on the final play before the half and was the dominant figure in the other scoring marches.

Harvard's line repeatedly squelched injury-weakened Yale's attempts to move the ball downfield in this 75th meeting between the traditional Ivy League rivals.

Point-hungry Harvard also got touchdowns runs of 20 yards from Chet Bourlis, 16 from Larry Repsher and two from Albion Cullen.

Ivy Champions

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP)—Dartmouth won the Ivy League football championship Saturday, defeating Princeton 21-12 on Bill Gundy's passing and John Cromhamel's running.

Trailing 12-8, Dartmouth launched a third period aerial attack climaxed by Gundy's toss to Seth Strickland for 23 yards and touchdown.

Brian Hepburn converted to put Dartmouth ahead 13-12 and in the final period the spirited Indians sewed up the game by sweeping from the 24 to the Princeton 13 from where Bill Morton dashed over the goal line.

The victory came after a near capacity crowd of 44,000 gave Dartmouth a conference record of six victories against a single de-

feat, that at the hands of Harvard 16-8.

Sparks Score

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Michigan State, bottom team in the Big Ten football standings, whipped Kansas State of the Big Eight 26-7 before a sparse crowd of 39,033 Saturday.

The Spartan victory bell clang again after long being muffled to celebrate a touchdown on the first series of plays, two more in the third quarter, and a fine score with less than two minutes remaining.

The Kansas State counter, also in the third period, was helped by 45 yards of penalties.

Vols Beaten

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—Kentucky repulsed Tennessee scoring threats in the first half and then sprung halfback Glenn Shaw loose for a 24-yard scoring run and a 6-2 victory Saturday.

Until Shaw's brilliant gallop midway the third period, Tennessee had maintained the upper hand in a hard-fought game between the traditional Southeastern Conference rivals.

Marquette Bows

WORCESTER, Mass. (AP)—Holy Cross sent speedy Bob De Fino across for a pair of touch-

downs and then halted two drives inside the 10 yard line for a 14-0 football victory over Marquette Saturday.

The victory was the sixth for Holy Cross, which has lost only to Pitt and Penn State.

Jayhawks Tied

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP)—Homer (Hot Rod) Floyd, a blazing fast little senior halfback, scored on an electrifying 60-yard pass play with 18 seconds remaining to earn the Kansas Jayhawks a 13-13 tie with the Missouri Tigers Saturday in the final football game of the season for both teams.

Missouri took a 13-0 lead in the first quarter.

Heels Upset

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP)—Halfback Wray Carlton knifed over for a third period touchdown and then kicked the extra point Saturday that gave underdog Duke a 7-6 victory over North Carolina and dimmed the Tar Heels' chances of a bowl invitation.

A capacity crowd of 44,000, including Duke Bowl scouts, watched Gator roll 57 yards for a touchdown on the running of Carlton, who closed out a brilliant career.

Only 40 seconds remained in the first period when North Carolina fullback Don Klochak scored from the one.

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
