

Tiger Jones Records Upset Over Calhoun

NEW YORK (UPI) — Middleweight Tiger Jones, who upset Rory Calhoun by the margin of a foul-round Friday night, may meet top contender Carmen Basilio at Syracuse, N.Y., in January.

Promoter Norman Rothchild announced he had offered ex-champion Basilio \$35,000 to meet Jones at the Syracuse Memorial Auditorium in a non-televised bout.

Unranked Jones, a 9-5 underdog, won a unanimous decision over 10th-rated Calhoun of White Plains, N.Y., in their TV-radio 10-rounder at Madison Square Garden, after slugger Calhoun had been penalized his best round, the eighth, on a blow-foul.

The Tiger of St. Albans, N.Y., was low man in the betting because of suspicion that he was "washed up."

Thirty-year-old Jones, who weighed 155½ pounds to Calhoun's 163, was awarded the victory on a rounds basis: 5-4, 5-2, 5-4, after referee Ray Miller's eighth-round forfeiture ruling for a low left hook.

Miller had warned Rory for low blows in the fifth round.

The decision was well received by the estimated 3,000 fans, most of whom had been trying to root home the under-Tiger during the bruising fight. However, a poll of 14 sports writers at the ringside favored Calhoun, 8-5, and United Press International had 24-year-old Rory ahead, 6-4.

"I forced the fighting in every round and beat him," Jones declared Saturday. "And now I want a fight with Basilio to clinch a shot at Sugar Ray Robinson's title. Don't forget I beat Robinson three years ago and he'd never give me a return bout."

Spasm Staggers Cage Ace

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—For the second time within nine months, the Cincinnati Royals of the National Basketball Assn. were faced with a baffling physical ailment of a star player.

Sihugo Green, 23, starting his first season for the Royals, collapsed for the second time in two months Friday night on the Convention Hall court. He left the game between the Royals and the Philadelphia Warriors in the first period.

A doctor said he suffered a cerebral spasm.

"We don't know how serious it was," said Bobby Wanzer, Royals' coach early Saturday. "We think he was hit in the face by an elbow during a scrimmage. It caused a partial paralysis. He may have a concussion. I don't think he'll be able to play."

Green, former Duquesne University great three seasons ago, was admitted for observation to Hahnemann Hospital, where X-rays were taken.

Green staggered away from a jarring scrimmage, unable to keep his balance, bewildered as to where he was or who he was. Teammates caught him before he fell.

The incident recalled the collapse of Maurice Stokes, another Royals' star, who was overcome last March 15 while flying to Cincinnati from a game in Detroit. He was taken to a Covington, Ky., hospital where he lay in a coma for several weeks.

Slowly recovering from what was diagnosed as a brain disease called encephalopathy, Stokes was moved last July to Christ Hospital in Cincinnati. Doctors virtually have written off return to action for the 6-6 former St. Francis of Loretto, Pa., player.

The 6-2 Green, of Brooklyn, N.Y., also collapsed before the start of a Royals-Boston Celtics exhibition game in Lewiston, Maine, Oct. 9. A doctor said he fainted because of a virus.

Renfros Lead Jeff To 38-0 Semi Triumph

Spruill kicked two of six conversion attempts.

The Boston Celtics are hot under the collar. The New York Knickerbockers are hot under the collar and on the basketball court. The Celtics outpunched, but did not outscore the Knicks Friday night as New York swept to its seventh straight National Basketball Assn. victory, 112-106.

Tom Heinsohn of Boston, who bounced a couple of blows off the head of New York's Willie Naulls, was ejected from the game. Heinsohn engaged in a fist fight with Phil Jordan of Detroit earlier this week.

Jim Loscutoff of Boston and Ken Sears of the Knicks were also involved in Friday night's fracas. Loscutoff tagged Sears with a right hand and wrestled him to the floor midway in the third quarter.

The game was the opener of a doubleheader at Philadelphia. In the second contest, the Philadelphia Warriors defeated the Cincinnati Royals 108-90.

The Knicks roared to a 61-39 lead at halftime. Carl Braun of the Knickerbockers was the high scorer with 26 points. Boston's Bill Russell had 25.

The triumph enabled the winners to increase their leading margin in the Eastern Division to 2½ games. Syracuse follows the Knicks.

Cincinnati suffered two reverses. In addition to dropping their ninth game in 11 starts, the Royals lost the services of St. Green, 1956 Duquesne All-American.

Green collapsed in the first period and was taken to a hospital. A doctor said that the NBA rookie suffered a cerebral spasm after being jarred during a scrimmage under the Philadelphia basket. Hospital authorities said that Green's condition was good.

Fraley's Facts, And Figures

MEXICO CITY (UPI)—Fearless Fraley's facts and figures from the International Trophy and Canada Cup golf championships:

Koichi Ono, who with Pete Nakamura won this event for Japan last year, takes his chopsticks every night and hies himself off to a Chinese restaurant for dinner.

It's okay because Koichi was born in Manchuria.

Miguel Sala, the Argentine-born pro from Colombia who took the first round lead with a 69, is par-busting proof that you don't have to be a giant to play fine golf.

Miguel, who sports a red, wispy moustache, is a human one iron who carries only 125 pounds on a five-foot, nine-inch frame.

Sala has been playing golf since he was 12 years old but also disproves the theory that to be a fine golfer you have to graduate from the caddy ranks. He never caddied but was started in the game by his father.

Henry Martell of Canada says that the Maple Leaf team is the only one using the big ball, even though it costs them from 30 to 60 yards on the long shots. His explanation is that you get "more action" on the big ball to make it stop more quickly and that they are more certain of the yardages they will get with the more familiar big ball.

Bowling companies, incidentally, are making a big drive to crack the Mexican market. John Merson of Brunswick-Balke says there are only 105 lanes—alleys, not establishments—in this city of four million people.

The Japanese won this 72-hole event last year by never straying from the fairway and putting sensationally. So, when they teed off—right down the middle—L.G.A. President Frank Pace observed dryly:

"That's 73 straight holes they haven't been off the fairway."

The Mexicans put on a special little touch by providing shiny, freshly-minted centavos for ball markers.

There is no truth to the report that Sam Snead teed off twice in each round. They also provided brandy on the first tee—and you never saw so many happy sportswriters who saw so many shots off the first tee.

WILLAMINA, Ore. (AP)—Un-defeated Willamina won its way into the Oregon class A-2 football playoff championship final with a 26-13 victory over Bandon here Friday night.

Bob Nokolby established a state high school scoring record when he scored three touchdowns and added two extra points. That gave him a 215-point season total.

The previous record, 210, was set last year by Steve Picard of Seaside.

Nokolby romped 43 yards to a touchdown on the first play Willamina had the ball. He converted.

Bob Bowman took a screen pass from Jeff Giles and romped 80 yards to a Bandon touchdown on the first play of the second quarter. But Bandon still trailed after Giles failed to run across the extra point.

Nokolby went 43 yards for another touchdown late in the second period.

Then he took the second half kickoff and ran 79 yards across the Bandon goal line.

A 21-yard pass play from quarterback Gary Littlejohn to Bill McMillan gave Willamina its final touchdown in the last period.

It was Willamina's eleventh victory of the season. It will meet the winner of Saturday's Vale Eagle Point game for the A-2 title.

Promoters Predict TV To Empty Ring

NEW YORK (NEA) — There was a night in 1950 at Madison Square Garden and Sammy Richman, who had promoted fights at Brooklyn's Broadway Arena and Tommy Young and a flood of others to the big time, leaned over and tapped Milton Berle on the shoulder.

"Do you know who I am?" Sammy asked. Berle, Mr. Television at the time, shrugged.

"You should," Sammy said. "You put me out of business. My club ran on Tuesday nights until you came along."

For 10 years, that has been the story. The one fight club television didn't put out of business, the International Boxing Club, helped Berle and other entertainers practically kill the game by televising two fights a week.

Truman Gibson, the IBC's president, goes all-out for the medium. It is, for him, a safe way to clear a profit each week. And, besides, it reduces the headache of making matches. No promotion is required of his outfit these days. Just get two run-of-the-gym kids, put them in for \$4,000 each and get paid.

As a result the fights have been horrible, particularly on Wednesday nights, which for some reason seem to be a magnet for those fighters who have a style dull enough to lull ringworms to sleep.

Which is why the cocktail session we had on Madison Avenue the other night seems pertinent. Holding a thin-stemmed martini glass with the assurance only a big network producer's job gives you, my television guy advanced a thought.

"The sponsors are thinking right now," he began. "When you see two of them sponsoring a show, not too expensive a show like this one, then it means the show doesn't sell enough to warrant sponsoring it entirely."

"The next thing you'll see is the ad space cut up into a lot of spots. You'll be asked to buy 60 different things during a 10-round fight. After that they'll all drop out and goodbye fight television."

"Teddy Brenner at the old St. Nicholas Arena in New York shows you that. He can't get a sponsor for his show. The Monday night fights always had one, but interest dropped. The Wednesday and Friday night affairs will wind up in the same category. Television will take prize fighting for all it has and leave it for seriously dead."

"TV needed the fights at first. Now it has reached the point where they don't do TV any good, so the fights will be dropped like a hot potato."

This wasn't the man who comes to fix your set popping off while putting in a new tube. This fellow is the producer of one of TV's top 10 shows. He makes sense.

Truman Gibson authored statements for a TV periodical extolling the virtues of the magic lantern for the beak busting business.

TORONTO (AP) — The Toronto Maple Leafs management Saturday asked George (Punch) Imlach to whip their last-place National Hockey League team into winning form.

Imlach, who joined the Leafs last summer as assistant general manager, took over as general manager with complete authority to make any changes he feels will get the Leafs into the Stanley Cup playoffs.

Stafford Smythe, chairman of the seven-man committee which has masterminded the Leafs' affairs since the spring of 1957, said Imlach will get a free hand.

"We're not satisfied with the performance of the players or even of Coach Billy Reay," Smythe said. "It will be Imlach's problem to correct this."

Mel Ott Buried Saturday In New Orleans

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The sports world said farewell Saturday to Mel Ott, New York Giant immortal and a member of baseball's Hall of Fame.

Ott, 49, died Friday. Physicians had tried for a week to check complications from injuries he received in an automobile collision a week ago.

Ott went into major league baseball as a boy. He went to play for the Giants at age 16.

The wreck near Bay St. Louis, on Mississippi's Gulf Coast, killed the driver of the other car, Leslie Curry Sr., 50, and seriously injured Ott's wife, Mildred.

Mrs. Ott still was under treatment for injuries. She was transferred from a Gulfport, Miss., hospital to one here Friday night.

Ott was brought to a local hospital Thursday when his condition worsened due to a kidney malfunction.

He underwent an eight-hour operation, requiring an artificial kidney and specialists, in correct a blocked kidney. Another operation was required Friday when the ailment reappeared. He died in the afternoon. His two daughters and a brother were at his bedside.

Horace Stoneham, president of the Giants, now playing out of San Francisco, cut short a vacation in Ciudad Trujillo, Dominican Republic, and flew to New York.

Stoneham said Ott was "not only a great Giant player but a very dear personal friend also."

Ott, a native of nearby Gretna, was 16 years old when he was recommended to Giants' Manager John J. McGraw.

Ott came to New York as a catcher, but was converted to an outfielder. Ott went on to break scores of records before retiring in 1947.

Ott managed the Giants between 1942 and midseason of 1948. He managed Oakland in the Pacific Coast League for two seasons before leaving baseball in January, 1953.

He went into a construction business here and resided in suburban Metairie. In 1955 he became a broadcaster for Detroit Tigers' home games.

Ott holds the National League record for most home runs, 311. Only Babe Ruth and Jimmy Fox, who played in both the National and American leagues have hit more.

Survivors include his daughters, Mrs. Philip Lorio and Miss Barbara Ott; his mother, Mrs. Charles Ott Sr.; Gretna; a brother, Charles Ott Jr.; and a sister, Mrs. Louis Rhodes of Gretna, and one grandson.
