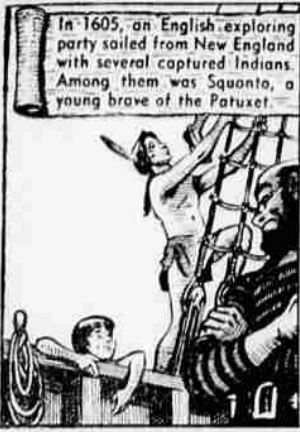




In 1605, an English exploring party sailed from New England with several captured Indians. Among them was Squanto, a young brave of the Patuxet.

Solon Well Acquainted With Bard

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—U.S. senators may be hearing quite a bit of Shakespeare in the next six years. California is sending to the Senate a man who can spout long passages of the Bard at the drop of a filibuster.

He is Clair Engle, rugged, plain-spoken former representative from the so-called cow counties of Northern California. Two weeks ago, he performed a major political feat by whipping one of the state's ace vote-getters, Gov. Goodwin Knight, for the Senate.

But then, Engle is full of surprises, not the least of which is his knowledge of Shakespeare. Before he left for Washington, he asked him if his constituents were surprised by it, too.

"I haven't made any hooparaw about knowing Shakespeare," he replied. "But I don't think they would be surprised or shocked."

I've found some of the best-read people I've ever known up in that country. Up there, they've got a lot of time to read — and to think."

He added: "I've never made any pretensions about being an expert on Shakespeare. I think there are too many people in the world who pretend to be experts."

His interest in the plays goes back to his youth. "I first began studying Shakespeare intently when I was in college," he said. "But I was reading it even before that. My father had the best edition of Shakespeare I've ever seen. It was set in big, readable type, and I've been trying to find that edition ever since."

He has read all of the plays, some of them many times.

"I don't often work the quotations into speeches," he said. "The great value I find in Shakespeare is how it helps you in phrasing. Any of his opponents can vouch for that. He has a gift for the picturesque and stinging phrase. The senator-elect carries a volume of the collected works with him during his extensive travels. His favorite plays?"

He chose "Hamlet" among the tragedies and "Twelfth Night" of the comedies.

Fund Activities Underway For Shakespeare Theater

ASHLAND—Oregon Shakespeare Festival building committee spokesmen report that full-scale fund raising activities are now underway in the campaign to secure \$275,000 before Christmas. Following last week's opening dinner, attended by 200 enthusiastic volunteer workers, solicitations were launched in several areas. The theater's former Elizabethan stage, condemned as hazardous, has been dismantled.

Noted writer Kathleen Norris will be chairman for the festival's money-raising efforts in the San Francisco Bay Area. Mrs. Nion Tucker, prominent in San Francisco social circles, will be co-chairman there.

In her acceptance wire, Kathleen Norris, long a festival patron, stated: "It makes me very happy to know that my hand is joined now with all of yours in this work to build a house as fitting as our love and loyalty can make it for the first play and playwright of them all."

Several messages of goodwill reached campaign headquarters as it launched the search for donors. Dore Schary, former production head at MGM and author of the current New York hit, "Sunrise at Campobello," wired to say that "Here in New York those who love the theater applaud your efforts to rebuild the old Shakespearean theater in Ashland. I happily join in wishing for your success."

Frank Hemingway, popular radio newscaster, wired: "I know your efforts will be crowned with success and Shakespeare will reign bigger and better than ever in Ashland."

From Terrence O'Flaherty, San Francisco Chronicle columnist, came the message: "I wish San Francisco had thought of a Shakespearean festival first and could have done it as well as the citizens of Oregon. Good luck. Perhaps for the first time in history fund raisers have a gift-edge product to sell." O'Flaherty is a widely read critic and commentator.

Prior to the campaign, the festival received the best wishes of Maurice Evans, internationally acclaimed Shakespearean actor.

Encouragement "from beyond" gave ethereal comfort to the volunteer fund raisers. A telegram from a San Francisco ghost writer remarked: "Little did I think when Will was working late those nights in Stratford that he would ever be successful enough to have a theater built for him in Ashland, Oregon. Best wishes. It was signed Anne Hathaway."
