

Weary, Tired 'Daddy' Hart Cares For Ailing Daughter

MONTAGUE — After living on a ranch that encompassed some 1,700 acres in a hospital ward in the Siskiyou County General Hospital, and that corner contains all his worldly goods including his precious old violin which he played in orchestras for dances in the long years gone by. He hasn't exactly set the world on fire, with any spectacular inventions or

writings — but he has now seen 89 years on this rugged old earth since Sunday, November 16. His name is William Hart, the nurses at the hospital fondly call him "Daddy" Hart, and on each birthday they observe his natal day by preparing him a birthday cake. He has "lived" at the hospital since October 2, 1947. He is not in ill health and his mind is as clear and sharp as ever. He has a vast store of memories. "Daddy" Will Hart first saw the light of day on November 16, 1869, at Wilton Junction, Muscatine County, Iowa, and is the first born son of Louisa and George Hart. He tells how his father joined General Grant's Union Army at Vicksburg, where he died of malaria and is buried there. Then, his widowed mother packed up a few of her belongings and with her two small children, Will, 3½, at the time, and second infant son, a babe in arms, Ed, traveled a hazardous trip via the Isthmus of Panama until they reached Lower California where they boarded

a train for a few miles, traveling again by mule, then by boat up the Sacramento River until they reached Red Bluff. At Red Bluff they boarded a stage coach and traveled over the Scott Valley Mountains until they reached Yreka in June of 1865, where they stayed at the old Union Hotel which was later destroyed by fire. Mrs. Hart had two brothers, John and George Miller, who had settled in Little Shasta Valley in 1849, and she and her small babies made their home with them. This ranch later became known as the Hart Ranch, and as mentioned before consisted of approximately 1,700 acres. Here Will and his brother Ed grew up and learned the ways of ranch life, both following a career of cattle raisers.

"Daddy" Hart is rather vague as to the exact date of his marriage to Stella Chandler, whose mother had the distinction of being the first white woman born in the area, but relatives say it must have been some 75 or 76 years ago, and they had two children, a boy, Hubert, and a girl, Leila, who is now 73. He was left with his two children when Hubert was 11, when his wife died, and he has never remarried. If Hubert were alive he would be 74.

A niece by marriage, Mrs. Raymond Hart (Raymond was the son of his brother Ed) who lives in Little Shasta says Will should have followed a career as a musician or a writer, for he had a wonderful talent in both fields. She said that he was a "terrific" violinist, and was well known in the early days for his fine music.

Even today, at 89, "Daddy" Hart has retained his remarkable gift of expression by pen, and his handwriting is an exquisite example of fine penmanship rarely found these days. He recently penned an epitaph in memory of his son, Hubert, whose tragic suicide a few years ago saddened him greatly.

He proudly tells that "I make my own bed, mend my own clothes, and help the nurses take care of my little girl." His daughter, Leila, who was 73 in October, is also a resident of the hospital, having been incapacitated when but a small child of 11 with St. Vitus dance. The nurses tell how he cuts and combs her hair, and he said, "That is all I am living for, is to take care of my daughter who is helpless." He also said, "I am weary and old, ready for a rest, but I cannot leave my girl yet, she must be taken care of."
