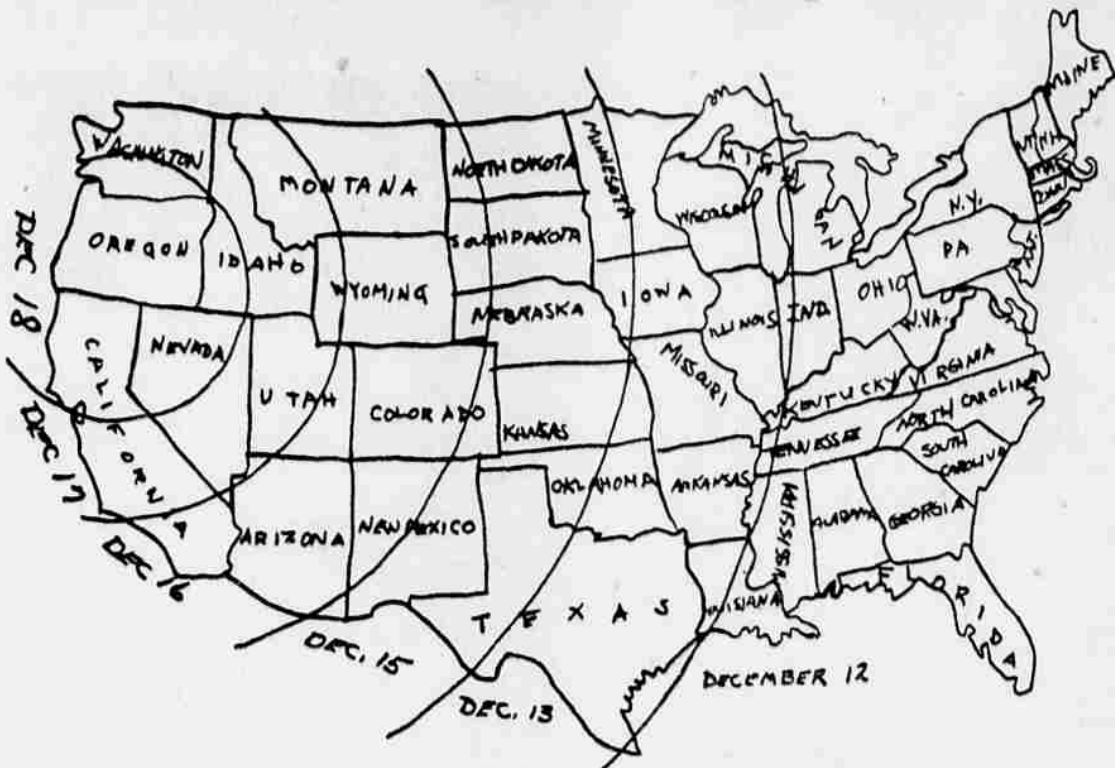

Recess Called In Beck Trial

TACOMA, Wash. (AP)—The \$240,000-income tax evasion trial of former Teamsters Union President Dave Beck Sr. was recessed for the weekend Friday when opposing attorneys could not agree on the admissibility of a raft of check stubs.

The attorneys were ordered by U.S. Dist. Court Judge George H. Boldt to present briefs supporting their contentions. Judge Boldt said he would rule Monday on the arguments.

The government sought to introduce the check stubs as part of its charge that Beck's expenditures were out of line with the income he declared on his 1950-53 tax returns.

The stubs, from the checking account of Nathan Shefferman, Chicago labor relations consultant, were brought to court by Miss Florence Ouska, Shefferman's bookkeeper. She testified the checks, some of which covered purchases she had made for Beck, were part of a "paper jungle" she maintained for Shefferman.

The government had called Miss Ouska to the stand to explain each check stub. The defense objections cut the session short since no other government witnesses were available in court.

Dozens of government witnesses remain to testify but they have been given appointment dates and told not to appear in court before the stated time.

Violators Hit By NY Police

NEW YORK (AP)—Police cracked down Friday on traffic violators in a mid-Manhattan area. The special detail tagged 381 cars.

Each ticket means a \$15 fine. The section blanketed was between 34th and 40th streets, and third and ninth avenues.

Police said the drive was conducted because of increasing violations in midtown, with resultant clogging of traffic arteries.

Air Force Ballistic Chief Doesn't Think Reds Ahead

WASHINGTON (AP)—In the tense East-West race to develop a workable long-range ballistic missile "there is no reason to believe that the Russians are appreciably ahead of us."

This is the view of Maj. Gen. B. A. Schriever, chief of the Air Force ballistic missile division. He indicated, in fact, that the United States and Russia may return to workable intercontinental ballistic missiles at about the same time.

But he told the National Geographic Society Friday that America can't afford to relax. "The informed consensus would seem to be that the Soviet Union presently has an advantage in what we describe as the 'short range' or under 1,000-mile type of ballistic missile."

In St. Louis, another Pentagon missile specialist said Friday night that this country will have intermediate range missiles ready for combat use very soon.

Brig. Gen. Austin W. Betts, military assistant to the director of guided missiles, didn't elaborate on the time element. However, he told a meeting of manufacturers: "Ballistic missiles very soon to be operational will be able to destroy enemy targets 1,500 miles away less than half an hour after the decision is made to attack."

This is far beyond the capability of any manned aircraft now operational or anywhere in sight. There were indications that there might be another Navy satellite launching this year after all.

A successful static test of the Vanguard rocket was conducted at Cape Canaveral, Fla. A static test usually precedes an actual launching by 14 days.

Only last week the National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced there would be no further attempts to launch a Vanguard satellite this year.

Rockefeller Back In NY

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Gov. Elect Nelson A. Rockefeller returned here by plane briefly Saturday from a two-week vacation in Venezuela and Brazil.

He held a news conference at Idlewild Airport and then took off in a private plane for Washington, D.C. He said he was going to attend a meeting of the President's Advisory Committee on Government Organization.

He has been the committee's chairman for five years. Rockefeller was asked to compare the friendly reception he received in Latin America with the hostile greeting accorded Vice President Nixon.

"It's very hard to compare as he was on an official trip and I was on an unofficial one," Rockefeller replied. He added, "that situation was a peculiar phenomenon of the times. I'm sure Mr. Nixon would be greeted very warmly now."

LONGEST TELEGRAM EVER

Auto Battle Gains Speed

DETROIT (AP)—The perennial Chevrolet-Ford battle for auto industry leadership is gaining momentum.

The world's two largest car makers are getting their production programming into approximately normal shape following a slow October start. Despite Chevrolet's heavy production loss in October it appears to have clinched the lead in output and sales for 1958.

Ford has its new Galaxie model in production for an early December presentation. This will further step up the competitive pace between the two major car builders. The newest Ford series has been regarded as designed to compete with Chevrolet's fast-selling Impala line.

The most recently tabulated sales figures, covering the year's January-September period, gave Chevrolet a lead of more than 230,000 unit deliveries. In production the Chevrolet lead at that time, was 237,659 cars. It now stands at 160,000, the drop being due entirely to the October shutdown.

Both are stepping up production. The Galaxie model borrows much from the Thunderbird styling. Its prices range from \$2,303 for the two-door, six-cylinder sedan, to \$3,063 for the retractable hardtop, eight-cylinder unit. Chevrolet's suggested list price for the Impala range from \$2,592 for a four-door, six-cylinder sedan, to \$2,907 for a V-8 convertible.

Both the Impala and Galaxie prices are exclusive of taxes and options.
