Red Paper Asks Protest

LONDON (AP) — The Communist Daily Worker Saturday called a mass meeting and a march to the U.S. Embassy to protest against the visit of Vice President Richard Nixon to London. The meeting, scheduled for next Tuesday, has been organized by the London district of Britain's Communist party. A five-column story in the Daily Worker indicated the theme of the meeting. It will be: "Go home Nixon." The article said "Nixon personifies the drive to war. It is his policy which keeps the H-bombers flying constantly over Britain and uses our island as an advanced American missile base." Nixon will be guarded by Scotland Yard operatives as well as U.S. Secret Service men during his four-day visit this week.
