Unified Action Policy Evading Western Powers

BERLIN (AP) — The Western powers were reported still unable to agree today on a policy of unified action toward the Communist challenge in Berlin.

There were many indications that the United States, Britain and France were finding it difficult to agree on a plan of action and when Soviet Premier Khrushchev unveiled a definite proposal for dismantling the four-power regime for the city.

Khrushchev declared two weeks ago that the Soviet Union was ready to pull out of the four-power setup, a leftover from the victorious Allies' cooperation in Germany, and leave the Western powers on their own in dealing with the East Germans.

The West's dilemma was how far to go in dealing with Moscow's East German satellite. Despite official denials, reports persisted here, in London, in Washington and in Bonn that the British see less danger in such dealing than do the Americans, French or West Germans.

The West German government in Bonn is opposed to any Western dealings with the East German regime. It favors the use of tanks to break down the barricades and fighting planes to protect an airfield if the East Germans get tough about letting supplies through to the 10,000 British, American and French troops holding the island of West Berlin, 110 miles behind the Iron Curtain.

Rebate Refused; Irate Passenger Swings At Driver

NEW YORK (AP) — Emerson Cox, 27, dropped 30 cents in the till as he boarded a bus in the Bronx with his wife and their two children.

After the family settled in a seat, both parents holding a baby, he discovered that his wife also had paid the fare.

At the end of the line, Cox demanded a refund from the bus driver, John Cunningham, 23. Cunningham said he tried to explain that he could not refund the money because it was already registered in the machine.

But Cox laid his 11-month-old son on the floor of the bus and took a swing at Cunningham, who promptly returned the punch.

Meanwhile, the bus began rolling slowly down a hill. About a block from the starting point, it crashed into the rear of a car waiting for a stop light to change. The car rear fender was damaged.

Then police arrived.

Cox was held in \$1,000 bail for a hearing Tuesday.

Funnyman, Parkyakarkas, Dies During Show Meeting

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Harry Einstein, 54, who rose to radio fame as the Greek funnyman Parkyakarkas, died of a heart attack today.

Einstein had just finished an hilarious talk at a Friar's Club testimonial dinner for Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz when he collapsed.

He was carried backstage and while some of the nation's top entertainers kept the show going, doctors summoned from the audience made an incision in his chest and massaged his heart.

For two hours they kept his heart pumping by their manipulation but there was no answering response from the heart. Einstein was finally pronounced dead by Dr. Alfred Goldman.

Goldman was one of five doctors in the audience of 1,200 at the Beverly Hilton Hotel who rushed forward when comedian Milton Berle suddenly sent a chill through the gay crowd with his cry: "Is there a doctor in the house?"

Berle was sitting next to Einstein on the speaker's platform. Just after taking his seat following his brief talk, Einstein slumped over, his head falling on Berle's shoulder.

Parkyakarkas, as everyone called him, had drawn the biggest laughs of the evening during his appearance topping such well-known comics as Berle, George Burns and Danny Thomas.

For while the others kept the entertainment going, but finally Arnaz stepped forward.

"This dinner is something I've looked forward to for a long time," he said, "but it doesn't mean anything now. They say the show must go on. But why must it?" And the show stopped.

Arnaz, Lucille Ball, Berle and others from the audience clustered behind the curtain backstage area where the dramatic fight to save Einstein's life was going on.

Nearby, but not watching, was Parkyakarkas' wife, the former actress Thelma Leeds. She was comforted by her son Clifford, 18. Einstein leaves three other sons, including the novelist Charles Einstein.

Parkyakarkas was born in Boston and started out as a newspaper reporter and later advertising man there. He was a master of dialects and an immediate hit as a comedian when he appeared as a guest on the Eddie Cantor show in the early 1930s.

After years as a guest on other leading shows, he got a program of his own. He retired from radio several years ago and limited his performances to night clubs and personal appearances.

In addition to the doctors, a rescue squad from the Beverly Hills Department helped in the fight to keep Parkyakarkas alive. They brought blood plasma, and gave him transfusions while the heart massage was kept up.

Birthday Due For New Pope

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John XXIII is 77 Tuesday. He may have to be reminded it's his birthday, Vatican aides say.

He has been too busy in his first month as pontiff to make any personal plans for the day. He may, at the last minute, call in one or two friends for a quiet meal.

His three brothers and one sister, last of a family of 12 children, will not be here. They, and hundreds of thousands from his native village of Sotto il Monte and his province of Bergamo, are coming down by special train Dec. 6, instead, to give him a golden crown.

John XXIII was older, at the time of his election Oct. 28, than any other newly elected pope since Clement XII in 1700. Clement was 70 when he became pontiff.

But with an energy that belies his years, sturdy Pope John was held to a work schedule that allows only six hours sleep a night, and already has set several precedents.

A week ago he called a consistory for Dec. 15 to create 23 new cardinals and increase the size of the Sacred College to 75. It had been fixed at 70 for nearly two centuries.

He left his tiny Vatican state last Friday to drive to Castel Gandolfo for a private visit to the papal summer palace. Sunday he drove through the streets of Rome again, this time in formal procession, to take possession of the Basilica of St. John Lateran, his see as bishop of Rome. Next Thursday he will drive through Rome to inaugurate the academic year at the Lateran Athenaeum, where he himself once studied.

Alaska Views State Vote

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — Between 35,000 and 40,000 residents are expected to brave snow and bitter cold in many parts of this vast territory Tuesday to vote in the first state election.

Democrats are heavily favored in the balloting for two new United States senators, one congressman, governor, secretary of state and 60 members of Alaska's first State Legislature.

There seemed general agreement that E. L. Bartlett, Democratic delegate to Congress for the past 14 years, would win one Senate seat easily. The race between Republican Gov. Mike Stepovich and ex-Gov. Ernest Gruening, a Democrat, appeared close.

If 40,000 votes are cast it will set a record for a general election in this sparsely populated territory, but would be far under the 46,000 who turned out at a summer referendum to approve statehood by a 5-1 margin.

The campaign drew big-name political figures from the states. Vice President Richard M. Nixon and Interior Secretary Fred M. Seaton toured the territory for Republicans and Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) campaigned for Democrats.
