



Doctors Okay Radium House

WHEELING, W.Va. (AP)—Mrs. Joseph Belgrade, whose house had been contaminated by radio active rays from a ball of radium.

says physicians have told her she has nothing to worry about.

The widow of a Wheeling dermatologist underwent the examination after physics instructors at West Liberty State College said a Geiger counter registered 3,000 counts per minute in almost every room of the house.

Mrs. Belgrade had called the college to see if officials were interested in purchasing the 10 milligrams of radium, which was no bigger than an air-gun pellet.

She said a son carried the radium home in a leather box about two years ago and it had since been moved from place to place in the house.

Robert W. Scramm of the West Liberty staff said the radium had been giving off dangerous rays and exposure at close range for several hours could prove fatal.

'Blank' Kills Youngster

ST. LOUIS (AP)—A 13-year-old boy died Sunday because a live .22 cartridge got mixed up with blank rounds.

The victim was Gary F. Hervey.

He and two friends, George Shackelford, 15, and Melvine Brune, 13, had been target shooting in the woods. They were carrying live and blank ammunition.

Walking home, they decided they would see what a powder burn would look like on an Army helmet liner Gary was wearing.

George and Melvine told police that George put the liner on his head and Melvine fired a blank at it. The shot produced only a tiny smudge.

Melvine reloaded and Gary who had first refused to wear the liner, put it on.

Young Shackelford took over the weapon, aimed and fired.

Gary died in a hospital three hours later.

A coroner's jury returned a verdict of accidental death.

Morse Seeks To Back Ike

PORTLAND (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) said Saturday all Americans should close ranks behind the stand of President Eisenhower on the Berlin crisis.

"In my opinion," Morse said, "President Eisenhower is completely right on the Berlin issue, which is just the opposite of his mistaken course of action on the Quemoy and Matsus issue."

Morse said the United States must make clear to Russia it stands for international justice and will not be intimidated by the threat of force.

"International law is clearly on our side in this dispute," he said. "We cannot permit Communist Russia and Communist East Germany to endanger the survival of freedom in either Berlin or West Germany."

"I think we should call upon Russia and all other countries, parties to the crisis to lay the entire matter before the world court for an adjudication of the international law rights of the disputants in the Berlin crisis."

PARLIAMENT CONVENES BUDAPEST (UPI)—The new Hungarian parliament will convene next Wednesday for the first time since the national elections Nov. 18. It was announced today.

Crime Increase Noted By FBI

WASHINGTON (AP)—The FBI said today crime increased by 11 per cent in the first nine months of this year, compared with the corresponding period in 1957.

Based on preliminary reports from cities over 25,000 population, the FBI crime index showed the following increases for seven types of offenses:

Robbery, 13 per cent; burglary, 14 per cent; forcible rape, 13 per cent; larceny (over \$50), 13 per cent; auto theft, 5 per cent; murder, 3 per cent; aggravated assault, 2 per cent.

Youths Dedicate Christian Church

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Chicago Eyed As Meet Site

WASHINGTON (AP)—Both Republicans and Democrats have their eyes on Chicago as a possible site for the 1960 presidential nominating conventions — but for opposite reasons.

The Republicans want to revive their strength in the Midwest, where they received a whipping in the Nov. 4 elections.

The Democrats want to flex their new Midwest muscles and keep their opponents down.

The Democratic National Committee is expected to name its convention site at a Dec. 6 meeting. The Republicans probably will wait until late December or mid-January.

A choice in the Midwest is by no means certain. Democratic National Chairman Paul Butler has just come back from Miami Beach, where he inspected its possibilities as a convention site.

If both parties want the Midwest, the odds are on Chicago. No other city from the area has bid for both conventions.



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Rescue Try All In Vain

STAYTON, Ore. (AP)—William B. Pearson swam through treacherous rapids and pulled his son, George, 26, from the Santiam River Sunday.

But artificial respiration applied by the father failed to revive the younger Pearson. Both farmed near Turner.

Coroner's deputy Lee Howell said the men were duck hunting near here when their boat was sucked into a whirlpool, and nearly filled with water.

Howell gave this account of the drowning: Both men plunged into the water and held on to the side of the boat. But the younger Pearson lost his grip and began drifting away.

He went beneath the surface, and later popped above the water 50 feet downstream, and below the rapids.

The father then swam through the rapids to his aid. The elder Pearson grabbed his son and managed to get him to a mid-river log jam, despite both going under water twice.

Once on the logs, Pearson applied artificial respiration, but Pearson emptied it of water, and was unable to revive the son. The boat, meanwhile, had floated. Then he rowed ashore and called down the river to the log jam police.

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
