Vast Timber Tract Set For Planting

MOUNT SHASTA—Another milestone will be added to the road back for timber on Mt. Shasta when a 200-acre tract will be planted to seedling pines during the spring of 1959. Bids have been made for stripping the brush off the land to be planted. These will be opened Tuesday, December 2. Clearing will begin as soon thereafter as conditions will permit.

Mount Shasta District Ranger John C. Watt stated that the regular planting procedure will be followed. This consists of cleared land, with the planting done in rows eight feet apart, and the same distance between trees in the rows. The nature of the land to be planted will allow plots larger than the one fifth acre employed in some places as erosion is not a destructive factor there.

Medic Cites Top Men Need

SOCORRO, N.M. (AP)—A leading American physicist says this country's main need is wise leadership in science "not just large numbers of technical people."

"Most of our high class technical people in industry today are working on things destructive," said Dr. Merle A. Tuve. "This is a mistake in public policy. We need more foreign aid in productive directions and less in weapons."

Dr. Tuve, director of the department of terrestrial magnetism at Carnegie Institute, spoke at an informal gathering of scientists at New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology Monday.

Tuve called United States moon shots "a multi-million dollar sky-rocket hysteria and an acute national disease."

School Board Holds Meet

McCLOUD—The Siskiyou County Board of Education met at the courthouse in Yreka on November 20 and voted to allocate not more than \$9,000 for capital outlay items for the Montague Elementary School. They also approved numerous teachers' credentials.

A general secondary life diploma for Stephen Francis Puego, Yreka, and a general elementary life diploma for Reba A. Swenson, Mount Shasta, were approved by the board. Provisional credentials for three teachers were requested.

The board approved the purchase of several 16 millimeter films for the audio visual department.

In other action, the board heard a letter from the Dunsuir Elementary Board of Trustees in

which they thanked the county board for financial assistance to the district for funds for capital outlay. A list of supplementary school books was approved.

The appointment of Mrs. Delores Tozier as trustee at Fort Jones

was approved by the board. Mrs. Tozier replaces Mrs. Grace Muller, who resigned.

Junction School was granted \$1,202 for capital outlay. Finally, the board authorized the county superintendent of schools permission to

draw up a supply list for schools to be bid upon and set the January meeting as bid opening time. All capital outlay funds are derived from forest reserve monies.

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
