Governor's Office Quiet, Now That Holmes Beaten

By PAUL W. HARVEY JR. SALEM (AP)—The governor's office is a quiet place now. No body seems very interested in seeing a governor after he's defeated.

The busy place is Secretary of State Mark Hatfield's office. Everybody loves a winner. For the first time since he took office Jan. 14, 1953, Gov. Robert D. Holmes has time to sit back and reflect.

He is very proud of his record. This is his story as he told it in an interview just before he left for Hawaii to attend the Western Governors' Conference.

Q. Will you provide leadership for the Democratic Party after you leave office Jan. 12? A. I'll see anybody in the party who wants counsel. I don't plan to aggressively play any particular role in the party. It doesn't need any reorganization, because it has lots of leadership and brains in the Legislature and Congress.

Q. You have mentioned that some of your programs might fail by the wayside when Hatfield becomes governor. Which programs do you mean? A. I mean in the area of economic planning and development. We have been gaining a good head of steam gradually, and I hope this activity will continue. I hope we won't lose my concept that the governor is a salesman for the state.

Q. Will the Democratic majority in the Legislature be able to work with Hatfield? A. The question should be: Will Mark work with the Democratic legislators? Naturally, the Democrats won't respond to his suggestions as readily as they would to mine. But they are just as responsible as Mark is. There will be no real warfare between the Legislature and the governor. The Legislature will pass a real program.

Q. Will the disagreements between Sens. Morse and Neuberger hurt the Democratic party or the state? A. This disagreement is very unfortunate. It's regrettable. But it won't damage their unity on larger issues, and it won't hurt the party or the state.

Q. Will you assist in the transition from your administration to that of Hatfield's? A. I'm doing everything possible to make it easy. When we get the budget drafted, I'll call in

Mark and study it with him. Q. What do you think of Hatfield's proposal to rebuild the Republican Party? A. He made it clear in the campaign he wanted to be bipartisan, and that he would appoint people only on their qualifications. So it came to me as a shock when, right after the election, he said he was going to rebuild the party. Q. What kind of a message will you have for the Legislature? A. It probably will be 15 minutes long, and possibly less. The state budget is my responsibility, so I'll explain it briefly. Then I'll briefly outline some of those things I would have recommended had I been governor. The Democrats are entitled to know that. Q. Of what achievements are you most proud? A. We've really made a good start in our Department of Planning and Development. I'm proud that we increased basic school aid, and that we increased salaries in our university and colleges. That salary increase saved us from losing many faculty members. I'm proud of the people I appointed to high office, like Justices Gordon Sloan and Kenneth O'Connell; and Mrs. Cecilia Galey to the Unemployment Compensation Commission, and Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan, Finance Director John Richardson, and Agriculture Director Bob Steward.

Q. What has been your general philosophy in making appointments? A. Instead of appointing for political reward, I have appointed men and women on merit. I have put the interests of the state first, and political considerations second. When you do that, it's difficult to avoid making a lot of people mad at you.

RC DISASTER MEET Otto Smith, disaster chairman of the Klamath Basin Chapter, American Red Cross, has called a meeting for members of the disaster committee and representatives of all local organizations which provide assistance in family fires. OFFICERS ELECTED McCLOUD—William Cline will head the McCloud Firemen's Association for the ensuing year. Other officers elected November 20 were Dan Sloan, vice president; Ray Kite, secretary-treasurer; Roy Pederson, three-year trustee; Gino Zanna, kitchen committee chairman, and John Bambino, club room committee chairman. In other action the members voted to hold the annual Christmas banquet for firemen and their wives at the McCloud banquet room December 13 with a party following. They also set the evening of December 19 as the time to hold the children's Christmas party. Members were informed that the American Red Cross first aid training courses will be started next month at the fire hall. Laurence Lung will be instructor.

MD Advises Moderation LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—One cup of coffee to a coffee break. Any more and you may give yourself an ulcer. "Discipline yourself a little bit and appreciate that the common things we do, if done to excess, can cause difficulty," said Dr. Robert W. Zollinger, head of surgery at Ohio State University. Coffee, tea, alcohol, smoking and cola drinks stimulate the secretion of digestive acids, he said. Too much acid? ulcer. Dr. Zollinger told Louisville physicians that stomach acids also aggravate such conditions as pancreatitis or inflammation of the pancreas gland, source of certain powerful digestive juices.

Boy, 11, Admits Slaying Of Kin BURNS (AP)—McKinley Lowe, a sheriff's deputy, said Monday that Larry Davis, 11, admitted the fatal shooting of his grandmother, Mrs. Bessie Davis, 63. Lowe quoted the boy as saying he did it because she was nagging him. The deputy said the boy was on a davenport. She had been housekeeper for her son, Ivan Davis, and the boy.

Auto Heiress 'Not Guilty' LOS ANGELES (AP)—Gregg Sherwood Dodge, actress-wife of auto heir Horace Dodge II, has been found innocent of charges that she committed battery against four police officers. But a municipal court jury ruled Monday that she was guilty of having been intoxicated, and the court set sentencing on that count for next Monday. Mrs. Dodge charged at her trial that officers dragged her by her hair, used a ju-jitsu hold on her, and that policemen humiliated her by searching her in front of male officers. She was arrested Aug. 26 along with Chicago columnist Irv Kupcinet, who still faces trial on a drunk driving charge.

Teamsters Make Movie ST. LOUIS (AP)—The Teamsters Union has made a movie to protest recent hearings by the McClellan labor racket committee. It's a 33-minute film called "Trial by Committee." It consists of excerpts of testimony before the committee by Harold Gibbons, St. Louis vice president of the Teamsters, and James R. Hoffa, Teamsters president. Edwin D. Dorsey, St. Louis Teamsters official, said, "We feel 'Trial by Committee'... demonstrates the unfairness of the McClellan hearings. The tactics and statements of the committee members prove how these hearings are a threat to organized labor and the rights of citizens everywhere." The picture is available to unions and organizations that request it.

SISTERS DIE WINDSOR, Ont. (AP)—Art Hall, of nearby Amherstburg, Ont., called his mother Sunday but got no answer. He wanted to tell her that her only living sister, Mrs. Isabel Meder, 74, who lived with him, was dead. After failing to get an answer Hall decided to go to the home of his mother, Mrs. Anna Hall, 80. When he arrived, he found his mother dead.

Officials Eye School Blast

HOBBBS, N.M. (AP)—Officials of a bombed integrated school say they have no reason to think racial tensions caused the explosion. "And we hope it was a simple act of vandalism."

One room of the Heizer Junior High School was badly damaged by the explosion of what appeared to be a single stick of dynamite thrown through a window or skylight Sunday night. Damage was estimated at \$2,000.

FBI agents, state police and local officers reported no luck in following out several leads to the identity of the dynamiter.

Principal Rex Haynes said there was no indication that the presence of about 65 Negro students among 611 pupils was the motive for the bombing. The school has been integrated since 1954.

Earl Westfall, Hobbs safety director, said, "So far, there's no indication that it was anything but vandalism."

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Television Star Changes Name

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Orison Whipple Hungerford Jr. changed his legal name Monday to the one which brought him fame in the Cheyenne TV series: Ty Hardin.

Hardin said he preferred his old name because it didn't smack so much of Hollywood but that it was a matter of convenience.

"My contract is in the name of Ty Hardin. I pay my rent as Ty Hardin, and my checks are signed Ty Hardin," he said. Dist. Judge Byron Johnson approved and signed the name change order.
