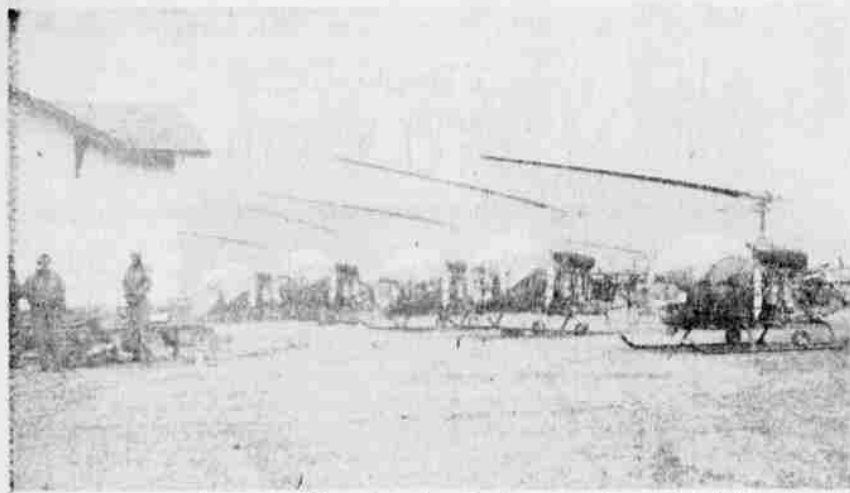

RIFLE ACCIDENT

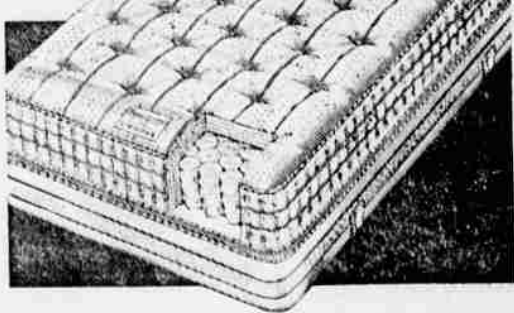

Carling Buys Brewing Firm

SEATTLE (AP) — The Heidelberg Brewing Co. of Tacoma has been sold to the Carling Brewing Co., subject to the approval of Heidelberg stockholders.

The sale was announced Tuesday by Ian R. Dowie, president of Carling, who said the Heidelberg board of directors has given its approval. Price tag on the transaction is said to be about \$12 million dollars.

Heidelberg brands would continue to be produced at the 650,000 barrel Tacoma plant if the sale goes through, Dowie said. Carling brands would be added as soon as possible.

Dowie said no changes in personnel are planned at the Tacoma plant which employs about 200.

Heidelberg was founded in 1901 as the Columbia Brewing Co. Its products are shipped to Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Northern California, Hawaii and Alaska.

Carling presently has plants at Atlanta; Cleveland; Natick, Mass.; Belleville, Ill., and Frankemuth, Mich.

DEPOE BAY, Ore. (AP)—Some 20 Pacific gray whales moved by here Tuesday on their annual fall migration from Alaskan waters to those off the west coast of Mexico.

The big mammals, counted by area residents, averaged about 45 feet long.

The whales, spouting and rolling as they went, are the vanguard of the only known regular whale migration.

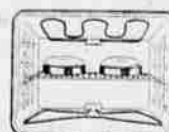
